

Paper Mill Workers' Convention Told of O.B.U. "Trail of Vilification."

Ottawa, Oct. 5.—"The One Big Un'on is an organization which set out two years ago to destroy the inter-national trade union movement. In-Trades and Labor Congress, who, on it attacked the international models. it attacked the international move-ment and officers, and sought to des-

Such was the reference of Mom Moore, president of the Dominion trades and labor congress, who, on behalf of that body and at the request of the secretary of the A.F.L., addressed over one hundred and thirty yisiting delegates, representing over visiting delegates, representing over 30,000 workers in the United States and Canada, who were in attendance today at the ninth biennial conven-tion of the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper mill

Reports of Difficulty in Financing Exports Have Bearish Influence.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Wheat prices collapsed today to a new low level. Heavy upturn in the market led to heavy selling and in the end buy.ng power faded away, with talk current that some difficulty had been met in financing wheat at the seaboard. The close was unsettled, 2½c to 6c net lower; December \$1.89½ to \$1.90, and March \$1.83½ to \$1.88½. Corn lost %c to 1½c, and oats a shade to 3½c to ½c. In provisions the outcome ranged from \$1.40 deeline to 72c advance.

At the outset in the wheat pit, a general rush to sell carried the market

At the outset in the wheat pit, a general rush to sell carried the market downward, but shorts covered freely and during most of the morning prices, althowidely fluctuating, averaged higher than yesterday's finish. Foreign buying of future deliveries was noted, and it was said France would purchase 85,000,000 bushels from Nov. 1 to July 1. After midday, however, sellers outnumbered buyers and in the last thirty minutes had almost a complete monopoly. Corn and oats were bearishly affected by the set-back of wheat values. Both the feed grains, as well as wheat, went to the lowest prices thus far on the crop.
