A Young Girl's Tragic End.

Kathryn Bruno Found Drowned on Beach Off Dallas Road.

Indications Point to Suicide But No Known Provocation to the Act.

For the first time in months a mystery confronted Victorians yesterday that for a time baffled all efforts at solution. It hinged upon the death of a young girl, Kathryn Bruno, who was found drowned on the beach off Dallas road.

The body of the young girl lies in the city morgue, pending the formalities of the coroner's inquiry this morning, and the tragic little story of her death, as at present known, is briefly this:

She left her mother's dressing room on Thursday afternoon, attended by a nurse, and was seen leaving the house at 2 o'clock on Dallas road, near the intersection of the Dallas road and the Dallas road.
