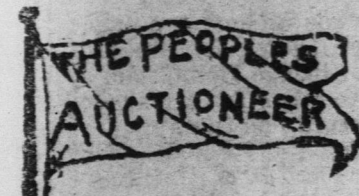

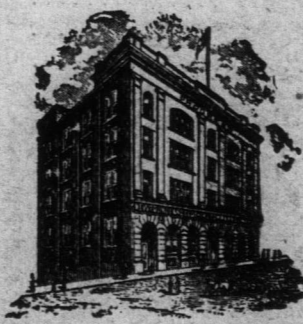

Washington Was the Godfather of Aviation in America.

Apparently George Washington was not only the Father of His Country, but also something like the godfather of aviation in America. At any rate, he wrote a letter for one M. Blanchard, who made the first balloon ascension in this country at Philadelphia in 1793. The letter reprinted in St. Nicholas reads:

"George Washington, president of the United States of America. To all whom these presents shall come:

"The bearer hereof, Mr. Blanchard, a citizen of France, proposing to ascend in a balloon from the city of Philadelphia, at 10 o'clock a.m. this day, to pass in such direction and to descend in such place as circumstances may render most convenient—

"These are, therefore, to recommend to all citizens of the United States, and others, that in the passage, descent, return or journeying elsewhere they oppose no hindrance or molestation to the said Mr. Blanchard, and that, on the contrary, they receive and aid him with that humanity and good will which may render honor to their country and justice to an individual so distinguished by his efforts to establish and advance an art in order to make it useful to mankind in general.

"Given under my hand and seal, at the city of Philadelphia, this ninth day of January, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, and of the Independence of America the seventeenth.

"GEORGE WASHINGTON."

For instance he has published the views of Sir Robert Bond and Mr. Kent on the Morris Loan Bill, Railway Branch Contract, etc., as set forth in their speeches delivered in the House of Assembly. Does this publication commit Mr. Coaker to these views. If so, his views and opinions must be even stranger and more accommodating than even the public at large suspect. But Mr. Coaker is not satisfied with shameless effrontery; he resorts to reckless falsehood and has the daring to assert that the writer of the West Coast letter is a candidate for a Western District. On the face of it this is a matter of which he has no knowledge and which is known only to the Advocate Office. They have a record of it and they tell us that the writer is not a candidate or expecting to be a candidate, or even prominent in politics. But even supposing the writer was a candidate and held these views, is not Mr. Donald Morison a Morris candidate? Is he not prominent in the Morris Party? Is he not one of the chiefs of the Morris-Morison combination? Is he not Minister of Justice, a member of the Executive,

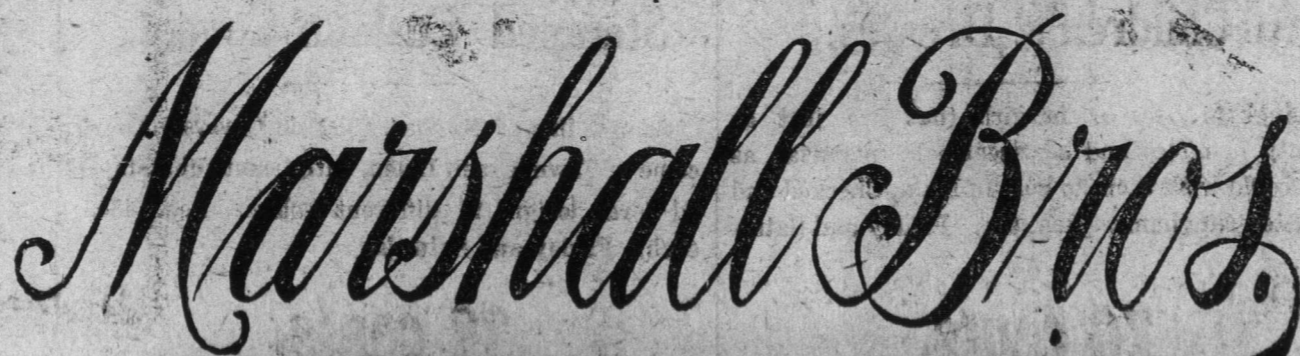

## Morris and the Dredge.

### Is It Wanted in the West End-- People Can See.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir—None of the people of this District begrudge the people of the other Districts the use of the dredge, especially where it is badly needed for their convenience, and I hope where it is at present it will do the work assigned to it to the satisfaction of all concerned. But the point I want to make is this. In the spring of early autumn months thousands of fishermen flock to St. John's and a large proportion of them come to this West End. Now, I say, and I challenge contradiction, that St. John's West is one of the most neglected Districts in this island.

