

West Indies Hurricane

Devastation Now Proves to Be Greater Than Was At First Supposed.

Thousands Rendered Homeless And Fifty Deaths Already Reported.

Portions of Jamaica Completely Denuded With Ten Millions of Loss.

Kingston Jamaica, Aug. 12.—The effects of the hurricane upon the island of Jamaica were of a most disastrous nature.

The eastern end of the island has been devastated, villages have been wiped out and public buildings and churches destroyed.

The destruction of the banana plantations has been complete, and the fruit trade is paralyzed for the next twelve months.

The loss of life has been very heavy, thirty fatalities having been reported, principally among seamen.

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Oklahoma Cyclone

Point Creek, Okla., Aug. 12.—A report reached here tonight that Salt Creek, a small town southeast of here, was blown away.

One man is reported killed and several injured. Relief parties have left here for the scene.

THE ROCK ISLAND DEAL. Baltimore, Aug. 12.—Not since the boat of several years ago have local financial circles been so much excited as they were today over the news of a deal between Rock Island railway interests and the Seaboard Air line.

The deal is a rush to buy stocks and bonds of the latter, which closed yesterday at 18 1/2. The first sale today was 20, and it quickly advanced to 22 3/4. The preferred closed yesterday at 30 3/4; today advanced to 35 1/4.

The bonds of the company also made advances.

UNION PACIFIC APPEAL. Omaha, Neb., Aug. 12.—In the federal court here Judge Mudge granted the Union Pacific railway an appeal from his decision in the Chicago, Great Western and Pacific case.

The appeal is based on the grounds that the decree, according to the pleading of the Great Western attorney, granting the Union Pacific the right to operate the line, was not in accordance with the provisions of the act.
