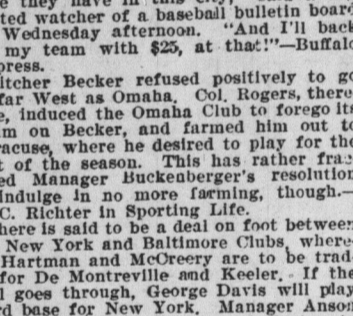

When Director Blue of the Ontario Bureau of Mines undertook to publish the reports of his department in timely instalments instead of holding them back for a year, as heretofore, he made a good move.

The market continues very weak and the few bullish factors which have of late been dimly visible are completely overshadowed by the large falling off in the Argentine shipments and a probable large decrease in the Chicago board September wheat declined 2 3/4¢ per bushel, the June and July derivatives being 2 3/4¢ and 2 1/2¢ respectively, and the December option 2 1/2¢.
