





ITALY IS PREPARED TO JUSTIFY COURSE

Documents Will Show Extraordinary Patience Exercised in Negotiations.

EMISSARY TO LEAVE Pope and Advisors Refused Request Made by German Deputy.

ROME, via Paris, May 18, 4:25 a.m.—A Green Book which the government is preparing will contain diplomatic documents from the beginning of the war and the strenuous efforts made by the Italian Government to reconcile the obligations of the triple alliance with Italian national aspirations and the principles of nationality, on which is based the existence of Italy and the hopes of future greatness.

EMISSARY EXPULSED The German deputy, Matthias Erzberger, leader of the Clerical Centre in the Reichstag, who has been in Rome for a time on a special mission to the Holy See, sought permission to remain in the Vatican, but the Pope and his advisors refused to accede to this request to avoid serious embarrassment in the event of decisive action by Italy.

BIG FIGHTING IN EAST Russians Check Austro-Germans' Attempt to Drive Them From San.

LONDON, May 18.—The British first army to the north of La Bassee and the French forces to the south of this town continue their offensive against the German line and still are making progress. The German official statement declares that all the offensive movements against the Germans have been repulsed. In the reports of the fighting along the Yser, the Germans admit a retirement in the east. Heavy fighting is in progress in the east. It would appear that the allies again have incited the Germans to counter-attacks, both on the Yser and in the Arras region, and that to the north of La Bassee the British are doing the attacking.

### TORPEDO AIMED AT TRANSYLVANIA

Passengers Say Submarine Appeared Off Northwest Coast of Ireland.

### TORPEDO WAS FIRED

Liner's Captain Turned Ship and Pursued a Zig-Zag Course.

LONDON, May 18.—The Cunard line steamer Transylvania, which arrived at Glasgow yesterday from New York, encountered a submarine off the northwest coast of Ireland at about 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon, according to the statement of passengers who arrived in London today.

They say that the submarine appeared at a distance estimated variously at 400 to 800 yards away. The periscope and part of the conning tower were in sight for several minutes. The Transylvania captain immediately turned the ship and steered a zigzag course until the danger was past.

Torpedo Missed. Some of the passengers declare that the submarine discharged a torpedo at the Transylvania, and that they saw a white streak of foam marking the point of the projectile. This is disputed by others, who say that such statements are imaginative.

## EDITOR OF AURORA BANNER IS DEAD

Sylvester H. Lundy Was One of Best Known Figures in North York.

## MANY CONNECTIONS

Was Prominently Identified With Methodist Church - Liberal in Politics.

The death of Sylvester H. Lundy of Aurora, for 45 years editor and proprietor of the Aurora Banner, took place at the family residence in that town shortly before noon yesterday after an illness extending over several weeks.

The late Mr. Lundy received his early education at the common and Newmarket schools, and for nine years followed the teaching profession in York and Aurora Counties, and in 1870, in company with his brother, H. D., bought out the Aurora Banner, which he has, inconjunctively with his son, Charles, conducted ever since.

In 1874 Mr. Lundy was appointed town clerk, a position which he held with credit to himself and the town of Aurora. In 1870 he was united in marriage to Margaret E. Perry, of King Township, who still survives. The members of the family are Mrs. Johnstone of Aurora, Toronto, wife of P. W. Johnston, the manager of the Lincoln Paper Mills Company of Toronto; Roy H. Johnston, living in Toronto, and Charles, associated with his father in the management of the paper.

Mr. Lundy was for many years the local representative of the C.P.R. in Aurora, and associated fraternally with the Royal Templars, Masons, Oddfellows and Porriters, and in religious life prominently identified with the Methodist Church. He was an ardent Liberal, and on several occasions been mentioned for political preferment. In the death of Mr. Lundy, North York loses a broad-minded and progressive citizen. The funeral takes place on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 to Aurora Cemetery.
