The Blessed Virgin Mary

Mary in Greek, Maria in Hebrew; Miriam occurs in the Old Testament as the daughter of the only sister of Moses. According to tradition, Mary was the daughter of Joseph and Anna. She certainly was a native of Nazareth and a descendant of the Royal House of David.

On the Crucifixion day, Jesus Christ, his Son committed her to the filial care of that one of the twelve distinguished as "the disciple whom Jesus loved." John, son of Zebedee, undertook the care of her from that day and Mary became, no doubt, an example and source of encouragement for the early Christian community.

According to some authorities, Mary finished her days in or near Ephesus, as did St. John, but the evidence that her home was in Jerusalem is also strong.

But from the day when Our Lord, just before his death, committed her tenderly to the care of John, there is very little told of Mary.

According to one legend the Virgin Mary was buried by the apostles, who, upon opening the tomb, after the lapse of a few days, found that it was filled with lilies and roses, but that the body of Mary, "Blessed among women," was gone.

The praises of Mary occupy a very large place in the devotion of the Greek and Roman Catholic churches, and, among other things, she is declared to have been translated straight to heaven, without tasting death, and without resting in Paradise, as did our Saviour, and to have been born free from all stain of original defilement.

Sometimes Mary is called "Saint Mary of the Snows" and the following story is the explanation of Mary's title.

Under the pontificate of Pope Thierlus there lived at Rompa a partisan named John, married to a lady of high birth. Having no children, they had resolved to make the blessed Virgin their heiress and took a vow to devote their wealth to her. They were the owners of Esquiline Hill and decided to erect a church thereon dedicated to the Blessed Mother of Our Lord. The Pope having given his approval it was arranged to trace the plan of the church on the hilltop on August fifth. During the night, a light snow fell over the Esquiline, softly draping it in white, and when the Pope, the attendant clergy, and the pious benefactor ascended the hill to trace out the foundation of the church, they found it covered with snow, on which light pure substance, heavenly powers had decreed the lines of the foundations might be drawn.

The church erected thereon was at first called the Basilica of Tiberius, afterwards St. Maria and Praesepe, and finally St. Maria Maggiore.

To narrate all the legends which time has accumulated around the memory of the most famous of women, would necessitate the filling of many huge volumes of print. Holy writ maintains a reverential quietness about her. She was chosen, and no doubt trained to be the Mother of Jesus Christ after the flesh. He loved and provided for her at death, and that is about all that is definitely known of her whom the Angel Gabriel taught us to call "Blessed."

Motorists' Ordeal.

The observation and presence of mind of a launch repairer was responsible for saving the lives of two occupants of a motor car which dived in the water and imprisoned them 20ft. below the surface. Benjamin Leffer, an electrician, and his aunt, Mrs. Annie Lazarus, were in his "sedan" car when it plunged off the barrier at Emmons Avenue and East Twenty-sixth Street, New York, into Sheephead Bay, sinking in 20ft. of water. William Fowler, a launch repairer, was at work on a nearby boat when he saw the car take to the water. Although it was completely submerged, Fowler says, he saw bubbles rising to the surface, and dove where the bubbles were thickest. He succeeded in opening the door of the sedan and brought Mrs. Lazarus to the surface, still conscious but nearly drowned. Leffer followed without assistance. Leffer told the police later that he had tried to make a quick turn, when he lost control of his steering gear and the car plunged into the water. "Neither of us said a word or uttered an exclamation," said Leffer, in telling of the plunge. "I felt my suit crunch in the seat, and then came the splash. I thought perhaps the car would float, being enclosed, but the engine was so heavy that it sank like a plummet, and the water came pouring in through the bottom boards. As soon as we hit the water I started trying to open the door on my side, but pressure seemed to jam it, and I couldn't budge either side. My aunt was struggling at the other door, but I couldn't see her. Then just as I began trying to kick the glass out, I realized that Mrs. Lazarus was being dragged away from me. It seemed another hour to me before I reached the surface, but when I got there I knew all was well. My aunt was quite conscious and not much frightened. We both recovered very rapidly from the immersion."

Woman's Influence.

We all admire illustrious women. We love to read of those talented writers who have stirred the minds of thousands and of those who, with the gift of song, have thrilled the responsive hearts of men and women. Then there are women who have within them that secret and powerful influence which prompts others to noble deeds. Many great men have confessed that they owe all their success and greatness to their wives.

