

The city council will quit the year with a surplus in spite of the 'fact that the board of works had to use \$2,500 more than their appropriation, and also that \$4,500 had to be made up to meet the deficit caused by the fact that some city debentures sold below

This branch of the city business has shown excellent results this year, nuch better than usual, and fully \$6,000 more than was estimated will be turned into the city coners. would not be surprising if the amount eached \$10,000.

The Taxes. In addition Major Hayes has done exceedingly well in gathering in the taxes. This will increase the estimated revenue from back taxes by 1,200, giving the council something to ome and go on.



They themselves are a lot of political philosophers, as emancipated authorized to do it. as Mazzini or Goldwin Smith from racial or religious limitations. They are cosmopolitan idealists, followers of Comte as much as anybody. But the Turkish soldiery who carry out the sublime orders of the "internal committee" are used to doing business for the late sultan.

What is it that the Young Turks seek to do? Themselves of mixed race, and without strong religious bias, the leaders feel a dislike for the race propaganda of the Bulgarians, Greeks and Albanians, and have no sympathy with the religious differences or ambitions in the various provinces. They desire to develop a cosmopolitan spirit of imperialism in all the peoples of Turkey. They are endeavoring to make the Turkish language the common medium through the teaching of the higher schools, and a Law of Association forbids the formation of any club or society, whether political or literary, which has a nationalist basis. Naturally such measures are received with surprise and resentment by the subject nationalities. For a long time there has been great ill-will between Greeks and Slavs in Macedonia. Encouraged by the governments of Greece, Bulgaria and Servia, the factions have come to consider it one of the essentials of happy life to quarrel and even war with one another. Rudely these joys are now dispelled. 

A WOMAN'S NO CONSPIRACY TO MAKE COAL HIGHER

Important Ruling of American Court After Investigation of Charges.

THE PRICES UNCHANGED

One Firm Only Held To Be Selling in Violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law.

[Associated Press.]
Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—The United States circuit court for the eastern district of Pennsylvania decided today that there is no general conspir acy among the anthracite coal-carrying railroads or coal companies to restrain trade or commerce or to monopolize the trade or to maintain certain prices, but it did decide that the Temple Iron Company is a combination of anthracite coal-carrying railroads in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law and granted the prayer of the Government for an injunction estraining that corporation from con-

inuing a violation of the act. The sum and substance is that the Government wins only one of several points, that in the Temple Iron Company case and that the defendants will not be compelled to change the present prices of coal as a result of the

court's decision. Three Judges Differ. The case was heard by Judges Gray, Joseph Buffington and William M. Lanning last February. Three opinions were handed down and each differs from the other.

Judge Gray dismissed all of the Government's charges except that relating to the Temple Iron Company, which he sustains.

Judge Buffington dismisses all the charges except the one against the Temple Company, and the one relating to the 65 per cent contract existing between the big corporations and the independent coal companies, he sustaining the charges of violation of law on these two points.

Judge Lanning dismissed all the contention made by the Government. Suit Filed in 1907.

Government's case was that all the defendants had long been parties to a general combination and conspiracy, which stifled competition and obstructed trade and commerce in anthracite coal, to which the separate acts charged in the suit against various groups of the defendants were steps toward the common goal, and that these separate acts of the various groups were independently in violation of the Sherman anti-

The Government asked that the ourt adjudge and decree that: The defendants are parties to a combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade and that they be enjoined from continuing the combina-

That they be enjoined from continbetween the big companies and the ndependents.

That the acquisition by the Erie New York, Susquehanna and Western Railroad, and of the Pennsylvania Coal Company and the Delaware Valey and Kingston Railroad was illegal under the anti-trust act.

That the acquisition by the Reading company of the capital stock of the Jersey Central was also illegal. That the acquisition by the Lehigh Valley Railroad of the capital stock of Coxe Brothers & Co. was also ilegal.







HAVE GALA EVENING

Members Banqueted By Warden Campbell Last Night in Local Hotel.

Warden D. S. Campbell entertained me Middlesex County Councillors and officials at a banquet held last evening in the London House. Reeve S. F. Glass presided, and a fine programme of addresses and songs was disposed of, the different topics provoking many good stories.

Mr. Glass, in introducing the gramme, spoke of the different problems with which the councillors have had to grapple, and cited a motion taken from the records of 1875, which showed that the people's representatives at that time had the same old difficulty of new county buildings to contend with. The motion stated that in view of the fact that many justices sitting at London had made the buildings the subject of comment, new buildings should be erected, "and the present structure used until the new one is completed." This was loudly applauded, and it appears to be pretty certain that the old one will continue to be used for many a day yet.

CORRESPONDENCE

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

Permit me, through the columns of your paper, to reply to ex-Alderman Cooper's letter of the 6th inst., in which he says I have said things that were untrue. We all know what that means, and I wish to take exception to it.

