

THE CANADIAN LUMER TRADE.—The amount of lumber exported for the month ending 30th June, 1874. was 21,180,904 feet, and for the same period last year 29,456,810 feet, showing a decrease of over seven million feet. The number of American boats employed in freighting immer the past month, and which left the Chaudier, is 164, agains 92 for the same period last year. They carried over thirteen million feet. Only 74 Canadian vessels have cleared this month, carrying 7,940,944 feet, against 154 for June, 1873. 




