I. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 16; invisible in New Brunswick; visible in the north-western part of Asia, and along the coast of Russian-America.

II. A total Eclipse of the Moon; March 30, partly visible in New Brunswick.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Hon. R. D. Wilmot, A. H. Gillmor, Eliss Botsford, George L. Hatheway, and T. W. Anglin. R. W. Crookshank, Esq., Secretary; George W. Smith, Accountant.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen on approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{4}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—a plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—a white light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark, and forty light, in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

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LIGHT HOUSES.

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Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.

This Light bears from the Light House on Briar Island, N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W., 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N., $\frac{1}{2}$ N., 12 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Briar Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white.

The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly.

" Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 13 miles.

" Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

" Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

" N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

" Little River Head, N. by W.

" Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westward, (or $1\frac{1}{2}$ points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point, is Head

Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campbell, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted *White*, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preauz Lights.—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed, and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. 43° 39' N. long. 66° 8' W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 84° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House are as follows:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. 61½ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile. The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about 2½ fathoms on it at half tide.

SIGNALS.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile; it has 1½ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white.

SIGNALS,

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of St. John.

- One Ball close, for one square-rigged vessel.
- One Ball half hoisted, for two vessels.
- Two Balls close, for three vessels.
- Two Balls separated, for four vessels.
- A Pendant of any colour, for five vessels.
- A Pendant under a Ball, for six vessels.
- A Pendant over a Ball, half hoisted, for seven vessels.
- A Pendant under two Balls, close, for eight vessels.
- A Pendant between two Balls separate, for nine vessels.
- A Flag of any color for ten or more vessels.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard-arm, according to the direction in which the vessels are at first discovered; and as soon as their rig can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast-head, in the following order:

- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
- Do. with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.
- Do. with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.
- Do. with a White Pendant, for a small armed vessel.
- A Blue Pendant, for a Merchant Ship.
- A Red Pendant, for a Merchant Brig.
- A White and Blue Pendant, for a Foreign Vessel.
- A White Pendant [without a Ball], for a Topsail Schooner or Stoop.
- A Blue Flag, pierced white, for a Steamboat from St. Andrews or Eastport.
- A Red Flag, pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby.
- A Red Flag, with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston.
- A Ball at the mast head—vessel is on shore, or in distress.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John—passed 8d August, 1848.

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steamboats or British Vessels, drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars; and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty five cents per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Le Preaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, One dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South South East, One dollar and Seventy five cents per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Two dollars per foot.

Rates of Slippage at the Corporation Slips.

All decked vessels, same rates as for wharfage; woodboats, or other boats, or undecked vessels, having standing masts, and all scows, and not lying at the wharves on either side of the Slips, to pay the following rates:—

Every Woodboat of sufficient burthen to carry 10 cords of wood, or under,	60c.
Ditto ditto upwards of 10 cords, and not more than 15,	\$1.
Ditto ditto upwards of 15 cords, and not more than 20,	\$1.50.
Ditto ditto upwards of 20 cords,	\$2.

The above to be paid each trip; and if any such vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 50c. to \$1 daily, ac-

ording to the burthen. Other boats and vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all scows to pay 20c. each trip, and 30c. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

Rates of Ferriage Across the Harbour of St. John.

For every foot passenger, 4c; child under 12 years, 2c; horse, 5c; ox, or other large animal, 5c; elephant or camel, 25c; single waggon, not loaded, 4c; single waggon, with horse and one man, 10c; single waggon, with horse, load, and man, 12c; double waggon, not loaded, 12c; double waggon, with horses and man, 15c; double waggon, with horses, load, and man, 25c; barrel 2c; bag, containing two bushels, 2c; firkin, keg, or box, of the same size 2c; cask of lime, 4c; pipe, hogshead, or puncheon, whether in wagon, cart, or sled, or other vehicle or not, except containing molasses, vinegar, rice, or sugar, 15c; every cwt. of iron, steel, or copper, whether in wagon, cart, or other vehicle or not, 2c. Carts, sleds, drays, and carriages, same as waggons.

The Ferry is leased from the Corporation for the space of ten years from July 10th, 1860, by Mr. John McSweeney. One boat runs at a time, and returns at night to the Eastern side. The boat runs from Ferry Landing, foot of Princess Street, on the east side, to Rodney Slip, Carleton, except at low water, spring tides, when the passengers are landed at Sand Point.