It is said that the life of Gladstone was influenced in no small degree by his noble and gentle wife. Possessed of all the sweetest womanly graces, yet alive to the practical spirit of the age, she was an ideal helpmate for her distinguished partner. Behind the brilliant public career of the great statesman was ever the unseen and tender sympathy of a true, thoughtful, and loving wife.

Lord Beaconsfield declared that he owed all his success in life to his wife, and that a great part of his knowledge was due to her criticism. And Professor Blackie was always delighted to acknowledge that he owed much of his success in life to the love and sympathy of his wife.

But perhaps our affections go out most of all to those who, with self-abnegation, go forth to minister to the sorrowful, the sick, and the dying. The names of Florence Nightingale and Grace Darling are immortalized. Their deeds have been seeds which have fallen into the earth and died, and have brought forth fruit a thousandfold!

Then think of those whose names we never hear—those brave women whose private life who never dream that they are heroines. We do not meet those who are sacrificing themselves to the caprice and selfishness of others, but those who are daily denying themselves so that they may do good, and thus follow in the steps of the Divine Master. The poor widow carrying her mite into the treasury little knew that the eyes of the Holy One were upon her. She never guessed of the glorious commendation that would come from His sacred lips. Her shrinking act of self-sacrifice was wholly unknown to the rich crowd who passed into the temple, and if it had been known, would probably have been ignored, if not despised.

No one need say, "Would God that I were rich." It is the motive that makes the gift noble or ignoble. From the peasant to the queen, the Divine approval—"She hath done what she could," is the highest praise that any true woman could desire.—ECHO.

Contested Election in Northern Ireland.

Southern Irish Candidates Nominated Without Opposition--German War Criminals Now on Trial--British A.I. American Confederation.

TRIAL OF GERMAN WAR CRIMINALS.
LEIPZIG, May 23. The trial of the German war criminals, as provided in the Versailles Treaty, opened in the Supreme Court here to-day. Little interest was displayed by the public, and there was only a small gathering outside the court to watch the arrival of the British Commissioners headed by Sir Ernest Pollock. Solicitor-general of Great Britain. The first case was that of Sergeant Hoyle, charged with cruelty toward British prisoners in Sereine, in Westphalia. The prisoner, a table near the Judges. After the interpreter had been sworn in the British witnesses were ushered into the courtroom.

IN TROUBLED SILESIA.
BERLIN, May 23. Over crippled telegraph and telephone wires come reports from Oppeln that Germans and Poles are engaged in heavy artillery and machine gun fire all along the Oder, both sides are entrancing and people in several of the towns are panic-stricken. While general reports from Upper Silesia indicate considerable reinforcement of both Insurgent and German sides, menacing food shortage in the rebellious area and extension and intensifying of conflicts, the German Government denies all responsibility for disturbances and declines to comply with the French request to forward money to pay miners, which was considered necessary to forestall possible chaotic conditions. Germany, however, promises to exercise great vigilance in order to prevent volunteers from crossing the German frontier, and says that to this end the police force on German-Silesian border will be materially increased. A French note asserts that German forces at Kreisberg number 8,000 and are under command of a former army officer; that the Ratisbor force, also commanded by former army officer, approximates 9,000, and, in addition, Germans in the vicinity of Oppeln and Krappitz have organized and armed under command of former officers.

GERMANY REPLIES TO FRANCE.
PARIS, May 23. The German Government's note delivered to the French Foreign Office to-day, says that the Government has no influence on measures of self-protection taken by the population of the Upper Silesian territory, which is under administration by the Inter-Allied Commission, which is solely responsible for the maintenance of law and order there. The note was in reply to the French note delivered in Berlin on May 19, asking Germany to close the frontier between Germany and the plebiscite territory as "Poland" has done. The German Government says it has taken measures to prevent the entrance of German irregular troops, but that it cannot interfere with measures of self-protection taken by the population, which, unprotected by French troops, are in a state of legitimate self-defence. Re-establishment of law and order, the note says, is not a question of resumption of work, but the insurrection has a political character, tending to impose Polish rule upon Upper Silesian population by violence and in violation of all dispositions of the Peace Treaty and Justice. The German Government has not, however, lost hope of seeing efforts by the Inter-Allied Commission to find means to restore regular and legitimate authority in Upper Silesia, and to free the population from the yoke of foreign insurgents.

