



## Lead Pencils.

Missourl-particularly the Ozark the wood used in making lead pencils. town. Though many other varieties have been tried none has proved as satisfactory as the red cedar. The cedars

grow on the rocky hillsides tall through the White River district of Missouri. They are small, stunted trees, seldom reaching a diameter of more than a foot at the butt. At the mill the logs are first cut lengthwise by circular saws into planks. These are cut into right lengths for lead pencils, and those chuncks go into the hands of men who, with circular saws. rip them up into what are called "slats." Only the red heart of the log is used. The white sapwood is thrown away. The slats are bound in bundles and sent to New York, where th greater part are worked up into lead pencils and the remainder goes to lead pencil factories in Europe.



# Where Land May Not Be Sold.

More than 600 years B.C., this law was written into the code of Palestine: "The land shall not be sold in perpetuity." And that is to be the law in the Palestine which is to be developed through the return of the developed through the return of the descendants of the ancient inhabitants. Sir Herbert Samuel, administrator of Palestine, has announced that ownership of land will not carry the right to sell. Title to occupation and use may be conveyed to heirs and land may remain in control of a family from generation to generation, but it may not be disposed of as a commodity. In the ancient days when land passed into the hands of others than the original owner or his heirs, the alienation was temporary Every fifty years, in the year of jubilee, all land that had been alienated returned to its first possessor or his heirs or lawful representative, and the occupant during the time of alienation was required to pay the original owner a sum based upon the number of harvests he had gathered. The new Palestine rule eliminates the jubilee restoration by beginning with a prohibition that invalidates any transfers.

### Home of Earthquakes.

That these exceedingly active volcanoes are extending fields of violence seem assured from the fact that Vesuvius is located well down within the instep of the Italian "boot," while Etna is still further south on the island of Sicily, just across the narrow straits of Messina from the extreme end of the toe.

Southern Italy has been visited by numerous disastrous earthquakes worshipped at her shrine. And then the first of which there is any reliable record occurring at Catania, Sicily lost their lives. We now come to the first record of an earthquake in the northern dis tricts of Italy, severe disturbances occurring in the Abruzzi section dur most of this northern part is mountainous it is probable that the property damage was not in as great a proportion as the loss of life.

No quake of any consequence has since visited Northern Italy until the recent one, but it may presage disturbances of a similar nature telegraphed up to that sector through the successive stratas of the Apennines, influenced by the powerful volcanic forces generated by Mounts Vesuvius and Etna.

In 1726 the scene of earthquake operations again makes its appear ance in Sicily. The brunt of these shocks is borne by the city of Palermo and vicinity, which is on the opposite side of the island from Mount Etna. The loss of 6,000 lives resulted, while many other thousands were rendered homeless. Just six years later Naples had a succession of tremors that reduced its population by 1,900, which is indeed a comparatively small loss for the usual earthquake of Southern Italy. Things then went along quietly enough in an earthquake way, with the exception of the many slight tremors coming yearly, to which the average inhabitant pays little attention, until the year 1783, when the Calabria district experienced one of the worst quakes since becoming the toe of Italy's "boot." This disturbance was possibly caused by the near ness of the volcano to Mount Etna which is just across the narrow straits of Messina. It is recorded that 25,000 people lost their lives in this catasthrophe.

Twenty-two years later Mount Vesuvius evidently got in another one cf its telling blows by causing a severe series of quakes in the Naples district, the loss of life being placed at 6,000 and the property damage correspond ingly high. In 1835 Calabria again suffered a loss of 1,000 inhabitants from what they considered a minor shake, but the more disastrous one following it in 1857 increased its human toll to 10,000.-New York





On Sunday next after last Mass the corner stone of the new school, attached to the Academy of Mercy, Military Road, will be laid by His Grace the Archbishop, attended by the priests of the parish. There will be twelve large class rooms all built in the latest approved style; whilst the auditorium and cloak P. & T. 

Hawaii's great industries are sugar making and canning pineapples for export. Since alcohol is derived from sweetening, the islands have right at hand the material for distilling the spirit which dilutes into whiskey.

When the price of gasoline soared into higher regions, it occurred to the Hawailans that what gives fits to humans, might also energize their automobiles.

The idea worked out splendidly, and not at all to the demoralization of thirsty chauffeurs. The U.S. Government looks after that end of it, and "denatures" every drop of it. making it unfit for human consump-

The price is now said to be about eight cents a gallon, and it produces one-fifth more power than gasoline eaving much cleaner cylinders.

But the fact does not work as well in cold climates, or even when the engines are cool. Possibly we may not be able to use the new auto-food in Canada yet awhile.

May Overcome Difficulty. The difficulties have been over come, however, in Hawaii with the aid of ether, which will mix with alcohol in all proportions.

Dear Sir.-I notice by an editorial in Wednesday's Star, certain references to our foreign trade being in the hands of the Norwegians and Danes previous to the war. Where were they during the war, when Newfoundland was short of tonnage, and what has happened immediately the war is over? It is said there are about forty Danish vessels chartered this year to market our fish, while our own vessels that were mostly purchased at war prices are laying idle. Some Panes have been chartered through our local shipbrokers;

others by the exporters direct. Surely this is not a square deal with regard to our own country. Some say that the reason is the Danish schooners are small, and owing to the regulations no one wishes to ship large cargoes. But there are several vessels owned in different parts of the island, with practically the same carrying capacity as a number of the Danes, and these are carrying coal and anything they can get, because there are no fish freights offering. Everyone is aware what Canada did recently to protect her steamers. Surely Newfoundland could do something to protect its shipping or must we see the trade go to foreigners as happened years ago? Everyone is complaining of the tightness of money, yet nearly half a million dollars will go to Danish and other shipping owned outside Newfoundland, while our own vessels lie peacefully at anchor in the harbor or engage at something that cannot pay running expenses. Surely a Government so experienced at making laws, could give their seamen and shipping some protection along these lines.