Rate of Tolls for Crossing the St. John Suspension Bridge.

For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age), 4c; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 7c each; elephant or camels, 50c; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled, or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught, with one person, with or without a load, 13c; horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 7c each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1c.

Market Tolls.

For every Salmon, 8c; Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each 1c; Halibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 2c; exceeding 20 lbs., and every 20 lbs. 2c; every Lobster, 1c; dozen of Haddock, 3c; every 100 of Gaspareaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 3c.

Rates at the Public Weighing Machines.

Every load not exceeding one thousand pounds weight, 20 cents; and 2c for every additional hundred weight—payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

Hackney Coach Fares.

For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 20c; and for every passenger exceeding one, 10c. additional; and if any driver of any carriage or other vehicle shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers, by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz.: For any time not exceeding half an hour, 25c; and in that proportion for every half hour that such carriage or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

Public Porters and Hand Cart Men.

For loading, carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip, in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several five districts, the rates of prices are as follow: For the first district, 5c; second district, 6c; third district, 6c; fourth district, 7c; fifth district, 9c.

Time for going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

POSTAGE.

All Letters sent to any part of British North America, with the exception of Packet Letters, and Letters to and from the United States, are liable to a uniform rate of five cents per half ounce, according to the following scale:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.....	30	05
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce.....	35	10
A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one and a half ounce.....	40	15
A Letter exceeding one and a half ounce, and not exceeding two ounces.....	45	20
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and a half.....	50	25

And so on, adding five cents extra for every additional half ounce.

The same scale of reckoning by half ounces is applicable to Letters to and from the United States, but the rate on such Letters is ten cents per half ounce.

On Packet Letters to and from the United Kingdom, the scale of rates is as follows:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.....	30	12½
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce.....	35	15
A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces.....	40	20
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces.....	45	25
A Letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces.....	50	30

In the foregoing scale it will be observed that half ounces are not noticed after the first ounce, but two more rates are added as soon as the weight exceeds each additional ounce.

In all cases where a Letter is not specially directed to be sent by any particular route, the rate of Postage first mentioned is chargeable. It must also be understood that the rates given in the above Table for places to which the route is through the United Kingdom, are rates "via Halifax," or "via Canadian Packet," by which routes all such correspondence will be sent, if not specially addressed "via United States," or "via New York," in which case an additional rate of 4½ cents is to be added to the amount given in the Table.

It is advisable that all Letters should be prepaid, and by Postage Stamps. Printed Books, Periodicals, Publications, or Pamphlets, under 48 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in New Brunswick, at the rate of one cent an ounce.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent),

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shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, Parliamentary or Government paper.

Any violation of these Regulations will subject such Newspapers, Pamphlets, Periodicals, or Books, &c., to be treated in every respect as Letters.

To United States, one cent per ounce.

Nova Scotia, one cent per ounce.

Canada, one cent per ounce.

Prince Edward Island, one cent per ounce.

England, under 3 ounces, 7 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 12½ cents; 8 ounces and under 1 lb., 25 cents; 1 lb. and under 1½ lb., 37½ cents; 1½ lb. to 2 lb., 50 cents.

To Newfoundland, same as England.

France, under 3 ounces, 5 cents; 3 ounces and under 4 ounces, 9 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 17 cents; 8 ounces and under 1 lb., 24 cents; 1 lb. and under 1½ lb., 30 cents; 1½ lb. to 2 lb., 37 cents.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is 5 cents; to England, 12½ cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Province, at a rate of 25 cents per lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 1 foot in length or breadth, or 5 inches in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Registration fee 5 cents. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

POSTAGE STAMPS.—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of 1 cent; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents per Cunard steamer, via Halifax; 17 cents via United States for England.

When Money Orders exceeding \$100 in aggregate amount are issued in one day and to the same person, by one or more Offices upon another Office, the Postmaster of the Office drawn upon (if necessary) may delay the pay of such Orders for six days.

All Money Orders shall be drawn upon Printed Forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular Printed Forms.

