Five Financial Institutions at the Junction—Special Council Meeting To-Night.

Toronto Junction, April 23.—Frank Ricks, foreman of the men in the Canada Cycle and Motor Company's works, was yesterday presented with a handsome traveling case by the employees on the eve of his departure for Midland, where he will spend the summer for the benefit of his health.

This will give the town four banks, and it is rumored that the Bank of Toronto will open up a fifth in its building at the northeast corner of Dundas and Keele-streets, at present occupied by E. R. Rogers, who will build on his vacant lot a few doors east of his present premises on Dundas street.

Customers Officer A. B. Rice will take possession of the office in the new postoffice building to-morrow morning. It will be some weeks before the post-office will be ready for occupation.

The funeral of the late Mr. Stephenson was held at St. Philip's Church, and in political life a Liberal-Conservative. He was survived by a widow and one son, George H. Stephenson, of Toronto. The funeral will take place at St. Philip's Church, Unionville, on Tuesday, April 25.

FIREMEN FRIENDLESS

IN ASKING HIGHER SCALE

Board of Control Argument for a Fixed Tax Rate is Not Everywhere Approved.

The fate of the firemen's salary increase to be decided this week has become more than an event of interest to the firemen only. It is being contemplated upon among downtown businessmen, and it might do the board of control some good, to hear some of the expressions of opinion.

An ex-president of the board of trade, in conversation, said that the fire and light committee's recommendations, and that he thought they should carry considerable weight. He thought the efforts of the board of control to fix a salary scale were foolish in view of the fact that the expenditure for the year would go beyond the figures upon which the rate could properly be based, and that it would probably mean a further burden upon the following year.

While unwilling to venture a second opinion on the merits of the firemen's case, he said that he was not in favor of the fire department, as it was impressed with one of the arguments advanced, and that the fire department was a necessary part of the city.
