



GENEVA, Aug. 1, 1878. FARMER HARDSCRABBLE,-

Before I leave this city or give you any description of its history, and beau ties, I must tell you of my route from the town of Interlaken, between the mountains, and thence by way of the cities Berne, Fibourg, and Lausanne, the latter situate on Lake Leman. I have referred to Interlaken as be-ing between mountains, and all who have seen it will endorse the descrip-tive words I employ.