The Commission to be charged upon Money Orders shall be as follows:—

PHILOSOPHY OF CURING HAY.—As to the proper time of cutting hay, and the philosophy of curing, the following from the *Ohio Farmer* is sensible and to the point: "Don't dry your hay too much. Hay may be dried till it is as worthless as straw. As a good coffee-maker would say, 'don't burn your coffee, but brown it,' so we say, don't dry your hay, but cure it." Our good mothers, who relied upon herb tea instead of apothecary's medicine, gathered their herbs when in blossom, and cured them in the shade. This is the philosophy of making good hay. Cut in the blossom and cure in the shade. The sugar of the plant, when it is in bloom, is in the stalk, ready to form the seeds. If the plant is cut earlier, the sugar is not there; if later, the sugar has become converted to woody matter. Hay should be well wilted in the sun, but cured in the cock. Better to be a little too green than too dry. If, on putting it into the barn, there is danger of heating in the mow, put on some salt. It is said by some that lime is equally as good as salt."

DON'T DESPISE SMALL THINGS.—Some years ago a gentleman visiting a farmer took from his pocket a small potato, which somehow had got in there at home. It was thrown out with a smile, and the farmer taking it in his hand to look at it, a curious little boy of twelve standing at his elbow asked him what it was. "Oh," said he, "nothing but a potatoe, my boy; take and plant it, and you shall have all you can raise from it till you are free." The lad took it, and the farmer thought no more about it at the time. The boy, however, not despising small potatoes, carefully divided it into as many pieces as he could find eyes, and put them into the ground. The product was carefully put aside in the fall and planted in the spring, and so on till the fourth year, when the yield being good, the actual product was four hundred bushels! The farmer seeing the prospect that the potato field would, by another year, cover his whole farm, asked to be released from his promise! Let us not despise small things.

THE LAUGHING PHILOSOPHER.—The man that laughs is a doctor without a diploma; his face does more good in a sick room than a bushel of powder or a gallon of bitter draughts. People are always glad to see him; their hands instinctively go half way to meet his grasp, while they turn involuntarily from the clammy touch of the dyspeptic who speaks in the groaning key. He laughs you out of your faults, while you never dream of being offended with him, and you know not what a pleasant world you are living in, until he points out sunny streaks on its pathway.

TO CURE PUTRID SORE THROAT.—Mix one gill of strong apple vinegar, one teaspoonful of strained honey, and half a pod of red pepper (or half a teaspoonful of ground pepper), boil them together to proper consistency. Then pour into half a pint of sage tea. In severe cases, half a teaspoonful every half hour for a child; one teaspoonful for an adult. As the canker decreases, lessen the frequency of the doses.

TO REMOVE GREASE SPOTS.—Put on powder of French chalk, and place a piece of blotting paper over it; then pass a hot iron over the blotting paper. The heat liquifies the grease; the chalk absorbs it, and the excess of grease is absorbed by the blotting paper.

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HOW TO MAKE A BARNYARD.—The best way to form a barnyard for the preservation of manure, without its becoming muddy, where the ground is higher than some of the surrounding parts, is to plough and scrape from the centre to the outside, making a gradual descent from the outside to the centre. Let the fall be one-half foot in ten, and falling a little more as you near the centre. Dig a drain from the centre to some suitable place without the yard, where you can construct a vat to put in leaves, sods, muck, &c., that will absorb and retain the liquor from the yard. The bottom and sides may be formed of plank, or may be more substantially built of stone and mortar. The top of the vat should be made so as to guard against rains and surface water as much as possible. The drain should fall considerably, and should be made of plank, eight inches high, and one foot inside. The head of the drain should be covered over with a good strong iron grate. The yard ought to be well paved with cobble stone, and with a little pains you can always have a dry yard. The water from the barn and sheds should never be allowed to run into the yard, but should be carried by good caved-troughs to a large cistern, for the purpose of watering stock.—*Working Farmer.*

THE CAUSE AND TREATMENT OF CHOLERA.—In summarising a communication to the *Medical Times and Gazette* on this important subject, Dr. John Chapman, among other conclusions, holds that "the primary cause of cholera is, as a general rule, the excessive heat of hot climates and of temperate climates in summer when cholera prevails;" that "the proximate cause of cholera is of precisely the same nature as that of summer, or choleraic diarrhoea, but that it is far more developed, and consequently that its action is proportionately more powerful and intense;" that "cholera is neither contagious nor infectious in any sense whatsoever, except through the depressing influence of fear; and "that cholera may be completely averted, and, when developed, cured by the persistent application of the spinal ice-bag along the whole spine so long as any symptom of the disease continues."

