





THE COMPANY'S OFFER. The first actual reduction in the The first actual reduction in the contents of the pay envelope dates back, of course, to March 21st, when we started on the five day week. The effect of that was to reduce wages by one-sixth. The employees found it extremely difficult, under these conditions, to meet current expenses. We have stated before that the week-conditions of the laborary working five days per week at the old rate would be about \$18.45. The weekly wage of a laborer working six days per week at the new rate would be about \$14.58. On top of this is the increased cost of coal, which would be an extra tax on his wages of about \$100 per year, or about \$2.00 per week. This means that the actual reduction in his net earnings, even working six days per week, would be about, 22%. 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
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
