London, April 27.—The war graves commission has decided unanimously on absolute uniformity of headstones for the graves of every man and woman who was killed or who died in the war.

Kipling and Winston Churchill, with other members of the commission, addressed a meeting of the army committee in the house of commons tonight.

ANTHRACITE MINERS TURN DOWN OFFER

Operators Proposed Wage Increase Averaging Around Fifteen Per Cent.

New York, April 27.—The general scale committee of the anthracite mine workers, at a meeting late today, rejected the counter offer of the operators, covering their wage demands.

SERIES OF STRIKES LOOMING IN CITY

BRITISH WARSHIPS ARE SOLD TO CHILE

Santiago, Chile, April 27.—A naval commission will leave immediately for England to bring back the warships Chile has purchased from Great Britain.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY CHILE

London, April 27.—No announcement of the sale of British warships to Chile has been made here. According to the admiralty, the first announcement must come from the Chilean government.

PACKERS' STRIKE AVERTED; BUTCHER WORKERS ACCEPT SIX CENTS PER HOUR MORE

EFFORTS TO CRUSH DENIKINE'S ARMY

Reds Preparing General Attack Before Britain Gets Soviet's Reply.

London, April 27.—General Wrangel, who is attempting to hold together the shattered forces of General Denikine in the Crimea until they are assured of protection, reported to British official quarters today that he had been able to reorganize the men sufficiently to withstand the isolated Bolshevik attacks.

LAUDS U. S. SENATE FOR BUTTING IN

Bishop of Killaloe Says Ireland Will Be Ever Grateful for Resolution.

Nenagh, Ireland, April 27.—Reservations to the treaty of Versailles, adopted in the United States senate on March 18, by which that body went on record as sympathizing with Ireland and declaring she should be admitted to the league of nations as soon as self-government is attained.

IRISH MAY TIE UP LIVERPOOL PORT

Liverpool, April 27.—The lord mayor today received a deputation representing Irish societies, which threatened that unless the Sinn Fein prisoners were released from Wormwood Scrubs Prison within 48 hours, the port of Liverpool and the industries would be held up by a strike of Irish workers.

DRAFTING SUBSTITUTE PEACE RESOLUTION

Washington, April 27.—The joint republican peace resolution will be considered again tomorrow by the senate foreign relations committee.

RED GOVERNOR OF PETROGRAD ASSASSINATED BY WORKMAN

New York, April 27.—Letters received here state that Zinovieff, Bolshevik governor of Petrograd, had been assassinated by a Russian workman.

Premier Drury Takes Stand That People Should Decide on Question of Liquor Importation Without Delay—Justifies Introduction by Private Member—Considers Recent Ballots Trick Ones.

By a vote of 85 to 12 the legislature last night passed the McCreary bill for a temperance referendum, thereby leaving to the decision of the people the momentous decision whether Ontario should or should not permit the importation of liquor into her boundaries.

H. Hartley Dewar, opposition leader, contended that the government could not legally take a vote of the people under the Dominion and Ontario as native wines were permitted to be sold within the province, his contention being that unless there was total prohibition of sale for beverage purposes the poor man could not take advantage of the terms of the act.

Z. Mageau (Sturgeon Falls), resuming the debate on the temperance bill, said hypocritically should be banished and some real temperance legislation result. If the O.T.A. was to be effective those guilty of a second offence should be penalized according to the statute, which meant a jail term.

J. G. Leitch thought there was a strong feeling in favor of prohibition. The temperance question should not be made a political football. He was in favor of taking another referendum.

Mr. Hearst brought in a measure to abolish the bar and about every thing except what you could get thru the doctor—by making a liar of yourself. He believed if the shops had been retained, and properly regulated under government control and no humbug about it, that a man who got bottles and abused it, should be put on the Indian list.

CANADA'S POSITION AN ANOMALOUS ONE

Objection to Washington Representation Raised in British House.

London, April 27.—The question of Canadian representation at Washington was raised in the house of commons today on the vote for the colonial office by Col. Arthur Murray, who said that while he believed Canadians generally were favorable to the idea, many saw the position would be an anomalous one, as Canada was an independent country and the authority of her representative would be impaired if it were subordinate to that of the British ambassador.

CAPTURE BARRACKS AFTER THREE HOURS

Hundred Men in Limerick County Burn Building and Wound Three Constables.