HOW OFTEN DOES CHRISTMAS DAY FALL ON A SUNDAY?—It is calculated that Christmas Day falls on the Sunday on an average once in seven years. The cycle is twenty-eight years (the days of the week multiplied by four, a bissextile period), within which period Christmas Day occurs four times on a Sunday. Taking next Sunday as the end of a cycle, Christmas Day will happen on a Sunday in the years 1870, 1884, 1887, 1892—being six, eleven, six, and five years respectively. One leap year occurs in the first period, and one in the third period, completing the week in six years. Two leap years occur in the fourth period, completing the week in five years; while three leap years occur in the second period, completing the fortnight in eleven years, and leaping over the Sunday in 1876. The year 1892 will be the next in which the days of the week and the month will correspond with 1864. An interruption to the regularity of the cycle will take place in 1901, which will be a leap year.

Damp tea-leaves, scattered over a carpet before sweeping, improve the colors, and give it a clean, fresh look.

A CHEAP AND NOVEL WEATHER-GLASS.—There is in "Hone's Every-day Book," page 491, a letter giving an account of a weather-glass, used for several years by a gentleman on whose veracity the author could depend. This strange barometer consisted of a common eight-ounce phial, filled to within one-fourth of its space with water, and having therein a leech-worm; the water was changed once a week in fine or summer weather, and once a fortnight in cold or winter weather; the mouth of the phial was stopped with a piece of fine canvas, and hung near a window in the room where the gentleman dressed. In fine weather the leech-worm remained motionless at the bottom of the phial, rolled together in a spiral form; and as long as he saw him in that position in the morning, he was certain the day would be fine; if the day was to be wet or showery, he was sure to find him creep up to the top of his habitation, and he remained there till the weather cleared up. If wind or storms were near, it ran and galloped through the liquid, nor ever rested until the tempest began to blow violently. If thunder and rain were near, it generally kept out of the water for two or three days previous thereto, and discovered great uneasiness by throes and convulsions. In frost, as in fine weather, it kept its place at the bottom; before snow it crept up to the very mouth of the phial. From these observations on the leech-worm, the owner was always able to foresee what sort of weather was likely to be expected; and as the cost or trouble of such a weather glass is so trifling, readers can readily make a trial, and then they can judge from their own experience of the truth of the statement.

HOW TO MAKE GOOD COFFEE.—"Thick as mud," muttered the husband of a shiftless wife who never made good coffee. "How is it that at O's and B's we always get such delicious coffee. Clear as amber, dashed with real cream, it is a dish fit for the gods—but this!" and a wry mouth, made in expressive silence, finished the remark. His wife fretted, and made some peevish reply. Had we known the parties we could have told them how clear, good coffee may always be had with little trouble or expense—thus:—To have good coffee it is best to buy a bag—if your purse be large enough—and roast it yourself, as required. When ground, beat it up well with a little cold water and white of egg, (one egg will do for three times), pour boiling water on it; then boil ten minutes; after which again pour in about a cup of hot water, and stand aside to settle for five minutes. In this way you cannot fail to have good coffee.

Beef tea is best made by cutting up tender, juicy beef in bits about one inch square, and put it in a strong bottle, corking it tightly, and set it in a kettle of cold water. Boil it about two hours. The fluid thus obtained will be the pure nutriment of the meat, and its tonic effects are powerful. Physicians have considered it better than alcoholic stimulants in cases of extreme exhaustion, where there is a feverish tendency in the patient.

TO KEEP BUGS FROM VINES.—Take the feathers from a hen's wing, dip them in spirits of turpentine, and stick one or two in a hill. After every shower it will be necessary to dip them again.

