

## The Evening Chit-Chat

"Oh yes, she's awfully stuck up. She's an Episcopalian and you know they are apt to be pretty nice feeling."

"Do you know they actually sent out of town for a minister for the funeral because all the ministers except the Methodist were away and they wouldn't have a Methodist minister. You know they are Orthodox and they look down on the Methodists. But I can tell you minister they ever had."

Mr. B. is a good deal better than any "There goes Mrs. L. down to their Church supper. Isn't she all dressed up. The Methodists do make the biggest fuss about their suppers and I hear they don't have half enough to eat."

That neighbors and friends should differ in some non-essentials of religious opinion, to build several different churches in one neighborhood in which to worship the same essential God, will always be an incomprehensible thing to me. But that they should go even further and that the upholders of one form of worship should be filled with petty jealousies and indulge in childish criticism of the upholders of another, while all the time both are subscribing to a religion whose chief tenet is brotherly and neighborly love is a little more than incomprehensible. It is mighty close to ridiculous.

And yet I challenge you. Are not the above utterances which I have quoted thoroughly characteristic remarks? Haven't you yourself heard their prototypes again and again?

I once went to church very tired and very restless longing for a service that should bring me peace and the devotional mood. As it happened the minister that day had just returned from a trip to a convention of members of his sect and he preached on what the Methodists—I say Methodists because it wasn't—had done in the past year, how much more they had done than any other sect and how fine it was to be a Methodist instead of any other less desirable kind of a believer.

I assure you that I left that Church in scarcely more devotional and peaceful mood than that in which I entered it.

What difference does it make whether you are an "—ist" or an "—ox" or an "—lan" so that you worship God in your heart and try to honor Him in your life, and love your neighbor?

I can't see how a minister could point out and exalt in barriers between workers for the same cause. I should think he would ignore them as thoroughly as he could.

And I should most certainly think that the true Christian would do the same and think shame to himself if ever he caught himself having a thought of dislike or criticism or jealousy towards some other sect.

To say nothing of expressing such thoughts!

## Household Notes.

To banish the odor of paint, place a pan full of cold water in the room.

Toast water is a soothing and healing drink for sufferers from bronchitis.

Cook books should be covered with waxed paper to keep them in good condition.

Whiting mixed to a cream with tepid water is excellent for dirty, painted surfaces.

When sand cannot be had, bath brick can be used to scrub wooden articles, tables, etc.

In lime water localities, keep an oyster shell in your teakettle to receive the lime deposits.

Sponging with hot vinegar will remove an objectionable shine from woollen garments.

Olive oil, slightly warmed, is excellent as a means of softening the skin around the nails.

To prevent wooden nails or tubs from shrinking when not in use, paint them over with glycerine.

Overeating of food is very often counteracted by using a teaspoonful of vinegar and one of sugar.

Cornmeal dough mixed with borax, scattered about in kitchen corners, will cause insects to disappear.

To bake potatoes quickly, place

them close together in the oven and cover with an inverted pie plate.

Vanilla extract should be kept in a very dark place, as it is apt to lose its strength when exposed to the light.

Finger marks and stains on porcelain, wood and window panes can be easily removed with coal oil on a clean cloth.

Dish cloths should be boiled every day in water to which has been added washing soda or a teaspoonful of kerosene oil.

To drive away red ants place sprigs of parsley wherever the ants are noticed. It should be renewed twice a week.

When too busy to bundle a small cut on the end of a finger, put a bit of clean lint upon it and then put on a thimble.

If fish are fried on the pancake griddle they will not stick and can be taken up without danger of them falling to pieces.

If a piece of woollen material is scorched, rub the spot with soft bread. When the scorch disappears, follow with a soft brush.

Not everyone knows that tan shoes can be dyed black. The cost is small and the result is that the shoes will serve through the winter.

If a sweater needs washing, try drying it on a coat hanger. It will not be so liable to stretch and will keep its shape much better.

A combination of onion juice and rum is a homely tonic for falling hair. Let two large onions remain overnight in a pint of the spirit.

A flannel dipped in spirits of ammonia is very good for removing the white spots on the dining room and kitchen table caused by wet dishes.

Lay in a supply of gray flannel scrub cloths for floors and cheese-cloth bags to slip on brooms and brushes to wipe down walls and woodwork.

### Hard Hit.

Germany has been hard hit by her intervention in Morocco. She is now suffering from the worst financial panic she has experienced since 1900. A message to the Montreal Star last Tuesday states that:

"Something very like a panic swept over the Bourse yesterday, provoking a slump in a long list of leading industrial shares, including the coal and iron industry in Upper Silesia as among great banking institutions, such as the Dresdener bank.

