Practical Imperialism is Doorer by His Death

London Post's Tribute to Prefontaine—Plan to Lessen Ocean Route—Watermains for Toronto.



(Canadian Associated Press Cable) London, Dec. 23.—The Post this morning pays editorial tribute to the late Mr. Prefontaine, and says his ungrudging toil on behalf of the Canadian navy was undoubtedly an indirect cause of his premature death. Referring to the action of the British government sending the warship it says it is following an admirable precedent set after the death of Sir John Thompson, and adds "it would seem that this act of respect and regret, no more than what is due to the inventor of the idea of a Canadian naval reserve, has touched the heart of the French-Canadian people." The late minister it continues "was an industrious worker, and in nothing was his capacity for hard work so strikingly displayed as in the recent negotiations with the admiralty. Had he been spared he would have been a practical imperialist. His loss will be mourned with equal ardour in French Canada, and in the British provinces, in France and Great Britain people of both mother countries will unanimously applaud the prompt decision of the government to convey the body to Halifax in His Majesty's battleship Dominion in accordance with the precedent suggested, we believe, by Queen Victoria."

2500 NEW VOTERS ON LIST. NAMES IN WHITE P.D. AREA.

But No One Can Tell Within Thousands What Polling Will Be - How to Vote.

How many voters in the municipal elections are there in Toronto? No body knows.

"I couldn't say within 10,000," is what City Clerk Littlejohn says.

He points out that there are too many districts in the voters list to allow any idea of the number of individual voters.

For instance, a property owner with holdings in each of the six wards, would have his name on the list that number of times.

There will be more voters this year than last can be said. Altogether, about 2,500 new names have been added to the list including the qualified ones of the newly annexed Avenue Road district.

Under the beginning of the year, the under-income will be distributed in the polling on Jan. 1.

In staking up the voting strength, it is being noted that in the 1905 majority battle, 25,282 votes were cast, while the total vote in the 1904 election divided as follows: Ward one, 658; ward two, 1,651; ward three, 1,875; ward four, 1,547; ward five, 1,475; ward six, 1,442.

How to Vote. There are probably a good many citizens whose ideas as to just how and how to vote in the municipal elections are not so clear.

Four votes for controllers, not more than one vote for any candidate. An elector may vote for a less number of candidates than four if he or she so desires.

Three votes for aldermen for each ward in which he or she has a vote. An elector may vote for more than one candidate. An elector may vote for more than six if he or she so desires.

Six votes for members of the board of education, but not more than one vote for any candidate. An elector may vote for more than six if he or she so desires.

If the elector has a vote at more than one polling place, he or she must vote for mayor, controllers and members of the board of education at the polling place where he or she is resident.