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A DARK HOUSE.—A dark house is always an unhealthy house, always an ill-aired house, always a dirty house. Want of light stops growth, and promotes scrofula, rickets, &c., among children. People lose their health in a dark house, and if they get ill they cannot get well again in it. Three out of many negligences and ignorances in managing the health of houses generally, I will here mention as specimens. First, that the female head in charge of any building does not think it necessary to visit every hole and corner of it every day. How can she expect that those under her will be more careful to maintain her house in a healthy condition than she who is in charge of it? Second, that it is not considered essential to air, to sun and clean rooms while uninhabited; which is simply ignoring the first elementary notion of sanitary things, and laying the ground for all kinds of diseases. Third, that one window is considered enough to air a room. Don't imagine that if you who are in charge don't look to all these things yourself, those under you will be more careful than you are. It appears as if the part of the mistress was to complain of her servants and to accept their excuses—not to show them how there need be neither complaints nor excuses made.—*Florence Nightingale.*

MALARIA.—This atmospheric poison has been proved to be caused by the decomposition of organized matter, and it exists to some extent everywhere. Vegetation both grows and dies, and in the soil its decomposition goes on at various rates. Soils generally are acidulous; but a rich, highly-manured, warm soil is alkaline. Where most alkali exists, there is a greater facility for the escape of vapours, such as we suppose to be hurtful. The extreme condition of putrescence may be very readily produced in a soil by artificial means; the use of a little ammonia, for example, more than vegetation will bear. The substances putrify until the whole becomes fetid in the highest degree. We have then a soil rich in organic matter, and undrained—a swamp of the worst form if the soil be not very poor; worse, perhaps, than was ever seen in nature. It is artificial malaria. We can, then, produce malaria from the soil by fostering some of its tendencies. Cold weather tends to produce acidity of the soil; hence malaria is always diminished with a lower temperature. When a warm alkaline soil is washed with water and exposed to the air, decomposition is stopped, and it sends forth less malaria. Drainage is the most effectual method of preventing malaria arising from swampy districts.

GERANIUM LEAVES FOR CUTS.—Miss Fry says it is not generally known that the leaves of geraniums are an excellent application for cuts, where the skin is rubbed off, and other wounds of that kind. One or two leaves must be bruised, and applied on linen to the part, and the wound will become cicatrized in a very short time.

TREATMENT OF BURNS AND SCALDS.—Cold water is the readiest, surest, most plentiful, and for these reasons the best remedy for burns and scalds. Use it instantly, it will remove pain and smarting; keep a cloth wet and cold upon the affected part four or five hours after the injury has occurred, a blister will never rise, and the skin will be quite free from pain afterward.

CARPET SWEEPING.—Take a common wash-tub or some vessel large enough to admit a broom freely, and put in clean cold water to the depth of a foot or more. Then take a broom (one partly worn, so as to be a little stiff, is the best), dip it in six inches or so, and hold over the tub, or go out of doors and knock off all the drops of water. This can be done most effectually by holding it in one hand and rapping it with the other on the broom corn above where it is wet. Commence brushing lightly at first, going over with it a second time, or more, and if your carpet is very dusty, do not sweep more than a square yard or two before dipping your broom into the water again; this will rinse off all the particles of dust adhering to the broom. Rap off the drops of water, as before, and begin again; continue to do so until the whole is cleaned. Should the water get very dirty before completing the room, it can be changed. One who has never tried the experiment will probably be surprised at the quantity of dirt which will be washed from the broom into the water. A carpet can be cleaned more effectually in this way than it can possibly be done with a dry broom, as the particles of dust adhere to the broom instead of rising, to fall back on the carpet. There is no danger of injuring even a fancy carpet, if the drops of water are thoroughly removed from the broom. Let no one try this who has not time and patience.

SALTING AND PACKING PORK.—A correspondent of the *American Agriculturist* gives the following directions on this subject:—"I will tell you my mode after an experience of forty years. I allow the hogs to cool after killing; take out the bones (ribs and spine); cut off the hams and shoulders; then cut the side pork into strips of convenient width; put in a quantity of salt in the bottom of the cask; then put in a course of meat, laying the pieces on the edges; then a covering of salt; then another course of meat, and so on until the cask is full. The whole is carefully kept covered with brine as strong as salt and boiling water will make, skimming the boiling brine so long as anything rises. The brine is put on cold, and I am careful to know that there is always undissolved salt in the barrel. It is not found necessary to scald the brine in spring. I sometimes use saltpetre and sometimes not. Hams and shoulders are salted in separate casks."

