

Among several schemes having this object in view, which will be announced as they mature, is a Potato Growing Contest. The district in which the contest will be carried on les between a line west o the town of Annapolis, and the farthest boundary of the Municipality of Yarmouth.

Cash prizes will be offered for the best acre of potatoes. The one condition making a field eligible to win a prize is that it be sprayed with Bordeaux Mixture, or dusted with an approved dust times during the season.







# First Annual Nova Scotia Egg Laying Contest

An Important Event

The first Nova Scotial Annual Egg Laying Contest has been inaugurated at the Agricultura! College, and consists of 30 pens. of fowls, mostly pullets. The contest began on Saturday, November 1st. and continues until September = 30th, 1920. Each entry consists of five birds, hens or pullets. Ma'e birds are excluded in this contest. Nearly all the pens, with the exception of two, are pullets. The houses have been erected at the east end of the poultry department on a plot of freshly seeded ground, and contains four trap nests in each pen, also a dry feed hopper, grit shell box, a record file, a hopper for hard grain and a small wooden feed trough. The results of the contest will be published weekly, giving the number of eggs produced by each hen in each pen, and also the weight of the eggs produced by each hen in each pen.