A MAMMOTH CONFERENCE.
WASHINGTON, May 23. The establishment of a confederation of British America, to include Canada and the British Colonies of Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, Jamaica, the Leeward Islands, Trinidad, Windward Islands and possibly British Honduras and British Guiana, was reported in official circles here to-day to be under consideration in these British Dominions and possessions of North, South and Central.

BELFAST ELECTIONS.
BELFAST, May 23. Elections for new Parliaments in Ireland under the Home Rule Bill, were carried out throughout Ireland to-day. Only in the North were ballots cast, as nominations for the Southern Irish Parliament were made without contest. It is possible that Belfast results may be known Wednesday night, but the others will not be in for several days. Belfast accustomed to hot political fights, has never seen such an election morning. It was more of a fight to get to the polls than a stand-up battle. The idea seemed to be to get to the polls early to prevent personation under the proportional representation system, which was being used. In some sections there were barrages, bricks and stones and some shots, before the polling booths. At many of the polling booths, where either side was stronger, long lines formed before the polls to prevent the minority from reaching the booths. There were a large number of child voters, ranging in age from two to sixteen.

ROSEN JOINS CABINET.
BERLIN, May 23. Dr. Friederich Rosen, German Minister to Holland, was to-day appointed Foreign Minister in the Cabinet of Chancellor Wirth.

U. S. EMERGENCY TARIFF.

The House to-day adopted the conference report on the emergency tariff, which now goes to the President.

How to Apply the Profits

Editor, Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—Newfoundland's share of the profits of the Army Canteens is in the vicinity of \$20,000. What to do with this is to come up for discussion at a meeting of the veterans, to be held shortly. To divide it amongst all returned men is out of the question, involving considerable trouble, which would not be justified by the amount each would receive—an amount that would not exceed three or four dollars per man.

Here is a suggestion which I conceive to be a good, practical, common sense one. Set aside and invest \$10,000 of this sum, which will yield an income of \$600.00 per year at the least. With this annuity establish scholarships to be called the "Veteran" Army and Navy, or any name which would be decided upon. Two prizes of \$50 each for the winning boy and girl in the Primary, and two prizes of \$25 each on the same lines for the winners in the Intermediate Grade. Those eligible to sit for the exams would be the brothers and sisters, sons and daughters of all ex-service men. Soldiers and Sailors, think this over! Here is a fitting manner to honor our fallen comrades! Let this be our memorial. Unique—in that every man who has served from Newfoundland has contributed—it is wholly and solely a Veterans' Memorial.

Relics of Ancient Egypt Offered at London Sales.

London.—Relics of ancient Egypt, including many of Nebuchadnezzar and a mummy form, named "She," the original of Sir Rider Haggard's novel, are about to be sold by Messrs. Southey. The collection was made by the late Lord Amherst and his daughter, Lady William Cecil, and is one of the most interesting private collections in England, ranging as it does from the earliest dynasties to the last of the Egyptian Kings. Some of the relics were excavated by Lord Amherst and his daughter themselves in the Nile Valley at Telet-Amarna and at Assuan.

There are many figures of royal personages and high priests, some painted wood, their names stirring one's imagination. There are, for instance, "the Royal Scribe," "A Scribe of the Temple of Anen," "the Divine Father of Writ," "Scribe of the Palace of the Divine Writing," and "Chief of Harim." Figures used in funeral rites are also included in the unique collection, such as wooden hawks, "soul birds," and carved wooden mummy cases in the shape of cats.

A Rare Specimen.
A rare specimen of the new empire is preserved in the form of a draught-board, one of the oldest in the world. Of the thirty draughts-men nine blue pawns have been recovered.

Portraits in wax of Egyptian women, showing their style of coiffure and jewellery, will be of special interest to the fair sex and the student of fashions, who will also find food for study in the inlaid boxes, wooden palettes, color rubbers and "domestic sponges." A beautifully carved statuette, painted and gilded, shows a lady weaving a massive court wig, a long pleated robe, with deep collar, armlets and bracelets.

The cuneiform tablets, covering a period of several thousands of years, include an important cylinder of Nebuchadnezzar, referring to the prosperity of his reign and the temples he had restored.

How Germany Planned.

