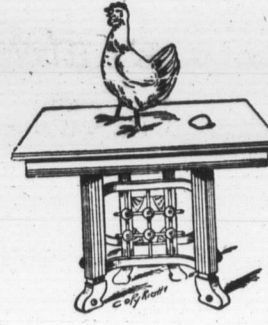

The Wingham Mob at the Bar
of Justice.

Wingham, Ont., April 2.-The town
was alive with excitement this morn-
ing, the occasion being the trial of five
men for the murder of J. G. Flewelling
on the night of March 31. The court room
would hold only a small portion of
those who wished to hear this inter-
esting case.

The prisoners, Messrs. Harrison,
Phillips, Flannigan, and Montague,
were escorted to the court room by
Constable Thomas W. Gentry. He
before leaving the Brunswick
Hotel the married men were allowed
to have an interview with their wives.
All the men seemed to be in good spir-
its with the exception of Philip, who
has not fully recovered from his faint-
ing fit of last night.

Magistrate Seeger occupied the
bench, and Mr. E. Lewis watched the
case. The first witness called was
stone ably a friend of the prisoners. Ev-
ery possible argument was used on
their behalf, and Mr. Seeger succeeded
in having Flannigan's name struck
off the list.

George Morrison was held as a Crown
witness, although not a party to the
crime, and was called first. He gave his
evidence in a straightforward manner,

MUST STAND TRIAL

The Arch-Burglar Said to Have Ac-
knowledged Killing 20 People.

New York, April 5.-A special from
Philadelphia to the World says: H. H.
Holmes, the greatest murderer of mod-
ern times, has made a confession. It
is told how and why he put to death
no less than 20 men, women and chil-
dren. He gives all the facts. He
describes the calm and cool way he
murdered as he murdered. He neglects
no details. He even gives an ac-
count of six murders which he ob-
served, but was prevented from carrying
out.

It was well known that he put 11
persons on the world. So, when his
confession is printed, there will be
accounts of the violent death of
people whose names are not known
and their friends have hitherto been
unexplained. He describes in detail
the murder of the Williams sisters, of
Quinn, the janitor of the Castle, of
the murder for which he is to hang,
and of the Powell children.

ALL WHEELS MUST PAY DUTY.
Canadian Customs Officers at Windsor
are entering the new rule.

Windsor, April 5.-The new rule re-
quiring American bicyclists to deposit
the amount of 50 cents for the ex-
istence of their wheels upon en-
tering Canada, the duty to be re-
turned when they take the wheels
back, is to be enforced even more
strictly than was at first expected.

shal J. P. Lively was murdered by out-
laws while attempting to arrest horse
thieves in the hills 30 miles southwest
of Newark yesterday.

Man Killed by a Train.
Chicago, April 5.-Edward Fielding,
brigadier division of the Salva-
tion Army, and with the exception of
Commissioner Booth-Tucker the most
prominent officer in the forces in Am-
erica, has resigned his commission and
will join the forces of Illinoian
booth's volunteers. The majority of
his staff officers will go with him.

The Blow Up.
Antwerp, April 5.-The boilers of the
tug Virginia, flying today when the
vessel was near Termonde, the
captain escaped, but the crew of four
men were killed. The explosion caused
the sinking of the tug and the drown-
ing of eight persons who were aboard
of it.

Terrible Conflagration.
Madrid, April 5.-A despatch from
Manila says that the town of Nani-
on the west coast of Luzon, 110 miles
northwest of Manila, has been almost
entirely destroyed by a fire which
burned for 24 hours, and 2,000 persons
were rendered homeless.

been appointed a State Commissioner
of Arrivals.

Hon. Edward Blake was seized with
sudden illness in the House of Com-
mons at London on Monday, and died
on a holiday trip.

The marriage of Gen. Harrison and

on Monday. The ceremony was very
quiet, not more than twenty-five guests
having been invited.

THE WORK OF FRIENDS.

A Diabolical Attempt to Wreck
a C.P.R. Train.

Smith's Falls, Ont., April 4.-One of
the most diabolical attempts at train
wrecking in the history of this coun-
try was that which was made last
night, but which fortunately did not
result as seriously as it might have.

When the C. P. R. express, which
left Toronto at 9 o'clock on Friday
night, was a few miles west of the
town of Perth, the baggage, ex-
press and two passenger cars left the
track. There were a large number of
passengers on board, and all were
shaken up. The train was stopped
at Smith's Falls, where the engine
and two passenger cars were badly
wrecked, and while the train was
being repaired, the greater number of
them carried bruises and cuts as the
result of the collision.

Investigation showed that the bolts
which held the engine to the rails
were loose, and that the rails were
spread. The train was going at the
rate of 25 miles an hour, and had not
the engine kept the rails the loss of
life would have been terrible. The
train was in charge of Conductor
Grant, with Engineer Smith at the en-
gine and wire to Smith's Falls for
assistance. Two men went up on
a special to attend to the wounded.

The special returned at about 11
o'clock this morning with all the
passengers, postal matter, etc.
The wreckage is being cleared away as
fast as possible.

VALUABLE HORSES DESTROYED.
Altona, Ontario, April 5.-The engine
of the Grand Trunk last night destroyed
the stables which were owned by J. H.
Horne, and the loss of valuable horses
was estimated at \$10,000. The engine
of an oil house in one of the clearest
places in the town, and the engine

Horne's stables, most of which arrived
here last Thursday. Among those

Blue Bird, the best of the kind in
