NOTE AND COMMENT

The British army has been reduced by 282,000 and now with the reserves numbers only 300,000.

An appeal to the world's charity is made on behalf of the people of the Ruhr, most of whom have been idle for eight months in pursuance of the policy of "passive resistance" against French occupation. It is an appeal that will not call forth much of a response on this side of the Atlantic.

Ontario Conservatives will meet in annual convention in Toronto on November 20th. A big gathering is expected. Every riding in the Province will be represented at the convention. Joseph E. Thompson, M.P.P. for Northeast Toronto, Speaker-designate of the new Legislature, is President of the Ontario Association.

Victoria (B.C.) Times: The Minister of Marine and Fisheries is on firm ground when he says Canada is all right and can be made to prosper exceedingly if the people with such a glorious heritage will value it and develop it. He might have said that the doleful countenance never profited its wearer nor cheered anybody.

London Advertiser: The Goderich Signal reports one boat from that town making a catch of 3,000 lbs. of lake trout off Kettle Point, adding that the whole catch was shipped to Detroit. There are no better fish taken from the water than lake trout, and Ontario people should be able to get more of them at a fair price.

The handshake may be doomed as an expression of friendly greeting between civilized people. New provincial textbooks on hygiene for use in the public schools may contain pages declaring that a man with a dagger in his hand is less dangerous than those who come under the guise of friendly good-will offering hands laden with germs that slay without warning.

Orillia Packet: Sir Edward Grigg told a Williamstown audience recently that Lloyd George received many telegrams from private individuals during important international conferences after the Great War. One, from an American, said: "We are with you heart and soul to put the Turk out of Europe. America expects every Englishman to do his duty."

A large increase is noted throughout the province in the attendance at both public and high schools. This may be attributed in a large measure not so much to the growing importance attached by parents to education as to the compulsory provisions of the Adolescent Act. It is debatable whether the manual forms of labor will not suffer by an evident inclination to foster a desire for "white collar jobs."—Hamilton Spectator.

Daily Telegraph, London: With the exception of Joan of Arc, no woman of note wore her hair bobbed before 1914. The really serious reason against bobbed hair is that it needs a lot of care. It calls for twice as many visits to the hair-dresser, and there is nothing like bobbed hair for collecting dust. But it does not necessarily cover an empty head, and is very far from being an index to frivolity.

The Calgary Herald has just issued a fortieth anniversary edition of 116 pages that is a credit to the directors and staff who produced it. In this issue the business interests of the district have shown enterprise in placing an unusually large volume of advertising which tells the story of the growth and prosperity of the province. The issue constitutes a remarkable record of the historic events of Alberta during the last 40 years. Many experiences of early pioneers are recounted in readable style, some of the early builders telling their story in their own words in an interesting manner.

THE ADOLESCENT ACT

There have been various rumors with respect to the operation of the Adolescent Act now that a new Government is in power in Ontario, but a letter sent by Dr. F.W. Merchant Supt. of Education, to the Hamilton Board of Education, indicates that its operation will not be interfered with. The statement is plainly made that all boys and girls, up to the age of 16 must remain in school, except when they can secure a permit to go to work for the reasons given in the Act. Nothing will be done, however, with respect to adolescents over sixteen years of age—not until 1925, at all events, and it is to be doubted whether they will ever be seriously interfered with, though there was a good and useful motive to have them taught rudimentary trades up to that age so that more skilled workmen may be produced. This means that the operations of the Act remain practically as they are today. Boys and girls are expected to attend school till they are 16; after that they may go to work.

"CHRISTMAS" NOT "XMAS"

Detroit has come to be so much associated in the press with motors, as well as with bootlegging and other crimes and scandals, that it was with great delight we noted in the papers this week that, whether intentionally or not we do not know, a movement has started in that city which has the appearance of almost sanctity. An organization of retail merchants is carrying on a propaganda to bring about the discontinuance of the abbreviation of the word "Christmas" to "Xmas." Effort of that kind must have behind it an element of sentiment or reverence for the day of all days in the year; and that means at least the paying of respect by a commercial world to the Great Nazarene from whom the day gets its foundation and its name. Even though the X in Xmas may be construed to represent the cross on which the Saviour died it is not nearly so close to the thought of divinity as the Christ part of Christmas; and any effort to preserve this name as hallowed should meet with universal endorsement.

