Acadia University.
(From "The Bay East.")
Acadia University is located in Wolfville, on the main line of the Dominion Atlantic Railway, at the eastern end of the famous Cornwallis and Annapolis Valley. The situation, on an elevation overlooking the valley Minas Basin, and in full view of Cape Blomidon, is of unsurpassed beauty. A circle drawn with a radius of 125 miles from Wolfville as a centre will include over two-thirds of the population of the Maritime Provinces. Excellent railroads and steamship service make Wolfville very easy of access. We are informed by the historians of Acadia, that Wolfville is selected as the site of the College "both on account of the natural beauty of the situation and its central position." Passing years have only made the wisdom of the selection more and more manifest. Wolfville is a thoroughly up-to-date town, with a sewerage system, water works and electric lights, and is in every way one of the most progressive communities in eastern Canada.

The buildings, eight in all, are well equipped for educational work. They comprise the main College Building, Carnegie Science Hall, Chipman Hall, Gymnasium, Acadia Ladies' Seminary, Horton Academy Home, E. W. Young Manual Training Hall, and the College Women's Residence. The most recent of these, the Carnegie Science Hall, erected in 1909, at a cost of \$35,000.00, is a thoroughly up-to-date in arrangement and equipment. Beauty and attractiveness are combined with utility and stability. This equipment easily takes rank with the best in the Maritime Provinces.

To the sturdy Loyalist stock was principally due the earliest efforts for the promotion of higher education in the country now known as the Maritime Provinces of Canada. Largely as a result of this influence King's College was established, by members of the Church of England, at Windsor, in 1780, receiving in 1802, a Royal Charter and an annual grant of £1,000.00. During the early years of her history the restrictive character of the Constitution of King's College prevented the members of other religious denominations from enjoying her advantages, thus compelling the various religious bodies to make plans for colleges of their own. The restrictive tests above referred to were removed many years ago and are only mentioned here as accounting in some degree for the separate educational work of the various dissenting bodies.

Acadia University was founded by the Baptist Educational Society in 1845. In 1869, Rev. T. Trotter, D. D., was appointed president. This amount provided: (1) Payment of all debts; (2) Thorough repairs for all the buildings; (3) A

1838, under the name of Queen's College. Their ancestors in New England had long been advocates of higher education. Harvard, Yale, and Brown Universities were outstanding evidences of this fact. With great wisdom, faith and vision these noble men, Rev. Edward Manning, Rev. C. Tupper, Rev. I. E. Bill, Rev. J. Johnston, under the powerful leadership of Rev. E. A. Crawley, and many others to whom we now refer as the fathers, overcame obstacles almost insurmountable, and laid solid foundations for these progressive institutions of the present day.
Rev. John Pryor, D. D., the first president, continued in office until 1851. During his incumbency a college building was erected of suitable size and ample accommodations. It was a time when people were poor and money was scarce. Persons without money were invited to contribute such goods as they could spare, and other goods from their stores. Farmers went into the forests to hew out the frame and provide building material. The women and girls provided articles of knitting and sewing. Donations of every sort were welcomed. Whatever could not be used in the building was turned into money. From the proceeds of such

Our Vanishing Oyster Supply.

When eating oysters did you ever wonder where they were grown? The chances are even that they came from the United States. Last year Canada paid out over \$350,000 for foreign-grown oysters that she could have easily produced herself. In addition to this, the consumer had to pay over \$43,000 duty on them. Although the natural conditions for growing oysters in the Maritime Provinces are excellent, the annual production has been steadily decreasing. In 1882, there were 64,646 barrels harvested, while in 1907 the production was only 27,299 barrels. This decrease in price of 40 per cent. in the past twenty years, which, needless to say, has greatly stimulated the efforts of the fishermen.

We may well ask why Canada is committing the economic blunder of importing a product that she could produce herself. The reason, in this case, is that a dispute over jurisdiction between the Dominion and the Provincial Governments has left the fishermen in such a state of uncertainty that he does not care to invest his capital in the artificial cultivation of oysters. The experience of other countries goes to show that the oyster industry can only be put on a permanent basis by means of oyster farms maintained by private individuals. Indeed, in the United States \$10,000,000 worth of the \$18,000,000 worth of oysters produced annually is derived from private culture. As the jurisdictional dispute now stands as a result of a decision by the Imperial Privy Council in 1898, the Provinces own the fore-shore on which the oysters are grown, while the Dominion has the right to impose restrictive regulations such as close seasons and the kind of fishing gear that may be used, which could virtually render the privilege of the right to fish worthless. By the same decision it was held that both the Dominion and the Provinces concerned had the right to tax the oyster culturist. Unless the governments concerned can soon arrive at a compromise, definitely settling matters of jurisdiction so that the oyster farmer will be enabled to engage in artificial propagation, the oyster beds will be fished out. Unrestricted fishing stimulated by high prices will now speedily complete the depletion of this valuable natural resource unless private cultivation can be induced.

Mt. Allison Institutions.

At Sackville, N. B., almost at the very centre of the Maritime Provinces, are the Mount Allison Institutions, whose students make up one of the largest educational communities in Canada—save, of course, those communities in some of the bigger cities. The institutions include the University, the Ladies' College and the Academy. In to-day's paper will be found the advertisements which tell something of the splendid work which these schools are doing.

At the University courses are given in Arts, Engineering and Theology. Various special and honor courses are also given as well as an advanced course in Finance and Commerce. In the Engineering Faculty a two years' course is given and on completing it students are admitted without further examination to the third year at McGill and other great engineering schools. Students securing the Engineering courses in this way are able to do so at much lower cost than by taking all four years of their work at one of the larger technical colleges. The University has one of the finest stone Residences in Canada, and in this building nearly all the male students make their home and thus secure the great benefit which comes from being members of one large 'home' community. The University offers students a number of prizes. This year among other prizes, are five Entrance Bursaries to the value of \$75 each. Full information regarding all prizes is found in the University calendar which will be sent free on application to Rev. Dr. Borden, Sackville.

The Ladies' College, which is the largest residential Ladies' College in the Dominion, includes not only the Literary Department but the Conservatory of Music, the Massey-Treble School of Household Science, and the School of Fine Arts. It provides Literary and Household Science courses; instruction in Painting, Drawing, Metal Work, Modelling, Leather and Piano, Pipe Organ, Violin and Voice. The Art School, with the Owens Art Gallery and a magnificent collection of valuable paintings, is under the direction of a member of the Royal Canadian Academy who is also an exhibitor in salons across the water. He is assisted by talented and trained teachers. The Conservatory of Music is under the directorship of an English professor who has associated with him as teachers ladies and gentlemen most of whom have been trained abroad. The staff of the college includes over twenty teachers and four occasional lecturers. At this institution, too, a number of prizes are offered. A calendar will be sent free on application to Rev. Dr. Campbell.

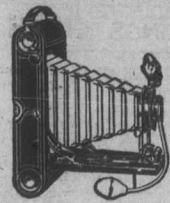

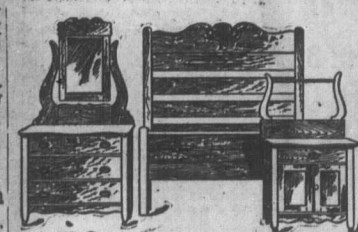

Town Council.

The regular meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with the Mayor and all the Councillors present. Reports were presented by the Finance, Water, License and Police committees.

The Finance Committee reported receipts during July \$17,42 and expenditures \$878.41. The debit balance at the bank July 31st was \$1736.57.

A letter was read from the Town Clerk requesting a vacation of two months in the autumn with the privilege of three months extra leave of absence if satisfactory substitute can be provided. In view of the faithful service rendered in the past by the clerk this request was granted.

On the nomination of the clerk it was resolved that Frederick A. Giddwell be appointed Deputy Clerk for one year from date. The Mayor, Recorder and all the members of the Council were appointed delegates to attend the annual convention of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities at Halifax on August 21st and 24th, 1911.

The matter of providing regulation governing the construction of buildings in town, particularly on Main street, was brought up by the Mayor and discussed by different Councillors and finally referred to the Streets Committee to prepare a by-law governing same. Messrs. A. W. Allen & Son, the contractors for the new Baptist church, were granted permission to place building material upon the east sidewalk of Highland avenue, subject to the direction of the Streets committee, providing adequate protection is afforded pedestrians.

The matter of providing convenient accommodation for the Fire Department and town property generally was brought up by Councillor Sleep and spoken to by other members of the board. After considerable discussion it was resolved that the Streets and Public Property Com. be empowered to purchase the property on the corner of Central avenue and Front St., known as the Weatherby property, for a fire station and place to keep the apparatus of the town, and for other town purposes.

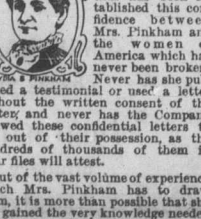
