[Canadian Press.] Berlin, Aug. 28.-Via London, 7:05 p.m.-Germany has declared war on Rumania.

London, Aug. 28.-3:15 p.m.-A message from The Hague today says word has been received from Berlin that the German Government will hand his passports to the Rumanian minister today.