Right Above Sowers and What They Vomit Forth and thousands in the West End purchase these fish. Must not the result be obvious? Are not the people sickening and dying by hundreds? Is not the dread White Plague on the increase in the West End? And is it not a fact that infant mortality is increasing? Can you poor people who inhabit the by-places of the West End all occupy mansions on Circular Road? The answer is evident. But our "popular Premier" would protect his own and is a stickler for pure air. Now then what I want to say, Mr. Editor is this, that the reeking waterfront of the West End should have been first attended to by Morris and his dredge, and the danger of a plague in the West End obviated, then let the outports have the machine. Fishermen from every outport know that at low tide they cannot moor their craft at West End wharves, and often lose thereby owing to the filling of the coves with filth. Whose fault is it? I charge the Premier with it, and I would ask him what he is going to do about it. His skirts are clear. He need not send his child to Steer's Cove to inhale the exhalations from the worst form of decaying matter. I must and many like me. He lives as I said before, in the classic "Circular Road. He even disdains to live amongst the constituents who have been so long his faithful followers. But the tide is turned; the time the people of the most neglected District in the island are on the qui vive and the redoubtable Premier will get his come in November. There is no "gathering of the clans" for him now as there was four years ago. Ah, no Sir E. P. We have found you out, we West Enders, and you and the few left of you will have nice cool seats in Opposition when next Parliament opens. Yours with indignation, PUBLIUS.

And to Preserve the Health of our Own Citizens as Well as Visiting Fishermen.

I will assert that the dredge should have been first used in this very District represented by the Premier who so greatly abhors microbes (he sees many political ones) and who is lengthy, truth must be his excuse. Start at Bishop & Sons Cove on a hot day, at low tide, there the stench is unbearable, the Cove is filled with filth and employees on the firm's wharf have often gone sick in inhaling such an atmosphere. The effluvia effect, casual visitors often go away quickly and time and again the unfortunate workmen on the place have been nauseated with the reeking fumes arising from this silt and filth filled Cove. But I will take you to the danger spots, Steer's Cove and Monro's Cove. In both these places fish are sold.

### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

BERLIN, Aug. 28. The Berlin morning papers printed Wilson's message practically without comment. Only the Deutch Tageszeitung says it is moderate and peaceable says the inference from the words of forbearance that States is only waiting until roast cooked through.

MEXICO CITY, To-day. Without comment, Frederico Gamboa, Minister of Foreign Affairs, presented to the standing committee of the Mexican Congress last night all facts between Mexico and U. S. Congressmen, comprising the committee received the facts without comment. Gamboa insists that the negotiations are not entirely concluded, but should they be, it is probable soon the entire affair to be regarded as a closed incident. Many Mexicans believe the only bar to the acceptance of the propositions of second note was the insistence that Huerta should eliminate himself from the electorate contest. Their point is that this was impossible for him to do, since he is a Mexican citizen. If there should be further negotiations, it is practically certain they cannot be satisfactory concluded if this demand be insisted upon. The London morning papers, commenting on message, are not altogether sanguine as to the wisdom or success of Wilson's policy, but are agreed it is almost certain to lead to American intervention, therefore indicating a grave crisis has been reached. Express says Wilson is not a man to bluff such questions. From his stern explicit message it is clear, Mexico either must climb down or fight, if the former she admits American suzerainty, if the latter she may lose independence altogether. British has large interests, and much to lose by war, but it is difficult to understand how British sympathy could be otherwise bestowed than on us. The News says if only the European Powers do not stiffen Huerta's back, Wilson's policy may prove judicious. The Times asks why the Washington Government fails to take the simple effective course of following the European example and recognizing Huerta, and adds its difficult to resist a suspicion that by emphasizing personal objections to Huerta, the American Government is jeopardizing its best chance of assisting the country of which he is the effective ruler.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28. The great ship imperator was dark with all on board asleep, says the officers on the watch, when smoke ascended from provision room and was discovered by seaman on the deck watch. Almost at the same time cracking flames were heard in stern quarter. The alarm was sounded and the crew of the vessel was set in motion. Every compartment was or-