BUSINESS THEN AND NOW

Buntin, Gillies & Co., the well-known Hamilton firm of stationers and paper dealers, has just turned its seventy-fifth milestone. They preserve still the Day Book, Cash Book and Letter Copy Book used in 1848. Entries therein give an intimate picture of the time.

The entries were made invariably in pounds, shillings and pence. Along in 1850 a few entries show the equivalent in dollars and cents in the body of the entry, apologetically as it were, but the extensions were in English currency.

Cash in thirty days seemed unknown. It was too abrupt. When the account was due it appears to have been settled by a promissory note at 2, 3 or 4 months.

The disbursement side of the cash book shows some interesting entries: "Repairing pump, 1/8d." (No municipal waterworks then.) Nov. 1849. "1 Cord Wood, 12/6d." "Sawing, splitting and piling 1 cord wood, 3 1/2 d."

2 1/2 Hours "labor" cost 1/8d.

There are many entries for candles. Pumps, candles, cordwood, shillings, and labor at 12 cents an hour have all departed from Canadian business. Indeed the only remnant we have of 1848 is now and then a fragment of the long credit system that was then in vogue.

LAMBTON DEANERY MEET

Large Attendance Despite Unfavorable Weather. Proceedings Very Interesting

The autumn meeting of the rural deanery of Lambton was held in Christ Church, Petrolia, on Wednesday, October 24th. The weather was very unfavorable, a cold rain falling throughout the day, but, nevertheless, when the beautiful chimes of Christ Church, given by the late J. L. Englehart, called the delegates to the service of Holy Communion at 10:00 a.m. there were already a large number present. The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rector, Rev. R. C. Pitts with Rev. J. H. Petter, of Wyoming, as assistant.

At 11 a.m. the men and women conducted separate conferences. The latter were under the chairmanship of Mrs. F. G. Newton, president of the Deanery W. A. with Mrs. Chester, secretary, supporting her. Reports and other business were dealt with and evidence was forthcoming that the work is going on in a satisfactory way. Mrs. Sage, of London, also addressed the ladies. The men met under the chairmanship of the Rural Dean with Rev. W. J. H. Petter, as secretary. An important item of their program was the acceptance of a recommendation that the age for superannuation of aged clergy should be reduced from 70 to 65 years. The laymen met after luncheon and discussed the Deanery's standing in the matter of the budget—each parish reporting to the committee headed by Sheriff Albert Johnson, of Sarnia, as to its assessments and payments.

In past years the Deanery of Lambton has reached 100% standing in this and it is hoped to continue this standard.

The general convention in the afternoon was well attended and addresses were given by Ven. Archdeacon Sage, of London, Rev. J. H. Hosford, of Watford, and Rev. J. J. Monds, Presbyterian minister of Petrolia, which deeply interested those present. Archdeacon Sage's subject was "The Psychology of Religion" and covered many interesting themes "the subconscious area," "mysticism," "the herd instinct," "adulthood," etc.

Mr. Hosford spoke on the church's work among young people, especially the A.Y.P.A. and Bible Classes. He had put a great deal of thought into his paper which was listened to very closely and the speaker's native wit and gift of oratory were very pleasing.

Rev. J. J. Monds kindly substituted for Mr. Horace McDougall and told the deanery of the Laymen's position in the Presbyterian church system. It was an interesting address which all enjoyed, being glad to learn from the sister church of that which is so important in her policy.

In the evening there was a short service at which the Rural Dean preached and Mrs. C. A. Jones sang a beautiful solo, but by then most of the delegates had returned to their homes in Sarnia, Wyoming, Courtright, Sombra, Pt. Edward, Forest, Watford, Warwick and Alvinston. The luncheon and supper provided by the ladies of Christ Church were sumptuous and tastefully served and elicited a very cordial vote of thanks from the delegates.

There was a large number of ladies attending the session of the Women's auxiliary, reports of the activities of the organization in the last six months being submitted.

Mrs. F. G. Newton was re-elected president, and Mrs. John Chester, secretary.

The special work of the deanery W. A. this year is the raising of funds for the mission church at Shingle Point, Herschel Island, the church having been recently built.

