



This Summer's Holidays Should be on the Farm

(St. Marys Journal)

Conscription is winning many friends these days. Certainly it is the fairest, and most economical method of securing an army. This expensive and unsatisfactory method of wheedling more or less unwilling men into attaching their names to a paper has little to commend it. In the meantime, however, it is the plan

in vogue and we must make the best of it. Men are wanted and men must be got. The fear of difficulty in securing a bountiful crop, has probably been overworked. Even agriculture will have to be in a measure subordinated to the needs of the 'army, and the men secured regardless of the effect on agriculture. However, if the matter is met in a patriotic manner by the people we see no reason why agriculture should seriously suffer. The Educational Department are going to allow the students of the High Schools and Collegiates an early vacation, and they might even delay the opening a little in the autumn. This will help, particularly if town and city people are sufficiently patriotic to send their boys out onto the farms instead of loafing around town, or going into camp at some lakeside They can be utilized on the resort. farms, to the benefit of both farmer

and boy and the greater benefit will go to the boy. That the retired farmer should, wherever his physical condition at all warrants it, go back to help this summer, goes almost without saying. Even if money is no object patriotism demands that all sources of labor be utilized at this time.

pelled by a desire to go on the land. Flax a Valuable Grop from an Agricultural and Industrial Standpoint

The flax crop of Canada has come into prominence more than ever this year on account of the losses of the flax fields in Europe. Forty-four per cent of the world's supply of this valuable fibre plant was produced in countries now engaged at war. As a result there has been an enormous shrinkage in the world's supply of flax during the year 1915. Prices of fibre have more than doubled during the past year and spinning mills are greatly concerned for their future supply of raw material.

From the days of the earliest settlement flax has been grown along the St. Lawrence and in Western Ontario and spun into home-made linen. Of late years, however, this crop has not been popular with farmers, it being claimed that it is particularly hard on the land. Scientific investigation does not bear out this theory. Flax is a quickgrowing, surface feeding crop and, as such, draws heavily from the avail-able plant food of the upper six inches of the soil. An average crop of flax, however, does not take as much total plant food from the soil as an average crop of the deeper rooted cereals, such as wheat, oats or barley. This fact has been established beyond a doubt by investigational work carried on at the

Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Farmers would be well advised to pay more attention to this crop from now on. Prices now being offered by flax mills for fibre straw make it a valuable cash crop. In most cases the mill operator agrees to take the responsibility of harvesting the crop, a feature which will tend to relieve the serious labor situation confronted by many farmers. Even where no mills are operating, flax may be grown with an assurance of a ready market. Linen mills in the United States are offering as high as \$15.00 per ton for good No. 1 Canadian flax, delivered at station.

Aside from its agricultural value, flax has a very important economic value at the present time. Flax fibre is the raw material of the spinning mills and this yarn is the raw material of the linen mills used in the manufacture of linens. Flax developed to the limit of its possibilities will produce a greater amount of increased wealth than any other plant grown and for this reason more attention should be given to its cultivation in Canada. At present prices the export value of an acre of flax runs between \$125.00 and \$150.00 more than four times the export value of ordinary cereal crops. If flax mill owners and farmers will cooperate in placing the flax industry on a permanently profitable basis, a



Fighting Apple Scab. The fungus which causes this disease lives over winter in the infected areas of dead and decaying apple leaves. In the spring it produces tiny spores. These spores may be carried by wind or by birds to the young and tender foliage, where they germinate readily and produce infections which



to produce a crop of wheat and had harvested and threshed it probably secured fifteen bushels of wheat per acre worth no more than 60 cents a

secured fifteen bushels of wheat per acre worth no mere than 60 cents a bushel, whereas if he had sown good seed he might have harvested twenty bushels of wheat worth 90 cents a bushel. In other words, he could have got \$18 per acre for his crop in place of \$9. The entire loss could have been prevented by the formalin treatment at a cost not to exceed a very few cents per acre. A pint bottle of formaldehyde costing from 35 to 50 cents and a few hours' labor would have treated enough seed grain to sow fifty acres. There is no excuse for such a loss except carelessness. Any drug store, general implement dealer, experiment station, or farm paper will cheerfully furnish infor-mation concerning the treatment of grain for smut. No farmer is wealthy enough to afford to sow grain affect-ed with smut.
