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

Is a Home a Luxury?

Winnipeg Free Press: Does it pay to own a home? Is a home a luxury? Can a man live at smaller expense in a rented house than in one he owns, both being of the same class. These are questions to be carefully considered by every man who contemplates building. Buying a home should be made a business transaction from every point of view, especially for the man of small or moderate means. If sentiment or the desire to have a fine home are allowed to warp the judgment or lead to the assumption of obligation out of proportion to the income of the buyers, the result is likely to be unsatisfactory.

It is an incontrovertible fact that property which is a good investment for the owner, would be an equally good investment for the renter. The renter pays the taxes, the insurance, the repairs, and a reasonable rate of interest on the money invested in the property, all of which are summed up in the monthly rental. He would have to pay no more were the property his

in the monthly rental. He would have to pay no more were the property his own, and the owner's net profit he could just count as saved.

Viewed in this light, owning a home is profitable, aside from the great satisfaction it affords, and the security is better that any life insurance policy. Yet there are those who own homes and who declare that it is more economical to pay rent; that a home is a luxury a poor man cannot afford.

It will doubtless be found that at least 90 per cent of those who have found owning their homes unsatisfactory have either assumed too great a debt in making the purchase, or have bought homes which they could not keep up properly without a greater expenditure than they can afford. These home owners are paying an unnecessary price for the satisfaction of home owning, and are making it a burden.

Take the man who has \$1,000 or less Take the man who has \$1,000 or less and is not making more than \$125 a month. Should he buy a home costing \$3,000, he must assume the burden of interest on \$2,000, which would amount to \$120, or perhaps more. He would probably have to pay as much as \$30 a month on the principal, besides which the taxes, insurance and repairs would amount to perhaps another \$125 a year, making a total of \$565 a year which he would have to pay, a sum out of proportion to his income. He would seen doubtless feel that he was better off financially when he was paying rent at \$30 per month. that he was better off financially when he was paying rent at \$30 per month.

Then, by the time the place was paid for he would find that instead of having \$3,000 invested in it, an additional \$1,000 had been put into the property in the shape of interest, taxes, insurance, and repairs, making the total cost to him at least \$4,000.

Unless the lot had increased considerably in value, he might be unable to dispose of the property for this

erably in value, he might be unable to dispose of the property for this amount, and the interest he could get on the \$4,000 if it were free, would amount to as much as rent would cost in the same class of building, leaving him his taxes and insurance to charge up against the satisfaction of owning a home. This sort of a home-buyer is sure to find owning a home a failure, and to preach the doctrine that it is cheaper to pay rent.

unpaid only \$500, or just enough to
give him an incentive to save. This
would have made no burden of interest, the taxes, insurance and repairs
would be much less than on the higher
priced property, heating and lighting

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Renovating Soiled Photographs

Many valuable photographs have been
fost or destroyed because of careless
handling, or the soiling and breaking of
the mount from the passage of time.
Then, too, the photos made today are
mounted on large cards unfit to be place
ed in the family album. In this way
they become soiled with handling or
specked with lisects in the summer. The
face of almost every photo may be
easily cleaned with a little care.

There are two kinds of emulsion coating, a collodion surface and a gelatine
surface. The collodion surface may be
told in this way: wet the top of your
finger and apply it to a corner of the
print; if it does not stick, your print is
a collodion surface, and may be easily
washed. Wet a soft cloth, and gently
wash the face of the print, being careful
not to wet the card, as not all cards will
stand being wet. This will remove all
dust or fly specks; and you will be surprised at the brightness of the result.

If the surface of the photograph feels
sticky to touch it won't do to clean it
with water, but get some pure alcohol.
Wet a cloth with it and gently rub across, the face of the print; it removes
all foreign substances. Don't rub as you
would in scrubbing the porch, but don't
be afraid to rub briskly. There is a
happy medium.

If you have a nicture with the mount badly soiled and broken, the best thing to do is to tremust it. Get a pan of clear water: A large granite pan is best, and one entirely free from grease, the water must be cold. Throw your photographs in here face down, and let them soak; it won't host them; it is just what your photographer would do. After a length of time, depending on thickness of mount and kind of puste used, the picture will separate from the mount.

Now take a clean plece of glass, an old window glass or a clean mirror will do; see that it is well cleaned. Lay your prints face against the glass and cover the badks with library paste while they are still wet. Lift from the glass and place on new mount. Rub gently down with soft cloth. Don't put on too much paste, as it will press out on the mount, but rub in well what is put on. Place the remounted photos where they will dry without being too warm, and be careful not to let anything come in contact with face while drying. If the mount is heavy the print will not curl when dry, but if the picture If the mount is heavy the print will not curl when dry, but if the picture doesn't dry straight it will be necessary to place it under a heavy weight when perfectly dry. It will take from an hour to half a day to thoroughly dry the pictures.—Homestead.

Detective Burns is authority for the statement that it is the purpose of the prosecution to send Ruef eventually to San Quentin penitentary, but the trial of corporation officials who have been indicted and others who have been indicted and others who have not yet been formally charged, will, it is thought, take so long that Ruef's incarceration will be delayed at least a year.