Last year the funds went towards expenses for church furnishing. Mrs. Sage of London gave an inspiring and instructive address on the work of the auxiliary and Mrs. Petter of Wyoming gave an interesting account of mission work in a district 800 miles north of Vancouver where she and her husband are engaged.

HELP THE POSTMASTER TO HELP YOURSELF

Did you ever give a moment's thought to the hours of duty that are put in daily by the Local Post Office and the hundred and one things that have to be thought of and attended to, correctly and quickly to give you good Service which you expect. There are many ways in which you can assist the Post Office to give you that Service, and they are all so small and easy that everybody can do them without the slightest inconvenience to themselves. Here is a list of some ways to remove the wrinkles from the Postmaster's forehead:—

If there is a vacant box in the Post Office—Rent it. The cost is only a few cents a month. If your time is worth anything at all, you will save money by not having to wait at the wicket for your mail.

If you lose your key—Buy Another the first time you are in the Post Office. Don't keep asking for your mail to be handed to you, in the hope of finding your key some day.

Put your Box Number on every letters you write. There are lots of Browns, Smiths and Robinsons everywhere, and it is very annoying when someone else opens your letters.

If your children call for the mail, let one of them do it. It is not necessary to have the whole family call one after the other.

If you should send to a Mail Order House, don't expect to get your parcel next morning. Give them time—when the parcel arrives the Postmaster won't forget to give it to you, he doesn't want it. There is no need to ask four or five times if your order has come.

Don't ask them not to hand your mail to anybody but yourself. Post Office employees only have human brains. Rent a box and keep the key yourself.

Never send a parcel without insuring it. Three cents will insure it up to five dollars, and it is a mighty poor parcel that is not worth three cents.

Put your name and address on the upper left hand corner of every letter you write, and the stamp in the right hand corner. Better still use printed envelopes, and have your name and address printed on them.

Don't put money in a letter—buy a Money Order or a Postal Note, then if it gets lost the Post Office will gladly issue a duplicate, and some hard-working Postal employee will not be suspected of stealing it. If you must put the cash in—Register it.

Don't put Inland Revenue Stamps on your letters.

Pack your parcels properly, address them with ink, use good thick wrapping paper and twine.

Buy your stamps at the local Post Office or from your courier. The Postmaster's pay depends on his stamp sales, and the more stamps you buy off him the better service he can afford to give you.

Don't grumble at the regulations, they are made for your benefit and protection. Your local Postmaster did not make them, he is just doing his duty in carrying them out strictly. Try to help him do it right, and make things pleasanter for everyone.

If you forget to do your business at the Post Office between eight in the morning and seven at night, don't worry the Post Office employees to see if they will give you your mail or write a money order for you after hours. They are entitled to a little time off, and the best tempered people in the world are liable to get snappy sometimes.

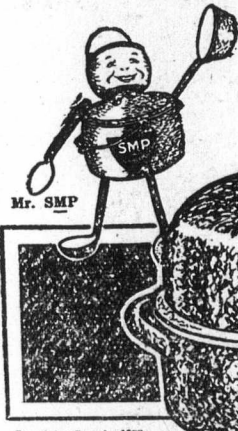

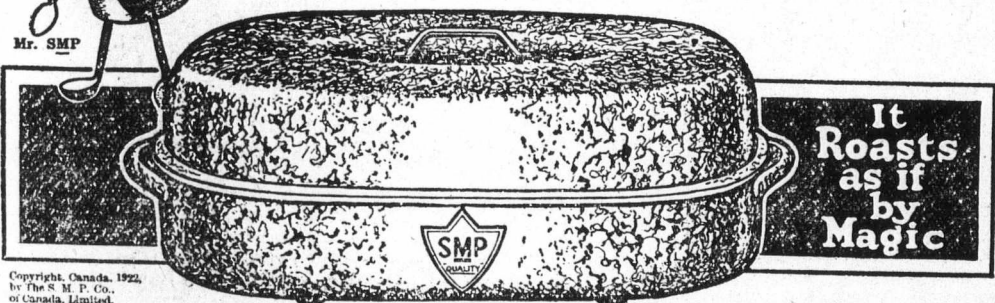

DECISIONS RESPECTING NEWSPAPERS

Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post office, whether addressed in his name or another's or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for payment.

The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post office, or removing and having them unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intention of fraud.