The following leading article appeared in the Halifax Morning Chronicle of May 19th, and its subject is such a striking commentary on the difference between German methods, after conquest, and those of the Allies, that as an educative lesson to those who sympathise with the Germans, we make no apology for its republication in this column:

HAD GERMANY WON. Germany is complaining that the Allies have imposed severe peace terms upon her and are exacting exorbitant sums as reparation for the damage done during the war, yet these are small indeed compared with the penalties which would have been enforced against the Allies if Germany had won. The Kaiser, in this exultant triumph, would have imposed his "All Highest" demands and would have extorted from the vanquished what he considered to be the very limit. As proof of this there is in existence an official document, issued by the German Government in 1917, to stimulate subscriptions to a War Loan, in which are set out in cold type the indemnities which a victorious Germany proposed to collect from the Allies. This document reads in part:

- a) The cost of the war, including the expenditure of the confederated states and the municipalities, about \$120,000,000,000
b) Pensions allowances and cost of armament payable for forty years or thereabouts, at the rate of \$200,000,000,000 mark per annum, with a capital value of about \$45,000,000,000
c) Damages caused to the German colonies, about \$5,000,000,000
d) Losses suffered by Germany in connection with trade and commerce, about \$30,000,000,000
Total \$200,000,000,000
As to the method of collection the document was most explicit:

"As compensation for our losses we exploit the conquered countries in the first place by taking possession of all private property and of all property belonging to the state that can be exploited for the benefit of the public. The payment of indemnities to the owners of private property has taken over for exploitation by Germany will be a matter for the enemy to look after."

"If France had done what Germany openly proclaimed her intention of doing the French would have taken possession of all the German railways, canals, forts, warehouses, coal and iron mines, factories, business buildings and even all agricultural land. The German wishing to use his former property would be compelled to pay rent to the French owner to an amount that would provide for the payment, principal and interest of the \$50,000,000,000 indemnity."

"There has also recently come to light another document which has been found in the archives of the Foreign Office in Berlin, written by the ex-Kaiser in the spring of 1917, stating his peace terms. They included the following points: Germany to have Longwy and the Metz basin. Belgium to be divided, Germany to have the coast."

The Kaiser to be Duke of Courland. Germany to have Lithuania. Germany to have the Azores and Malta.

The United States to pay an indemnity of 40 billion dollars; France one of 30 billion dollars; England to pay an indemnity in money and material.

A series of documents on the question of the throne of Rumania shows the Kaiser to have been absorbed in 1917 by the notion of having one of his sons appointed. His own candidate was Joachim, who, he writes, had been at the east front and had written excellent reports, and whom he recommended also for his ability to make good public addresses.

There is also in the archives a letter written early in 1917 by Herr Hugo Stinnes protesting against a separate peace with Italy, which at that time seemed not improbable. The argument of Herr Stinnes regarding the success of the submarine war.

These, no doubt, were the minimum of Germany's expectations in 1917, after only three years of war. What they would have been a year later, if Germany had been victorious, it is not hard to imagine. The future settlement and peace of Europe preclude the idea of vengeance and vindictiveness, but in the light of these disclosures Germany's whining-to-day will excite little sympathy in the world.

Imprisonment for Larceny.

Important Decision by Chief Justice. On Monday, after recess, the two prisoners Michael Murphy and Michael Keenan, against whom a Grand Jury had brought in a true bill, during the morning session, were arraigned on the trial before the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Johnson. The prisoners pleaded "Guilty." Mr. John G. Higgins, on behalf of the prisoners appealed on the facts of the case for mitigation of punishment. The Chief Justice said: "Mr. Higgins, we are disposed to take into consideration what you have said with regard to mitigation of punishment. The sentence of the Court, therefore, is that the prisoners Murphy and Keenan be imprisoned in the Penitentiary, St. John's, for the term of three months from this date, with hard labor. With regard to the content that punishment by fine would suit the case, we feel strongly, and we say deliberately, and for the purpose of reaching all who have to do with the administration of justice that imprisonment for larceny, according to English criminal law which is a criminal law of this country, and the only exception to that rule are those stated in the Statute which ought not to be granted to admit a criminal law interpretation of the law to that which it receives elsewhere."

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More Nfld. Fishermen. Another batch of ten Newfoundland fish experts are being taken to Ingonish to-morrow by Capt. James Brewer says the North Sydney Herald of May 20. The men are engaged for the Parker people of Gloucester, whose total crew numbers about 50 men. They are reported very plentiful, but the various firms are only paying the fishermen at the rate of one and a half cent per lb. for their catch. Even at this low price the men are said to be doing fairly well.

