New York, June 14.—The collapse of a temporary bridge on the second floor of the sky-scraper at Cortlandt and Church streets caused the death of one man and the serious injury of three others. The police charge that the accident was due to gross negligence on the part of employes of the contractors, and the foreman of the cement gang was arrested charged with homicide. The dead man was James Pringle, 28 years old.

LORD'S DAY ACT IN YUKON.

Decision By Deputy Minister of Justice Causes Consternation.

Ottawa, June 14.—The Department of Justice has decided that the Lord's Day Act is applicable to the Yukon Territory, and that it is the duty of the officers of the law to enforce it.

the officers of the law to enforce it.

For some time the opinion had been prevalent in the Yukon that the act could not be applied, inasmuch as its enforcement is entrusted to the "Attorney-General of the province," and the Yukon not being a province or having an Attorney-General, the territory would be exempt.

The Deputy Minister of Justice pointed out, however, that under the interpretation Act the Northwest Territories and the Yukon are specified as provinces, the Attorney-General, for whom is the Attorney-General of the Dominion.

There is consternation in Dawson over this decision, as it is contended that with the short summer season it will entail severe loss upon the mining and navigation interests to suspend work on Sunday.

Aged Lady Suicides.

Stratford, June 14.—Mrs. Patterson, aged about 70, drowned herself in the river near Victoria Park yesterday afternoon. Her hat and cape were noticed on the bank, and on search being made the body was found in shallow water. It is believed that she was in a state of temporary insanity when she committed the rash act.

The body was discovered while the river was being dragged for another person, Samuel Rankin, Norman street, who disappeared at two o'clock yesterday morning, and it was believed that he had drowned himself. He has not yet been found.

Late last night the body of Samuel Rankin was found by a party of searchers, in the river, near the house of refuge. He had committed suicide while brooding over financial difficulties. He was about 60 years of age and married, but with no family. He was a brother of the late Joseph Rankin, killed in the Guelph wreck.

Firemen Start Blazes.

Berlin, June 14.—A series of 43 fires in Siebenlehn, Saxony, extending from 1896 to 1906, by which 63 houses were burned, has been traced to the volunteer fire brigade there.

The firemen used to be periodically rewarded for heroic conduct in extinguishing fires which they themselves had started.

Shot Man In Wife's Company.
Columbus, Miss., June 14.—At Carrollton, Jickens County, F. B. Therou, a lumber dealer, was shot and killed by John Parker, aged 30, a prominent business man.
Therou and Parker's wife were met on the road near Carrollton by Parker, who immediately began shooting.

Killed by Foul Tip.
Binghamton, N. Y., June 14.—Albert Sheets died at the Lestershire Hospital Wednesday night, as a result of being struck with a foul tip while playing ball. Sheets was at bat and struck at a ball that glanced from his bat, and striking him on the head, fractured his skull. He lived 24 hours.

Laborer Badly Scalded.

Ottawa, June 14.—The Anglican Church, as represented by the syned of the Diocese of Ottawa, does not care to identify itself with a campaign against immorality and corruption in politics. At least, this seems to be the reason why a resolution proposed by G. C. Smith of Cornwall, and seconded by Dr. A. A. Weagant of Ottawa, was shelved without a vote yesterday.

The resolution read: "That the syned of the Diocese of Ottawa, now in session, deplores the immorality and corruption generally which recent revelations have shown to prevail in high places in our country, and considers it to be necessary to the well-being of the rising generation that the church in this diocese should make its vaice heard in condemnation of such conditions. With this end in view, the synod respectfully suggests that the lord bishop be requested to confer with the clergy under his charge as to the expediency of expressing the church's disapproval in their several parishes by sermon or otherwise, and that the bishop, in his wisdom, be respectfully asked to issue a pastoral letter in this matter."

The motion was read on Wednesday and laid aside. Mr. Smith had to leave early for Cornwall, and placed it in other hands, but taking advan-

leave early for Cornwall, and placed it in other hands, but taking advantge of his absence yesterday the synod wound up its business without calling the resolution for consideration.

THE WATER SERVICE.

The citizens generally, and especially those who are patrons of the Waterworks, and who take a pride in the possession of well kept and beautiful lawns and grounds, are much interested in the recent decision of the Waterworks Board forcing all water users to instal' meters for lawn services.

On Thursday The Planet pointed out that this action is a great injustice to many users of water who are living up to the law, and who are doing a great deal towards beautifying and improving the city. It was suggested that some other course of action might be taken which would put a stop to the present waste of water-which is the cause of the Commissioners' new regulation-and which would not come as such a hardship to the people who are entirely innocent of any wrong-doing.