The great mass of selling orders come from the provinces, and it was observed that the powerful banks did nothing to stem the movement."

The German Government has found it necessary to re-assure financiers and to issue official notices, "declaring fears of war are entirely unfounded," in order to stem the financial debacle.

The true inwardness of the situation in Germany may be seen by an illuminating statement which appeared in a publication on "The Stock Exchange," by Francis M. Hirst, Editor of The Economist, which was published, some months before the Agadir incident and therefore was in no way prompted by the present dispute. The author is discussing the annual surplus wealth and in reference to that of the latter country, he states "its annual surplus is usually absorbed by the requirements of the Imperial and State Governments and of the municipalities, whose debts have been increasing at a prodigious rate, as well as by the demands of a trade which is largely carried on in credit.

If the mere rumors of war is shaking German financial credit so greatly, her Government will hardly dare to face actual hostilities.

### Died at Change Islands

Mr. Justinian Dowell, J.P., died at Change Islands, on Monday, Sept. 4th. Deceased who was born in England, was Lay Reader and School Teacher at Moreton's Harbor and Change Islands for about 25 years. He was also Postmaster and Preventive Officer in recent years. He was a highly respected citizen, and had attained his 74th year. The funeral took place at the C. of E. Cemetery, at Change Islands last Wednesday.

### A Disgraceful Scene

At Bay Roberts Railway Station. On Monday night the 4th, inst., quite a few of our Bay Roberts young men wended their way to the Station to hear the news as the express was due from St. John's about 9 p.m. As is usual while waiting for the train various things were spoken of, but the principal topic of conversation was the action of Piccott and Crosbie on the previous Sunday in coming here to engage men to go to St. John's to act this part of strike breakers by working on Crosbie's wharf in the place of union men. Of the men gathered at the station some freely expressed their opinion, (can we not as British subjects do so?), condemning Piccott for the part he had played, first in desecrating the Sabbath day by rushing about Water Street in Crosbie's automobile with his hooting and tooting, during the time when our people were assembled at the various churches attending service, and secondly, by taking those men over to St. John's, placing them in a position of extreme peril, viz., that of strike breakers. During the discussion of the affair the Junior partner of the Reliable Cash Store, one of Piccott's heeled, became so angry as to actually lose his head, and swore like a trooper, venting all his wrath upon the "Little Grocer," because he, the little grocer, had protested against Piccott's action. In fact had the constable been there he should have been arrested. A poor hard working fisherman was arrested last spring for not saying half so much, but our friend George need not worry or lose his head in trying to fight Piccott's battles, as his political doom is sealed for it is a well known fact that Piccott has been weighed in the balance and found wanting. I would say, Mr. Editor, that I heartily endorse all that People's Party man from Spandard's Bay said, except his statement concerning Seymour, on that point he was misinformed, for Seymour does not stand well in his district generally, Bay Roberts in particular, although he was elected last election, but the hope of his being returned again is hopelessly despaired of by his few most ardent supporters.

In a frenzied scene that lasted fifteen minutes, backers of George Hackenschmidt, the "Russian Lion," rushed the lobby of the Morrison Hotel, where Frank A. Gotch is staying, and bet \$15,000 that Hackenschmidt would beat the Iowa wonder.

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The Preliminary Bout. An enormous crowd of wrestling enthusiasts yelled with delight when

Charlie Postle "the Butcher-boy" and Young Sampson, of New York, appeared in the opening preliminary catch-as-catch-can, best two in three falls.

The men weighed 156 and 158 pounds respectively. The good-natured gathering increased in proportion every minute. It was admitted on all sides that hereafter wrestling events or any other similar contests ought to be held in the open air whenever possible.

The weather proved delightful. It is one of those rare September afternoons, sunny, yet cool, for which Chicago is famous. Postle won the first preliminary in straight falls, a scissors-arm hold in 15 minutes and a croch and half Nelson in 15 minutes.

In the second preliminary, Joe Rogers, who wrestled Hackenschmidt in London and gave him a tough fight, engaged Frank Erman, another well-known heavy weight.

Rogers took the bout with a body scissors and half Nelson in 8.13.

Men in the Ring. Frank A. Gotch entered the ring a few seconds before Hackenschmidt. He looked trained to the minute, and the crowd gave him an ovation as he waved his hand to Mrs. Gotch in the stand, who returned the salutation. Mrs. Gotch expressed entire confidence in the outcome.

Hackenschmidt was greeted with tremendous cheering as he came through the passage from his dressing-room and crawled through the ropes at 3 p.m.

The big Russian bowed to right and left, and as he stripped like Goliath, the crowd yelled again. Hackenschmidt was brown as a berry, and he grinned good-naturedly at the generous reception given him.