TO MAKE HEAD-CHEESE OR POTTED-HEAD.—Take the heads, tongues, feet, and other pieces, if you choose. Make them clean and soak them. Then boil until they will slip from the bones easily. Chop and season with salt, black pepper, cloves, sage or sweet majorain rubbed fine. Mix well and place it in a pan; set a tablet on the top with a weight upon it. In two days it will be cold and fit for use. Turn it out and cut it in slices for tea, or supper.

VITALITY OF SEEDS.—Parsnip, rhubarb, and other thin, scaly seeds, keep for one year. Carrot, cress, okra, gumbo, onions, peas, peppers, and small herbs in general, for two years. Asparagus, egg-plant, endive, lettuce, mustard, parsley, for three years. Cabbage, cauliflower, corn, radish, sea kale, turnips, for four years.

When you cut India rubber, keep the blade of your knife wet, and you can then cut it without difficulty.

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We have heard of and tested a great many kinds of waterproof blacking for winter boots. Let us tell you what we have tried for two winters, and found to be the best article we know of. When your boots are stiff and you think need oiling, wash them in castile soap-suds—oil before the leather dries, (you may use blackball or any kind of grease;) have a saturated solution of gum shellac in alcohol—anybody can make it, as all there is to be done is to dissolve in a pint or half-pint of alcohol just as much shellac as the liquid will take up—and apply this solution with a sponge to the oiled boots. In two or three minutes the shellac will dry and harden, and you will have a coating on your boots through which the water cannot by any possibility penetrate. Try it, reader.—*Germantown Telegraph.*

WINTER SOUP.—Take carrots, turnips, and the heart of a head of celery, cut into dice, with a dozen button onions; half boil them in salt and water, with a little sugar in it; then throw them into the broth; and, when tender, serve up the soup; or use rice, dried peas, and lentils, and pulp them into the soup to thicken it. With many of these soups, small suet dumplings, very lightly made, and not larger than an egg, are boiled either in broth or water, and put into the tureen just before serving, and are by most persons thought an improvement, but are more usually put in plain gravy soup than in any other, and should be made light enough to swim in it.

A WORD TO BOYS.—Begin early in life to collect libraries of your own. Begin with a single book, and when you find or hear of any first rate book, obtain it, if you can. After-awhile another, as you are able, and be sure to read it. Take the best care of your books. In this way, when you are men, you will have good libraries in your heads as well as on your shelves.

TO STOP LEAKAGE AROUND CHIMNIES.—Remove the shingles, and fit them again close to the sides of the chimney; then mingle a lot of coal-tar and sand together, making a stiff paste; spread it neatly all around the chimney on the roof, and press it down hard, and the water will be effectually excluded. This plastic material will adhere to both the brick and the shingles, and neither frost, rains nor dry weather will cause it to peel off.

TO PRESERVE WOOLLENS FROM MOTHS.—The simplest and best way of preserving woollens through the summer from the destruction of moths, is to wrap them well up, after brushing and beating them, in cotton or linen cloths. The moth can pass neither. Two covers well wrapped around and secured from the air, will be sufficient. An old sheet will answer.

PLAIN CORN STARCH PUDDING.—Set upon the fire one quart of milk; take three spoonfuls of corn starch, and mix with a very little cold milk, with some sugar, and a little lemon juice. Pour it into the boiling milk, stirring briskly for two or three minutes. Pour it into a mould and set to cool.

The flavor of common molasses is much improved by boiling and skimming it before using.

MEDICAL USE OF SALT.—In many cases of disordered stomach a teaspoonful of salt is a certain cure. In the violent internal agony termed cholera, add a teaspoon of salt to a pint of cold water, drink it, and go to bed; it is one of the speediest remedies known. The same will revive a person who seems almost dead from a heavy fall. In an apoplectic fit, no time should be lost in pouring down water, if sufficient sensibility remains to allow of swallowing; if not, the head must be sponged with cold water until the sense returns, when salt will completely restore the patient from the lethargy. In a fit, the feet should be placed in warm water, with mustard added, and the legs briskly rubbed, all bandages removed from the neck, and a cool apartment procured, if possible. In many cases of severe bleeding at the lungs, and when other remedies failed, Dr. Rush found that two teaspoons of salt completely stayed the blood. In case of a bite from a mad dog, wash the part with a strong brine for an hour, and then bind on some salt with a rag. In toothache, warm salt and water held to the part, and removed two or three times, will remove it in most cases. If the gums be affected, wash the mouth with brine. If the teeth be covered with tartar, wash them twice a day with salt and water. In swelled neck, wash the part with brine, and drink it, also, twice a day, until cured. Salt will expel worms, if used in food in a moderate degree, and aid digestion; but salt meat is injurious, if used much.