Beating the Train into Eternity

IN line with new legislation being passed in the various States of the American Union aimed to diminish the alarming number of accidents through reckless driving of automobiles, particularly on level railroad crossings, the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada has requested the Canadian Pacific Railway to submit information bearing upon similar dangerous practices by motorists on various portions of its system so that use may be made of the information with a view to endeavoring, through education, to minimize the occurrence of such dangerous practices.

In a Bulletin issued by the Board of Railway Commissioners on June 15th, 1923, 54 cases of danger at protected crossings are cited for the period October, 1922, to May, 1923, and of these fifty are declared to have been due to the carelessness of motor drivers. "Motor accidents," says the bulletin, "are becoming more frequent. Every sane motorist deplors this. If accidents are to be lessened, the sane motorist must educate the culpably negligent motorists."

All highway crossings are by law protected by signs, and they are only dangerous when the driver of the automobile makes them so. They are not dangerous if motorists will take a small part of the care they exercise in turning on a city street. It is the motorist's carelessness that makes them dangerous. The train has right of way. Everyone knows what may happen if the plainly seen warnings are disregarded at a point where the motor car can stop while the train cannot.

The surprising part of it also is that safeguards and precautions erected by the railroads are so often entirely ignored. Time after time newspaper reports show that crossing alarm bells, barrier gates and even watchmen waving "stop" signals mean nothing to the man in the motor car who is determined to beat the train to it.

