

## TO PERSONS INTENDING TO EMIGRATE TO CANADA.

In Lower Canada there is only a small duty levied at the Custom Hoase on Imports, whilst in the United States the Taxes vary from one to eighteen per cent. on the value of all property, including in some States, Morchaudise and Mechanics' Tools, Stock in Trade, and Book Debts, &c. Civil and religious liberty are enjoyed in the fullest manner in Canada. Freedom founded on the most liberal acceptation of the British Constitution pervades the land.