Tipperary, Ireland, April 27.—The Ballyard police barracks, in County Limerick, surrendered to 100 men who assaulted it with rifles and explosives this morning. The siege lasted three hours.

ONE WAY TO BEAT COST OF LIVING

Joliet, Ill., April 27.—Robert Needham, paroled three weeks ago after serving part of a sentence for burglary, scaled the walls of the state penitentiary from the outside early this morning and sneaked back into prison, because he found himself unable to cope with the high cost of living as a free man. Prison officials said it was the first time a convict had climbed the walls to get back into the penitentiary.

PRINCE ARRIVES IN NEW ZEALAND

Rotorua, N.Z., April 27.—The Prince of Wales arrived here today from Auckland. The Maoris here and at the stations along the route greeted the prince with their picturesque native ceremonies.

BRITAIN NOT REBATING TOLLS TO SHIPS USING PANAMA CANAL

Washington, April 27.—The British embassy advised the state department today that it had been authorized to deny reports that the British government was rebating to British ships tolls paid for passage thru the Panama Canal. The British government, the embassy said, only pays such tolls in cases where the government has vessels on time charter.

DEMANDS THAT FRANCE EVACUATE FRANKFORT

Berlin, April 27.—The Deutsche Zeitung says the German government is preparing a note to France, in which a demand will be made for the withdrawal of the allied troops from Frankfurt and other recently occupied districts. The demand will be based, says the newspaper, on the ground that the German troops in the Ruhr region have been reduced to the peace treaty stipulations.

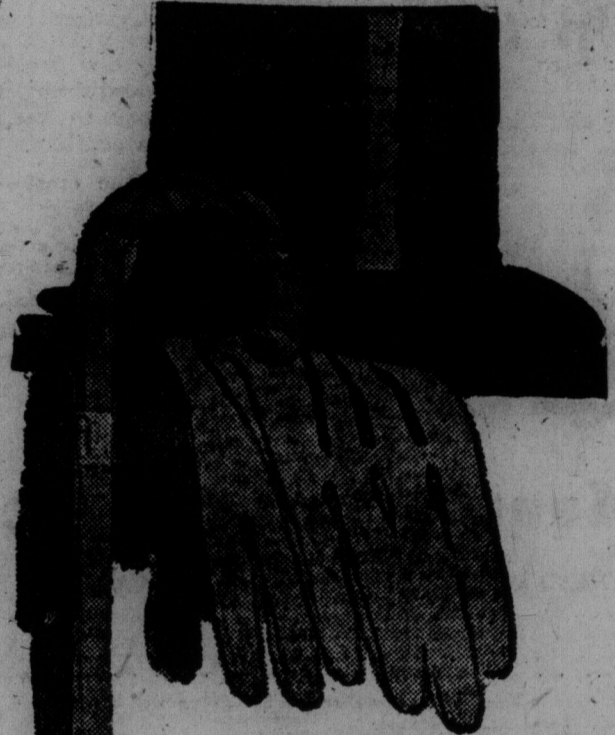

SENATE DISCUSSES MAGDALEN ISLANDS

Prince Edward Member States Government Supplies Ten Days Overdue.

Ottawa, April 27.—The question of supplies for the fishermen of the Magdalen Islands was brought to the attention of the senate today by Senator McLean of Prince Edward Island. He stated that the supplies for the season's fishing, including 120 gallons of gasoline needed for fishing boats, were aboard the government steamer Bealer now lying at Pictou, with a captain, but no crew. There were 6,500 people on the Magdalens depending on fishing; the lobster season had opened and the supplies should have reached the Magdalens ten days ago. Senator McLean said he had applied to the marine department and had been told that it had nothing to do with the boat as it had been handed over to the railway department. He had applied to the railway department and had been told that they had nothing to do with the boat as it had been handed over, and that application should be made to trade and commerce. The trade and commerce department stated that they had nothing to do with the matter, but that it was one for the care of the marine department. The boat was to be supplied between Charlottetown and Newfoundland during the summer and should have been at Magdalens ten days ago. A bill ratifying an agreement between the Dominion government and Ottawa was put thru the committee stage. DUTCH RESPONSIBLE FOR FORMER KAISER

Lloyd George, in Note, Puts It Up Squarely to Netherlands Government.