CLEANING MILK VESSELS.—A correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette says there is no product of the farm that presents so much difference as butter. This arises chiefly from using vessels for holding milk, and utensils in making the butter, which are soured. Milk has a peculiar acid, very easily formed, which entirely takes away that rich, sweet flavor belonging to good butter. A very little soured milk or cream on vessels rapidly generates enough acid to take it away. To avoid this, great care is requisite. Cleanliness only is not sufficient, in having the vessels well washed, but they must be carefully washed in boiling hot water, and should be boiled in it also. But as cream is very apt to stick, even in good washing, when the vessels are boiled in water, some pearl ash or soda should be put in it, which destroys any acidity that may be about the vessels. They should then be sunned. I have known some good butter-makers who dispensed with the sunning when soda was used, but both are recommended.

Calves should be fed in winter very differently from the manner in which, we may say, they are almost universally treated in this country. They should be fed on fine English or Interval hay, with a quart of oats apiece, or an equivalent in turnips or carrots. They should be fed regularly, and allowed to run loose, with enough bedding to keep them dry. Observant farmers say one quart of grain per day, during the first winter, will do more towards fitting the animal for the butcher when it is rising three, than four quarts a day fed at that period. This is a fact well worthy of attention, and one the economy of which cannot be questioned.—*New Brunswick Farmer.*

N. B.—The day of the week on which any month begins, comes also on the 8th, 15th, 22d, and 29th of the same month. Commit this to memory.

ASHES.—Take especial care of all the ashes made on your place. Don't permit them to be exposed to the weather, but keep them under cover. Five bushels of ashes, mixed with two double horse cart loads of marsh river mud, muck and peat, will convert the whole into good manure. A hoghead or two of soap suds will do the same thing; therefore, among your other savings, save and utilize them.

A strip of thick paper laid over the edge of each stair, under the carpet, will preserve a stair carpet from wearing through *one-third* longer than otherwise.

Be sure and cover the bits of your bridles with leather, to prevent the frost making the mouths of your horses sore. It is downright cruelty to put an iron bit into a horse's mouth on a cold morning. If you doubt it, bit yourself some day when the mercury stands below zero.

Persons troubled by bed bugs will be glad to hear that by putting into water as much Corrosive Sublimate as will dissolve, and doing the joints of the bedsteads and cracks of ceilings a few times, the bugs will entirely disappear.

CREAM SPONGE CAKE.—Beat two eggs in a teacup, fill the cup full with thick sweet cream, one cup of white sugar, one of flour, one teaspoonful of cream-tartar, half a one of soda, season with lemon, bake in a long tin.

COTTAGE PUDDING.—One egg; one tablespoon sugar; one tablespoon sour cream; one cup sweet milk; two teaspoons cream of tartar; one teaspoon of soda; one pint of flour. Bake half an hour. Serve with any sauce. Sweetened cream is good.

Table for Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year.

This Table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years' actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon, in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

This Line connects Saint Andrews and also Houlton and Woodstock, with the Steamers between St. John and Boston, owned by the Int. Steamboat Company.

RAILWAYS IN COURSE OF CONSTRUCTION AND PROJECTED.

St. Stephen Branch Railway, 18 miles long, to connect St. Stephen and Calais with the St. Andrews Railway, under construction by the St. Stephen Branch Railway Company.

Woodstock Branch Railway, 13 miles long, to connect the St. Andrews Railway with Woodstock and Iron Mines, located by Woodstock Branch Railway Company.

With these lines completed, Woodstock will be distant from St. Andrews 94 miles; from St. Stephen, 83 miles.

Railway from Moncton to Truro, 108 miles, under contract with the International Contract Company of London, subsidized by the Governments of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, to be completed in four years.

Western Extension of E. & N. A. Railway, from St. John to Bangor, distance 198 miles, under contract conditionally from the E. & N. A. Company of Maine, and the Company for Western Extension in New Brunswick, to be completed in four years.

These Lines, when built, will make the connection complete between Halifax, St. John, and the American Railroad system. Distances will be:
