





gistered to get on the list, the main interest of the revision probably will centre in the registration of women. The qualification, broadly speaking, for both men and women is British citizenship, the legal age of twenty-one years, a year's residence in Canada and at least two months' residence in the district for which registration is desired. British citizenship, of course, includes those born in Canada or elsewhere in the King's dominions or on a British ship, or who was born elsewhere of a father who was a British subject by birth or naturalization. Its also includes those grant ed naturalization. Among those who cannot vote are women who have become British subjects by birth or naturalization. It also includes those granted naturalize tion. Among those who cannot vote are women who have become British subjects by reason of having become the wives of British subjects and who were not born on the North American continent and who were not entitled to a vote at any time prior to June 4, 1921, and who have not obtained a certificate from a judge. This clause excepts from the disqualified, the wives, sisters and others of members of the Canadian and British military and naval forces given the vote under the 1917