dered closed, except those which it was necessary to leave open for steering passengers. The ship's officers, and hundreds of the crew lined up in two columns along the route of safety guided the terror-stricken men and women to pier. When the ship was clear, the entire force turned three quarters of an hour they fought the fire with only the Emperor's own apparatus, then despairing of success, the Hoboken Dept. was notified and a general alarm sounded. In the first sharp skirmish with flames the second officer, Gofrecht, and seaman Stumpf were caught in withering flame and were cut off from the door by which they had entered. Their companions were driven back to the open air, although they stormed flames again and again. A wall of smoke kept them from rescuing Gofrecht and Stumpf. When the fire was checked their bodies were found and taken ashore. The Dining Saloon of the second cabin suffered great damage and the handsome saloon was a wreck when smoke cleared away. One thousand longshoremen employed by Hamburg-American line went on strike 24 hours before the vessel's arrival, and their places were filled by men from Brooklyn Docks. The strikers were told they would not be taken back. The officers of the liner said they believed the strike was in no way connected with the fire. Somebody's carelessness they thought was responsible.

BERLIN, To-day. Crown Prince Frederick William saved his sister-in-law, Princess August William, from serious injury in festivities here when the Kaiser came with his family to celebrate Prussian Dominion over the old Polish city. She had entered an auto outside the city hall, when the horses of one of the royal carriages bolted driving the carriage pole through the side of the automobile. The Crown Prince was standing beside the auto and saw the danger and grabbed Princess August William and dragged her to safety.

SOFIA, To-day. The Bulgarian Government, owing to the advance of the Turks west to Maritza river decided not to occupy Bolognisch for fear of a collision which would give the Turks an excuse to declare war.

### New Hotel.

Last night the hotel committee of the Board of Trade met and discussed the proposed building of a hotel here. Mr. W. G. Gosling presided. It was stated by Mr. Rosenbaum, of New York, who was present, that it was the intention to accommodate tourists, visitors, etc., in the new building. He could interest capitalists abroad in the project. At a future meeting the matter will be fully gone into.

## Sachetti Coming.

Star of Boston, Philadelphia-Chicago and Metropolitan Opera Companies in Grand Opera Festival.

M. Ueber Sachetti has been associated over since its opening with the Boston Opera House, and is now one of the favorite tenors of the Boston Opera Company. He is primo tenore of the Grand Opera Festival at St. John's on Sept. 8, 9 and 10, and is sure to prove a big attraction. For years he has been leading tenor on all of the Alice, Nelson tours—as early as 1906, he played Tonio to her Maria in "La Figlia del Reggimento," in the French Opera House in New Orleans.

Since then, M. Sacchetti has held the position of primo tenore with the Metropolitan Opera Company, in New York, the Philadelphia-Chicago Opera Company, and the Boston Opera Company. He was picked to originate the role of Dick Johnson in "The Girl of the Golden West," a role in which Caruso has since become famous. And of Sacchetti it can be said that he is the only tenor at all comparable in total quality to Caruso, but while Sacchetti's voice is fiercer and lighter and his dramatic ability greater, he is lacking in the great volume for which Caruso is unexcelled.

M. Sacchetti's most famous parts are the Duke in "Rigoletto," Turiddu in "Cavalleria Rusticana," the magnificent tenor role in "I Pagliacci," and that of Alfredo in "La Traviata." He also sings the tenor role in "Don Pasquale" with rare art—and it happens that those operas most loved by him were the ones which have been picked for the Grand Opera Festival.