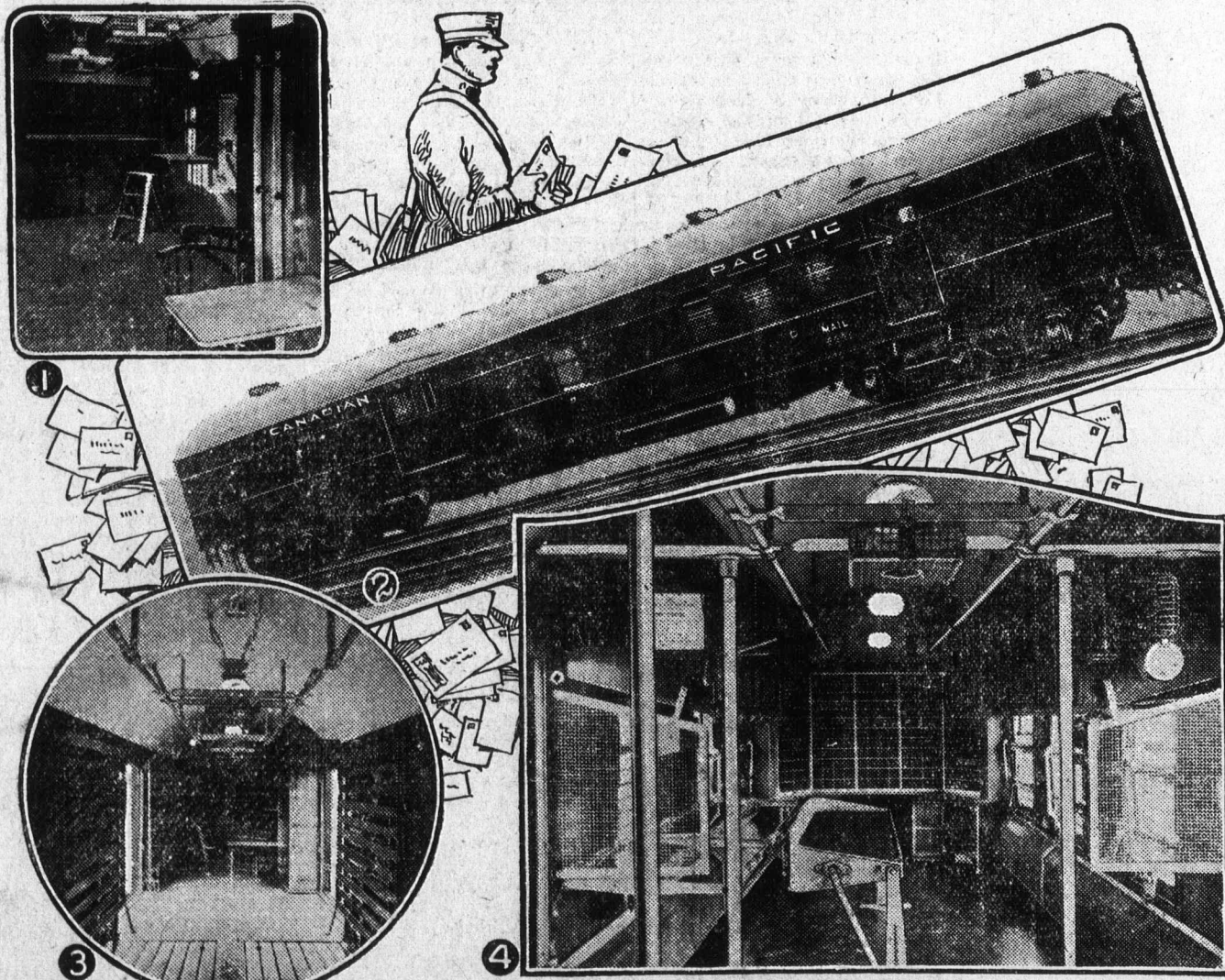

HIS MAJESTY'S MAILS ON CANADIAN PACIFIC

Almost every day we rely upon His Majesty's Postal service for the delivery at certain hours of letters and parcels which are of value and which would lose their value were they delivered tardily. Seldom have we cause to complain of the service rendered in exchange for our few cents and we have come to expect the efficient regularity of that service regardless of the natural or economic disturbances which affect other services. The letter was stamped and placed in the postal box. It must be delivered, and with dispatch, rain or shine.

Due to the increasing use of His Majesty's Mails, the Canadian Pacific Railway has found it necessary to add to its rolling stock, twelve new Mail and Baggage coaches. These, being up-to-date in every respect, provide every facility for the handling of the mail, and a number of conveniences for the clerks which the older type of cars could not boast of. The "All Steel" cars are some of the finest used by Postal authorities in the world, and the Company is to be congratulated, in that providing every facility for the quick handling of postal matter, it has kept an eye to the comfort of the clerks.

The forward end of the travelling Post Office, for such it is, is used mainly for storage purposes. On one side, movable iron stanchions separate the bags destined for the various towns en route, and on the other is the gas stove, for cooking purposes, ice water tank, lavatory, wash basin, and clothes cupboard—innovations which are greatly commended by the clerks.

The rear end of the mail compartment is the business end. A long reversible table, running lengthwise, allows the clerk to face either side of the car in order to sort his parcels into the bags which are supported by folding racks, and into the boxes conveniently arranged above the bags for the accommodation of newspapers, and which can be quickly emptied by the simple expedient of raising the front. At the rear end is a table, the full

width of the car, and behind this are the hundreds of pigeon holes into which the clerk must distribute the letters for the various towns, quickly, almost automatically. At his feet as he stands at his table, the clerk has a tray into which the letters posted when the train is at a station, drop. These letters he stamps and distributes with those put on the train at the terminal. Cord with which to tie the letters into bundles is conveniently at hand, and if some of the bundles contain registered mail they are placed into the pigeon holes at one side, over which a wire grating is fitted and locked. Everything is scrupulously clean.

The baggage and express end of the coaches is also the last word in car construction. As with the mail section, the doors open in the centre of the compartment, one half of which has a solid floor, the other half being fitted with fish racks. In addition to the conveniences afforded the mail clerks, the baggage men have a folding table which fits tightly against the wall when not in use, and which may be utilized as a dining table and—but not there is too much business to talk of cards.

The twelve new cars were designed by C. H. Temple, Chief of Motive Power and Rolling Stock, Canadian Pacific Railway, and were constructed by the Canada Car and Foundry Company, Ltd., Montreal. They are designed to carry 30 tons of express matter and 10 tons of mail, a total of 40 tons compared with 30 tons, the capacity of the old type of coach. The Company has adhered to the six wheel truck, but heavier journals have been provided, 5½ by 10 in place of the 5 by 9 inches. Another feature of the new coaches is the diaphragm ends. This eliminates the danger of people "riding blind".

Until more are constructed, the new coaches will operate between Montreal and Toronto, Montreal and Sault Ste. Marie, Toronto and St. John, N.B., and Winnipeg, and Edmonton on Canadian Pacific lines.
