





Will Erect Wireless Station Here.

Two of Signor Marconi's wireless experts who came with him here left by the express last evening. They go to Glace Bay to bring down material for the erection of a temporary wireless station out at the South Battery and will return in a short time to begin work on it. Later a permanen station will be built here, and the men said to friends here yesterday that the best results ever obtained in wireless telegraphy since its inception were had by Signor Marconi while he conducted tests near the Light House last week. 