The Hague, April 27.—Responsibility for the continued residence in Holland of former Emperor William of Germany was placed squarely and exclusively on the Netherlands government in a note sent by Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain on March 23, and published today for the first time in the "orange book," containing documents relating to the demanded extradition of Count Hohenzollern. Mr. Lloyd George's note says: "The allied governments have learned of the royal decree assigning the former emperor a definite place of internment in Utrecht, this decree being accompanied by an undertaking by the Netherlands government to assume complete responsibility for the custody of the former emperor and control of his correspondence and relations with the outside world." The note pointed out that William, in spite of precautions, is a very serious danger, so long as left within 40 kilometres of the German frontier, and is a potent centre of reactionary propaganda and a constant menace to the peace of Europe.

EIGHT MILLIONS REALIZED AT NEW YORK FUR SALE

New York, April 27.—New York's annual spring fur auction came to a close today with total sales estimated at \$8,000,000. Beaver was the best seller of the day, and not only brought prices ranging from \$8.50 to \$50 each, but showed an advance of sixty per cent. over the corresponding prices at the spring sale here in 1919. Marmot also advanced sixty per cent. over last April, and northern and southwestern raccoon pelts, respectively, were 50 per cent. higher. Raccoon prices began at \$1 and ran up to \$15. Gray fox was 10 per cent. up, the only drop for the day being in Australian fox, which fell off 40 per cent. The next scale scheduled here by the New York fur auction sales corporation will begin on October 13.

MUST EVACUATE 20-MILE ZONE

Further Demands Made by Japanese on Russian Soviet in Siberia.

Vladivostok, April 27.—An aftermath of the first session of the Russian-Japanese commission for the liquidation of the events of April 4 and 5, when the Japanese took possession of Vladivostok, has been the publication in the newspapers of new demands by the Japanese command on the provisional government, that Russian armed forces, of whatever political party, must evacuate a 20-kilometre zone wherever Japanese troops are stationed in Siberia. These demands were made at the beginning of the session, and it was asked that they be kept secret, but M. Vilenky, the special soviet commissioner, gave them out to the press. Publication of the demands brought out a lengthy statement from the Japanese command, that, in view of the publicity the Russians were giving the proceedings of the commission, it was necessary to state the Japanese version of the events in Siberia since the formation of the provisional government. This statement placed responsibility on the Russian revolutionary command, which it says, has not been willing to co-operate with the Japanese command in Siberia. The new Japanese demands virtually mean liquidation of the Russian armed forces in far eastern Siberia. The reply of the Russian commission to the Japanese demands include an assurance of evacuation by the Russian forces after the Japanese forces have been withdrawn, which evacuation in some districts has already been announced. The Russians, however, insist on King Edward's favorite resorts.

KING ALFONZO FINED FOR WALKING ON GRASS

Madrid, April 27.—King Alfonso was fined two pesetas yesterday for walking across the grass in the gardens of the Alcázar. Every member of his suite, who followed the king across the greenward, likewise were fined. The first intimation of the royal party that it had committed an offence was when a gardener approached and said: "Your majesty, walking on the grass is forbidden. I must fine you, according to my instructions." At first King Alfonso was abashed; then he laughed and paid the money. Later the mayor of the town called at the palace and apologized to the king, but his majesty told him the gardener had acted properly and should be rewarded for devotion to duty.

HUDSON BAY LINE IS BEING CONTINUED

Minister of Railways Says No Truth in Report of Restricted Service.

Ottawa, April 27.—(By Canadian Press.)—The minister of railways and canals was asked today whether the statement alleged to have been made by some of the delegation which interviewed the government recently with regard to the Hudson Bay Railway was true, viz.: That the road was in such condition that it would not likely be fit for further operation. Hon. Dr. Reid stated there was no truth whatever in the report that service was to be discontinued. About 214 miles of the Hudson Bay line have been under operation up to the present, and the management of National Railways informed the minister that they intend renewing a large number of ties and doing some surface ballasting and such other necessary work as will maintain the service. A number of important mining centres have developed along the line, and it would not be in the public interest that the operation of the line should be discontinued.

SEARCHED VESSEL AT MONTVILLE

Expecting Eamonn de Valera

Belfast, April 27.—A special force of detectives boarded the Anchor Line steamer Columba on her arrival at Montville today, and minutely inspected the passengers and their passports. It is reported that they were searching for Professor Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," whom the authorities suspected was on board. A similar investigation took place at Londonderry when passengers were landed.
