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



ONLY CUT \$400 IN 6 HOURS

This Shows How Fine the Board of Control Had Pined Down the Estimates for 1900.

BIG OVERDRAFTS OF LAST YEAR

Are Partially Responsible for the Taxation This Year, so the Controllers Say.

After a six hours session of the Board of Control yesterday only succeeded in making a reduction of \$2400, so closely had each item been pared by the Board of Control. Out of this amount \$2000 was transferred to the debtors account, so practically a cut of \$400 was all that was made. Afternoon and evening sessions were held, and the whole of the time was devoted entirely to the one subject, and if the long discussion had not the effect of a depleted treasury, well it was beneficial to the aldermen, inasmuch as it gave them an opportunity of becoming more intimately acquainted with the finances of the city.

Aid Sheppard in Charge.

Aid Sheppard, as vice-chairman of the Board of Control, presented the draft estimates and delivered his budget speech. He was carefully prepared, well delivered, and was not usually lengthy. He began by saying that the Board of Control had a heavy task before it, and that the estimates for 1900 were a heavy one. He then proceeded to discuss the various items of the estimates, and to point out the places where a reduction could be made. He concluded by saying that he was confident that the Board would be able to make a reduction of \$2400, and that he was sure that the aldermen would be satisfied with the result.