Holiday Trouters

EXPERIENCE UNPLEASANT TIME. Over 200 trout were left to rot for various points between Topsail and Pleasant Point, and for the Salmoner line, on Sunday and Monday with a view to spending an enjoyable holiday with the speckled denizens of the ponds and gullies. The majority of those who went out on Sunday were caught in the severe electrical storm that night and were forced to return to town Monday morning, owing to their clothes and supplies being saturated by the heavy rain. Those who left Monday spent a no more enjoyable day owing to the cold on Monday night and the snow storm of yesterday, and over 80 who were fishing in ponds along the railway, returned by yesterday morning's incoming train. The rain, which was a heavy blizzard, they found it impossible to light fires and they did not find their tramp from ponds to railway a very pleasant one. Barely 50 dozen trout were accounted for by the 200 trouters who had returned to the city up to last night.

Spirit Runners Molested.

The men who recently had a quantity of intoxicating liquors taken from them on the Salmoner line proved the truth of the old adage that "troubles never come singly" when they appeared before Judge Morris in the Central District Court this morning, charged with breaches of the Prohibition Act. The first case was that of the man who was deprived of five cases of good French brandy which had cost him \$20 per case and had been used to quench the thirst of most of the dry throats on the Salmoner line. He pleaded guilty and the Deputy Minister of Justice, who prosecuted, asked for a severe penalty. His Honor warned the accused of the penalties which might be imposed upon him, but as he had lost the case de vic and it was the first offence, a fine of \$100 and costs was inflicted.

The second case called was that of the two men who had two five gallon kegs of rum taken from them, also on the Salmoner line, by "highwaymen." The accused's brother was also implicated in the affair but he was in hospital and in any case it was claimed that he was merely an agent. The Deputy Minister of Justice asked for a heavier sentence than in the previous case, and the defendant, who had pleaded guilty through his counsel, Mr. McNelly, was fined \$200 and costs or 60 days imprisonment.

Minister of Finance and Customs, if it is correct that the sugar remaining in the hands of the Food Control Board has all been disposed of to one purchaser, if the said purchaser is J. J. Rossiter, if Sir M. P. Gibbs is a silent partner in the firm of J. J. Rossiter, if J. J. Rossiter received any advance information as to the rate of duty to be imposed on sugar in the Budget, and if the Government proposes to take any action to cancel the contract that appears to be of a suspicious character?

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs, to lay on the Table of the House a list of the foreign going vessels which ordinarily take away cargoes of codfish, now lying in this port; how many of the vessels are unemployed and the reason they are so unemployed; also an estimate of the number of seamen out of work as a result of unemployment, and what steps, if any, the Government proposes to take to afford relief to the unemployed?

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs, to lay on the Table of the House a copy of the account of the General Contingencies from July 1st last to date.

Mr. Moore—To ask Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in his capacity of Chairman of the Railway Commission, how many carloads of material were hauled since January 1st of this year from Collin's mill, near St. George's, and what amount was received as freight for the same?

Mr. Moore—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister to lay on the Table of the House a statement showing the amount of relief provided for white fish in the District, during the past winter, and what revenue, if any, has been received for the amount expended?

Mr. Lewis—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs, to lay on the Table of the House the annual statement of

the Reid Newfoundland Company for the year ending June 30th, 1920, and also a statement of the operations of the railroad under the Commission for the ten months ending on the 30th of April of this year.

Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs, if imports of cube sugar have been permitted into the Colony during the last few days, and if such sugar is now being sold at from eight to twenty cents a pound, whereas granulated sugar costs a higher figure, and if so, is not this import contrary to law and how does it happen that it has been permitted?

SAVING BY SPENDING.

A friend of mine has just spent \$60 for a Summer coat. She is not a person of large means and has not been in the habit of spending as much money as that on her clothes. "It just about killed me to do it," she said, "but I made myself. I've simply made up my mind to have fewer and better clothes. You know my tendency is the other way. I hunt around for bargains and get things that are marked down because they are a little out of style and the next year they are completely out and then I have to be shabby or buy more."

She Plunged for Once.

"Well, four years ago I committed what I thought was a great extravagance at the time. I bought a Summer coat that cost me \$60. It was exactly what I wanted and I thought I would plunge for once, but I felt terribly ashamed of being so extravagant."

