SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in nitoba, Saskatchevan or Alberta. licant must appear in person at the Do
ilinion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency fo
he district. Entry by proxy may b
inde at any Dominion Lands Agency (but
of Sub-Agency), or contain conditions made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain/conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may presempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre


