Cholera and Solar Disturbances.

A remarkable paper was recently read before the Historical Society of London, in which the theory was advanced that there is an intimate connection between cholera and solar disturbances. Certain scientific mer have discovered that the Sun spots, which have been attracting so much attention of late, have a regular period of appearing in their greatest and in their least abundance; and that this paid is about eleven years—we do not pretend to give the exact figure. Moreover, it is thought that cholera epidemies have a period equal to a period and a half of some spots. It cholera depends on the condition of that orb, we can not prevent its appearance. But no fact is more fully established than that pestilence of every kind may be warded off entirely, or esentially modified and mitigated, by the enforcement of strict sanitary regulations. But in addition to all the care public officials may give to this matter it is one to which the personal attention of every individual should be directed.
