Under this policy, fish merchants could no longer sell their own fish, which would be pre-empted by the Board, and the Board, instead of merely having the power of regulation, as under the Fish Regulations, would be a supremely autocratic tribunal, having vital power over the prosperity of the meenle of the Colony, by monopoly of the fish trade.
