The talk of the wholesale slaughter of the fruit trees would be a hard thing on the growers , and for no purpose, as the scale can be got rid of without such blestruction, I am an old Canadian and have been here in this state for and have been here in this state for 21 years in the fruit raising business, and understand all about the scale. There are a number of sprays that kill the scale. Lime, sulphur and salt, to be used as per slip; Bordeaux mixture, either, will kill San Jose scale. The above is the best. I rather favor Bordeaux mixture, as it is easier to work and just as good. Both must be used while trees are dormant; it is the best time as the buds are about opening.

BORDEAUX MIXTURE NO. Copper sulphate (bluevitrol) ten ounds. Quicklime (not air-slacked) ten

Had No Knowledge Of The Land Deal With Hon. Geo. E. Eoster

MR. ROBLIN IN THE DARK

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Hon. R. P. Roblin of Manitoba and the Hon. Colin Campbell, Attorney-General, were on the stand before the Insurance Commission yesterday afternoon. Mr. Roblin was asked to explain his connection with the Swan River deals and the Union Trust. He said he had nothing to amend in Mr. Whitlas' evidence, but did take exception to statements made under eath by the Winnipeg land broker, A.

W. Pritchard.
Pritchard had said witness knew that Mr. Foster had bought 40,000 acres, the Carrol River lands, from him. This witness never knew until he read this same evidence in the

mewspapers.
Mr. Tilley: "Was there a suggestion that Pritchard should sell these lands for you?"
"None."
"Did you ever instruct him to come

"Tell the Commission how you came sell the lands?"

Pritchard was an accountant in the Department of Agriculture, as well as my private secretary, and he saw through my letters that I owned these lands. After I falled to make a sale in the United States through an agent. Mr. Farrell, who did not succeed because we could not find a registered title having only an agreement, he was going on a holiday and he asked if there would be any objection to his making a sale if he could. I said no. I heard no more about it until he came into my office and told me he had sold them."

"Did you see the correspondence be-tween Pritichard and Mr. Foster?"
"I did not."

Never Saw Agreement.

"But Mr. Whitlas produced this correspondence before the Commission."
"That may be. The lands were in
his name. I never had any papers.
Never had a word of correspondence
with Mr. Foster or the Union Trust."
When shown the agreement with the
Union Trust Co. for the purchase of
the land Mr. Roblin betrayed some
surprise. He never knew he said of

surprise. He never knew, he said, of the existence of any agreement. He thought all that was done was to make an assignment of the 40 sections and have the money paid over. "Pritchard said he was authorized

by you to offer Mr. Foster a substantial commission." tial commission."
"I never knew he was dealing with
Mr. Foster."
"Well to whoever was purchasing."
"I never authorized him to give a

commission to anybody."

"Have you anything else to remark about the evidence of Pritchard?" "I have. Pritchard said he left the service of the Department of Agriculture because he was not promoted. That is not true. I asked him to resign. He had been accountant for 22 years, and for over 12 there had been systematic stealing and embezzling in his department. When this was dis-

covered by the auditor the gully party had fied to the United States. Pritchard was called into my office and examined. When the offender was arrested, and Pritchard called to give evidence, he could not remember anything he had said before the arrest was made. So I told him if he could not remember better than that, he had better resign."

Contradicts Pritchard

Contradicts Pritchard. Hon. Colin Campbell then came the stand. He is president of the On-tarlo, Manitoba and Western Land Co., of which Mr. Bettes, a former witness, before the Commission, is managing director. This company sold the so-called "Carrol River Lands" to the Un-ion Trust, Pritchard also being impli-cated.

Mr. Campbell was asked what he had a say with regard to the Pritchard vidence, in which he figured exten-

"Mr. Pritchard's statements in many "Mr. Pritchard's statements in many particulars are untrue." said Mr. Campbell. "On August, 1903, my partner, Mr. Crawford, died suddenly. During September I was wholly in charge, and had a great deal of work. On Oct. 1 I fell ill, and was in bed the greater part of the month. As that was the time Pritchard spoke of our dealings, much of it could not have occurred.

"As for what Pritchard said about "As for what Pritchard said about my advising him to give me \$1,000 of his commission on the lands, I say it is absolutely untrue. I did not sign the agreement with the Union Trust Co., although, as president of my company, I should naturally have done so. It was signed by Mr. Bettes as managing director. I was not around." "He says he handed me telegrams or letters from Mr. Foster. I never saw a telegram or a letter from Mr. Foster. It is absolutely untrue."