### THE SNOW BUNTING.

A Feathered Songster of the Arctic's

Treeless Wastes One of the most interesting of arctic birds is the snow bunting or polar singing bird. A native of Spitzbergen and Neva Zembia, its short, agreeable notes sound, doubly sweet when heard in these treeless wastes. The birds build their nests in the mountain clefts or under large rocks, lining them with feathers and down. In winter time their plumage is warm and abundant and especially fits them for the rigor of an arctic winter. During the breeding season and summer they live en-tirely on insects, particularly gnats, while in winter they subsist on moss, roots and seeds. Some winters less rigorous than others they are in abun-dance, but at times famine compels them to seek a more favorable climate, and they are then seldom found until and they are then seldom found until they invariably reappear toward spring. These buntings are distinguished by a long claw on their hind toe, a struc-ture which really enables them to run about with ease on the soft snow. 

MAN'S GREATEST SERVICES ARE SOON FORGOTTEN.

LESSONS FROM LIFE OF JOSEPH

Los Angeles, Cal., June 9.—That worldly fame and repute are evanescent and that even the greatest services one can render to his fellow men are apt soon to be forgotten is the lesson of this sermon. The text is Exodus i, 8, "Now there arose up a new king over Egypt which knew not Joseph."

If there is any country which preeminently built its monuments to endure as long as the world lasts that land is ancient Egypt. When the Egyptians planned a monument to commemorate a victory or the glories of their kings or national heroes they seemed to say, "We will erect this monument out of such massive stones that the foundations of the earth shall have to be moved before they are rocked down." These graves, like those of the "tombs of the kings," were excavated from the sides of the mountains themselves. To break them down the iconoclast must rip open the earth and tear down the foundations of the hills and destroy the unbroken rocks which have never been disturbed since the Divine Mason mortared them in at their laying. Yet there is a strange irony in the fact that, although the monuments remain, the memory of the men they were intended to immortalize has perished. Explorers can only guess at the purpose for which some of those monuments were raised. The modern Egyptian cannot tell you the meaning of the Sphinx; he cannot tell you why the pyramids were built, and he has to ask the modern German or Frenchman or Englishman what is the meaning of the inscriptions on the walls. The great pharaohs of the distant past are completely forgotten by the people of the country over which they ruled.

But there is another reason why those Egyptians ceased to honor the name of Joseph. The disasters which flowed from the stay of his people in Egypt were so overwhelming that Joseph's services were forgotten. They could not mention his name unless at the same time they recalled the calamities his descendants had brought upon their kingdom. Those Hebrews who were the descendants of Joseph and his brethren were like a small tribe of Indians called the Aztecs, which settled in Mexico. They multiplied rapidly in numbers until they overran and captured the whole land of what is now called modern Mexico. So was it with the children of Israel in Egypt. They were multiplying so fast that they threatened to overturn the throne of the pharaohs.

"Joseph? Who was Joseph?" I hear some of the Egyptians ask. "Oh, I know," some one answers. "He is that Hebrew who was captured by a band of roving Ishmaelites and brought into this country and sold as a slave about 200 years ago, under one of the shepherd kings called Aphobis. Then the story goes that he interpreted some crazy dream of the king and was appointed prime ministers. Then he sent to his old home in Canaan and their wives and children. And their descendants multiplied until they have become as numerous as the Hebrews we have with us to-day." "What!

a man or a woman could hide a multitude of sins. He did not believe that as soon as married men or married women became tired of their marital partners they had a right to turn their backs upon each other as one might throw away a bouquet of withered flowers in order to seek some new wild flowers. But Joseph was more than morally pure. He was financially clean as well. No tainted money stuck to the palms of his hands. There is many a man who is morally pure in his home and good to his family who is a thief and a robber and who will cheat every one he can fleece in a financial way. "Boss" Tweed, the biggest political thief New York city ever produced,

was a devoted family man. The greatest gambler and dive keeper of New York, a man who made millions of dollars out of his dema of infamy and who spent some years in the penitentiary, loved his family with a passionate love. Yes, Joseph was politically clean as well as morally pure When he gathered up the tenth part of all the grain of Egypt during the seven years of plenty he stored it all in the public granaries. And when the seven years of want came he sold it all back to the people. Not one dishonest coin stuck to his fingers. Thus, because he was honest and made his deputies honest, the dishonest officials hated him and tried to forget his existence. And one of the surest signs that you are never and

So is it with every faithful servant of God. Though the world forgets his services, though his very name sinks into oblivion, his record is written in the book of God's remembrance, and at the resurrecton he will stand among the people of God.



It says: "The outrage demonstrates the impotency of the California authorities to protect our compatriots. Now is no time to rest assured on the stereotyped diplomatic assurance of the Washington Government. Only two weeks after a positive

assurance of the Washington Government. Only two weeks after a positive declaration to take preventive measures to safeguard Japanese rights comes the Berkeley outrage. That the outrages are limited to California is not sufficient explanation."

Had Direct Communication.

Honolulu, June 14.—United States Commissioner of Immigration Sargent has instructed the local immigration officers to continue the careful inspection of Japanese immigrants, but to discontinue photographing and to handle diplomatically all questions that may arise.

The local Federal officers are alleged to have discovered that members of the Japanese naval station here have been communicated with directly by their home Government, and not through the Japanese Consul.