Now I realize that it wasn't an extravagance at all. It has lasted me all this time and up to this Summer I have felt very well dressed in it. It had enough body to it so that I wore it early in the Spring and late in the Fall and saved my Winter coat, which you know gets harder wear. On the whole, I don't think I ever got more value in wear and satisfaction out of the same amount of money.

"If I had bought the \$40 coat that I felt I ought to buy, it would have begun to look shabby at the end of the second year. I should either have worn it shabby or bought another \$40 coat which would have made me spend more in the end. Now I have another coat to buy and I'm fighting with my instinct to get something as reasonable as I can and get a good one that will last."

Contrary to the Hummer's Idea.

I know it is contrary to the masculine and funny paper conception of womanhood to imagine any woman fighting with the desire to buy something as reasonable as possible, but I think it is a true picture of the attitude of a great many women. Only many of them don't fight the tendency—they just indulge it and then wonder why they are never satisfied with their clothes.

Don't tell me that you can't spend any more money than you have. I know that. No one better. But you can spend what money you have wisely, and I believe, with this woman, that fewer and better clothes means wise spending.

And I believe in the end it means the saving of not only money but time and energy. If you can get a coat that will last four years, that means that you won't have to go through the picking process twice. It also means a gain in the end for the shops, that should ultimately reflect itself in the cost of living. Since part of the price of every article is the cost of selling it and it won't cost so much to sell one coat as two. I don't suppose there is any danger that this millennium will arrive in a hurry, but I do think it is worth working toward.

A Baffling Mystery.

Public interest in New York again is plunged in the throes of the extraordinary murder mystery which, has fascinated ever since last June when James Bowne Elwell, the rich race-horse owner and card expert, was found shot through the head in the library of his new York house. Until about a week ago, no fewer than seven persons had confessed to the crime. Now an eighth, a young man named Roy Harris, has declared himself the murderer. Harris was arrested in Buffalo at the request of the Canadian authorities, who wanted him on a charge of forgery, but when extradition proceedings were begun Harris told the police he was the man who shot Elwell. Although questioned by the "Third Degree" over 24 hours, Harris, who displays complete knowledge of the details of the crime, tenaciously stuck to his story in spite of all attempts to shake it. The police were at first inclined to believe he was endeavouring to escape extradition to Canada. They have now adopted the theory that he is suffering from delusions. But it is an extraordinary fact that although one person after another confesses the murder of Elwell is still unexplained. Apart from this, the case has other bizarre features which the police is never tired of discussing and reading about. One of the most intriguing is the number of women who possessed keys of the dead man's house. Harris himself alleges he was paid to kill Elwell by a woman who, obviously herself wealthy, enabled him to enter the house by providing him with a key.

Discussing the latest manifestation of the mystery in an article in the "New York American," Mr. Arthur Brisbane says:—"One of two motives must have inspired the crime, either jealousy or fear," he writes. "What could a rich woman much younger than the man she ordered to be killed, fear from that man—what could inspire fear so deadly as to suggest murder? And how could such a man—old, bald and growing feeble, including more than a dozen wigs among his assets—inspire jealousy to the point of murder?"

A search of Elwell's house immediately after the murder led to the discovery of a kimono and other more intimate feminine garments; but, although the police succeeded in finding the owner of these delicacies, they are unable to establish a sufficiently close connection with the crime to justify her arrest. Other women came under suspicion at various times as the inquiry progressed, but the murder still remains as much a mystery as it was the day after it was committed.

Old Masonic Medal.

ANTE-DATES GRAND LODGE OF ENGLAND. (London.—Domination News Service.)—Freemasons will be interested in the discovery, in Ireland, of a Masonic medallion, dated 1516. It is believed to be one of the oldest Masonic emblems in Ireland, and its date is 101 years before the establishment of the Grand Lodge of England, the Mother Grand Lodge of the World. Though the discovery was made some years ago, the medallion has only recently been handed over to the Provincial Grand Secretary of Tyrone and Fermanagh. The medallion was found by the

caretaker, in the wall of an old country house at Derganyville, near Promore, County Tyrone, belonging to Mr. J. J. Nelson. It had evidently been hidden in the chimney of the house, which was built in the almost obsolete wattle-and-clay style.

Foretold by Signs.

BELIEVE THAT WARNINGS ARE "SENT" TO US.

