MILD WINTER IN NORTHERN



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



She was moving when witness got up to men to come on board and get their dinner as he wanted to put them in a spot of seals. Witness said he got half a cup of cold tea and half a cake of bread, which was his dinner. He understood the Stephano steamed W. while they were aboard. The men ed quickly and the services of the fire-men were not needed. No damage or were told that was the direction. George Tuff led the crowd. Between half and a mile some seals were reached, and Bungay stopped with some men to kill them. Tuff went on, and witness asked him if Capt. Kean was coming for them, he said no that would kill some seals and go to their own ship. It was then blowing hard, with thick, soft snow, very mild. They started for their own ship, going E. S. E. until the path they came out over in the morning was struck. Witness was sure it was their path, because of a Stephano flag which was about 3½ miles from Newfoundland. Witness thought Stephano went fur-ther away from the Newfoundland while he was on board, than nearer. The weather was very dirty when the flag was reached, too dirty for men to They followed the path towards the 4.30 p.m. It was too dirty to go much further, but judged they should be near the ship. Witness heard whistle, but heard others say they did, this was about 4 o'clock, and some men shouted, thinking they would have been heard on board. 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
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