Now, he refers to Cathcart street, and says that I ordered the work to be done. I said in council that I did not know any work was being done on this street until one curb and gutter was almost completed. This statement I make again, and consider my word as good as ex-Alderman Cooper's, or anyone's else, and according to British fair play and British justice, anyone is innocent until found guilty, so let him bring along his proof. Now, we will see how this street happened to be first commenced: We find in council proceedings that the people on Catheart street petitioned against a curb and gutter on said street; we also find that last year's board of works recommended to council that they initiate a curb and gutter on Cathcart street. This recommendation carried in council; this meant the forcing of some people against their will, and when the bylaw was prepared the work would be started by the engineer's department when opportunity presented itself, and never again brought before the council, board of works, chairman or any member of the council.

There is one good feature about this piece of work that is commendable; viz., there is at least one street in South London on which the public can travel in safety, and the work done was a credit to all interested, either the ratepayers along the street, the board of works or the engineering department, through which the work was done. Now, who is responsible-the council who authorized a bylaw for this work, or the council who knew nothing about it until the work was so far advanced as to make it compulsory to finish it?

Now let us compare this piece of work with one piece which was done last year (1909), viz., English street sewer, which was put down by day labor, not by contract. Now this sewer, although put down last year at an expense of a little over \$2,500, not down twelve months, had nearly all to be taken up and renewed this year at a cost of about \$2,200. The trouble was in this way: The block nearest to outlet had two feet of fall; the remainder, about four-fifths of the sewer, was expected to run uphill, having ten inches of a raise. This alone was enough to cause the sewer to fill. But when we think that there was no packing or cement placed in tile joints, there was every opportunity for a sewer built like this to fill up and become useless. There were also no laterals placed on a greater part of the sewer. Now, in council I put the blame on the engineer's department, and there is where I still think it should rest, but if ex-Alderman Cooper wishes to believe statements which have been brought about as a means of retaliation, and wishes to vindicate the engineer's department, and such work as was done last year on the English street sewer, and which was the cause of nearly \$2,200 of our overdraft, why, he then possesses more nerve than I do.

The engineer's department told me that Richmond street could be put in shape for \$50 per block. The work was recommended by the board of works through the council, and not by myself alone. Now, this work is also a credit to London; its only fault is that it cost more han estimated.

Now about overdrafts of ours and the surplus last year. The overdraft had other causes than the sewer. We had to reshingle the palace at Queen's Park before the Western Fair could be held in Now, this work was left over board requested on Nov. 8, 1909, to have the work done, and many times before, but this work was sent on to this year's council, and for which there was nothing placed in our estimates; also we had to expend on the east end town hall \$330 more than was in our estimates. Now, take this \$330, add to it \$2,200 (English street sewer), and \$970 more than estimated for Queen's Park (roof), and you find nearly \$3,700 spent this year not in estimates, and left over or by bad work of last year's council.

Now for a few extras which we will not put to the door of any previous council: New steam roller, \$3,500; street signs, \$350; repairs to Talbot street brick pavement, \$2,000; storm water drain, Piccadilly street, which the people voted against at last election (storm water drains), and which this council was forced to place to avoid damage suits, and which cost was estimated at \$520.

Our estimates this year were only \$2,900 more than last year, and when we take English street sewer, \$2,200; steam roller, \$3,500; Crystal Palace roof, \$970; street signs, \$350; east end town hall, \$330; Talbot street repairs, \$2,000; Piccadilly street storm water, \$520-a total of \$9,850 in extras, and only allowed \$2,900 more than last year to do it with.

Now, if ex-Alderman Cooper wishes truthfulness, let him begin on that surplus he claims to have had, viz., \$3,000, which should have been \$1,851 44. For proof of my statements, ask the secretary of the Western Fair board, also the city treasurer. ALD, JAMES A. TANCOCK.

London, Dec. 8.

Great Actress Was Not Hurt, But Her Car Was Damaged-Collision at Broadway Corner.

The fender was ripped off the car, and the windows were smashed by the force of the collision. Bernhardt covered her face with her muff and was not hurt by the flying glass.





NIAGARA POWER FOR THE FARM AND HAMLET

Mr. Beck Prophesies Big Things to Session of County Council.

Niagara power for every farm and every hamlet in this section was a prophecy made by Hon. Adam Beck to

the county council in session here yester-Mr. Beck attended presumably to talk over a grant to the Sanatorium, but soon drifted into a discussion of Niagara power, and for half an hour or more he spoke on that subject.

"Niagara power will be supplied to every farmer or village or hamlet that wants it," said Mr. Beck. "It will be given at cost, and there is no reason why all of you and your neighbors should not avail themselves of this privilege." He declared that many labor-saving de vices could use power-the churn, the washing machine, the choppers, the separators, the fanning mills. Electric light would do away with the old coal oil lantern, with its many dangers, and would enable the farmer to proceed with perfect safety through his stables and barns.