Many of the common callings have a special set of superstitions. The habit of the dark and perilous sea is the commencement of belief in the commingling of belief and Walsall way. With the fishers of the West a little black cat takes the place of the rabbit. You may sing anything you like so long as you do not whistle in taboo. "Go down to the sea in ships" are particularly prone to

strange and crude beliefs. Samuel Cunard showed his contempt for one of these when he made Friday the main starting day for the new Atlantic liners; but there are still many sailors who would rather sail in a "coffin ship" than leave port on a Friday.

If a sailorman should happen to sneeze towards the left at the moment of embarking, it is enough to turn him back. If, by good chance or good management, the direction be reversed, the prosperity of the voyage is assured. It is considered, too, a very unfortunate circumstance if anyone even accidentally numbers the people on board.

Caused Through Fear?

The Welsh quarrymen still cherish an ancient superstition that if they work on Ascension Day an accident is sure to happen. Many years ago the management of Lord Ponrhyn's quarries succeeded in overcoming the feeling, or, at least, in persuading the men to work on that day. But each year there was a serious accident, and the former suspension of all work on that day is again the rule. It is possible that the nervousness engendered by fear was a first cause of the accidents.

Even the industry of dishonesty has its peculiar superstitions. A piece of string tied round the wrist, or a sprig of rosemary in the waistcoat-pocket, is supposed to be an antidote to "fudging." The sight of a crow, a stumble, the accidental passing under a ladder, a sudden feeling of nervousness at sight of a policeman has put off many a burglar till another day. "The human race prides itself on its progress in the arts of civilization, yet it still sees signs, symbolic, portents, and prophecies in everything—a broomstick, a volcanic eruption, a broken mirror, a fallen picture, split salt, an ordinary toad. It has made the stars the storehouses of its destiny; earth the nursing mother of potent charms; the moon by turns beneficent and baleful.

It has peopled the woods with dryads and satyrs; the sea with mermaids, sirens, and phantom ships with phantom crews, the mount and stream and moor with pixies, trolls, nymphs, and will-o'-the-wisps. It has in its time made human sacrifice a religious rite and withereth a penal offence. And the necromancer, the sooth-sayer, the wizard, the magician are still with us, as they were of old. "The King of Babylon shuffled arrows, consulted teraphim, looked in the liver," is an exact translation from the original script of Ezekiel xxi. 21.

Queen Mary's Honorary Degree.

When the Queen received her honorary degree of Doctor of Civil Law at Oxford, recently, the Chancellor of the University, Lord Curzon, said in his speech delivered in English instead of Latin, as usual, that Her Majesty was the first Queen to appear in a cap and gown and the first Queen to be addressed by the dons of the University in a language which even undergraduates could understand. Their reception of Her Majesty had a personal as well as an official side. Since she had occupied the Throne she had set an example to the nation in her public as well as in her private life. 

Challenge Issued and Accepted.

BLUENOSE AND MAYFLOWER MAY RACE TO BRAZIL AND BACK.

Halifax, May 21.—The challenge of Roy W. Pidgeon, of the schooner Mayflower Corporation, of Boston, for an ocean race with the Nova Scotia schooner Bluenose, issued some days ago when the Mayflower was charged with looting vessels on the coast, and the Bluenose was on the Banks, has been accepted by Captain Angus Walters of the Lunenburg schooner, in a letter which he expressed renewed confidence in his charge and the following wire has been despatched to Mr. Pidgeon:

"I have a message from Captain Angus Walters, of Nova Scotia-built schooner Bluenose, requesting us on his behalf to accept your challenge for an ocean race next winter from a port in Newfoundland to Brazil, on the understanding that you and your associates will put up a purse sufficiently attractive, and that each vessel will carry back to Newfoundland or Nova Scotia a cargo of salt. Please let the undersigned know at your earliest convenience amount of purse and if same is satisfactory, details will be promptly arranged.—W. H. Dennis, The Halifax Herald.

In the letter accepting the challenge, Capt. Walters says:

"I will certainly accept the challenge—all that is needed is for Mr. Pidgeon to make the purse worth while. He can make the port as Nova Scotia or Newfoundland with a cargo of salt. I am certain the owners of the Bluenose will profit by the trip, for the purse will certainly come to Nova Scotia. I am delighted with the Bluenose. She is not only a good fishing vessel, but is entirely satisfactory as regards sailing qualities and stands up well riding out a gale on the Banks. I have not come across any vessel on the Banks we could not easily outdistance."