## Correspondence.



Correspondence is a substitute for conversation which enables one man to call another a liar without having to have his lower lip sewed up immediately afterward. It is a popular method of communication, as a man can say things in a letter which would never occur to him in the presence of a shirt-sleeved foe with both fists doubled up.

There are three kinds of correspondence—letters, postcards and love letters. Letters are curt, peremptory epistles written on a typewriter without any regard for spelling or punctuation, and deal with everything from the price of linseed oil to the amount due on the pastor's salary. The postcard is a bolt-tailed imitation of a letter which is capable of expressing deep emotion, especially when accompanied by a picture of somebody making love with a great abandon. Husbands who are away from home prefer the postcard to any other form of correspondence, as there is not room enough to explain anything and all they are able to crowd on is directions for forwarding their mail.

The love letter is an added variety of correspondence which reaches the boiling point just prior to the wedding march and then cools off at the rate of 230,000 miles a minute. Few men can read a stalo love letter, written in the heyday of youth, without wanting to go out and kick a few shingles off the barn. If it were not for love letters, however, this world would be as devoid of hope as a Leap Year party attended by nobody but old maids and the janitor.

The correspondence school is an institution which teaches everything from setting a broken leg to threading a needle without squinting. It is a great incentive to independence, and makes men fearless of everything except their wives.

## Will Train Girls Years in Open Air.

Philadelphia, Aug. 20.—Bryn Mawr College is about to establish the day of the Superwoman. This fall the Phoebe Ann Thorne Open-Air Model School for Girls will give the students the first chance that has ever been offered by an educational institution in America for instruction that will tend to make girls physically perfect above everything else.

According to Mr. Carey Thomas, dean of the college, it will take eleven years to ascertain whether the plan is going to be a success. They will take 20 young girls as near perfection as physically they can get and ranging between ten and twelve years of age, and train them for several years in elementary subjects and bring them up as women should be educated.

The girls will be trained in the open air all the time, they will have all kinds of physical exercises and outdoor games, and when they leave Bryn Mawr they will have not only a perfect physical condition to aid them but they will have learned all the rudiments of English, Latin, French and German, to solve simple and original algebraic problems, to draw to model, to appreciate pictures, to interpret music by rhythmic movements and to express musical impressions by dancing.

At an age of 17 or 18 they then enter Bryn Mawr College to complete their classical education. The pupils in the open air school who has passed the best test after seven years' work will receive a \$2100 scholarship for her course at Bryn Mawr. She will receive not only free tuition, but all her expenses for four years.

The school will be housed in seven separate one-story class rooms, constructed of wood and glass. There they will live in the winter bundled in furs and warm clothing. These 20 girls will never breathe the air open class room except when they are housed and the four sides are so arranged as to be let down in pleasant weather. In cold weather they are to be clothed in Esquimaux suits.

Their hours in the classroom will be from 9 till 10.30 and after that they will spend all their time in the air.

## Funny Siamese Custom

They have a very funny fashion in Siam. When an inferior comes into the presence of a superior he throws himself upon the ground. Then the superior sends one of his attendants forward to see whether the prostrate man has been eating anything or has any offensive odor about him. 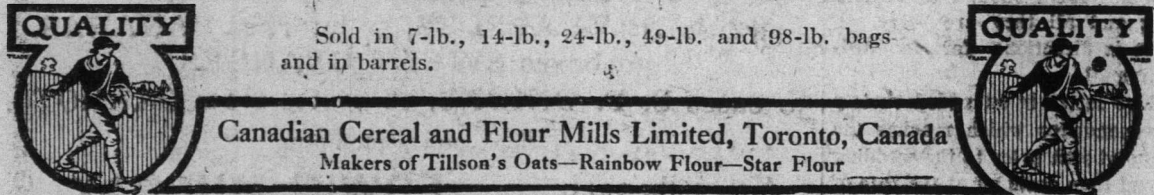

After he became a basso, he had a commanding performance before his late Majesty King Edward VII. and in the concert field, has had a continuous succession of triumphs. M.
