ASTRONOMICAL.

The Comet, Eclipses, &c.

DURING the Year 1834, the return of the COMET recorded by Dr. Halley, is expected. It is found to occupy a period of about 75½ Years in its course; it was first observed in the year 1456, toward the close of what are termed "the dark ages," when its appearance spread such consternation over all Europe—already indeed terrified by the rapid successes of the Turkish arms—that prayers were offered up generally, throughout the Western Church, in which both the Turks and the Comet were included, in one sweeping anathema! Its next appearance was in the year 1531, and subsequently in 1607, and 1682. The last time of its appearance was in 1759, when it passed its perihelion on March 12th, in that year.

Astronomers are generally agreed, that Comets are opaque bodies, enlightened by the Sun; and that they are of different magnitudes, may be inferred from their apparent diameters and brightness. Various conjectures have been formed respecting the tails of Comets; though it is acknowledged that they depend, somehow or other, on the Sun, and for this plain reason, that the tail of a comet is always turned from it. There has been no comet whose frequent returns have been so regularly depended upon as this; we may therefore expect its re-appearance about the month of SEPTEMBER, 1834—unless in its path it may meet with the influence of some attracting body to impede its course for a time, as was supposed to be the case with it, when it appeared in 1682; then it approached so near to Jupiter, as to cause its gravitation towards that planet, to be equal to one-fiftieth of its gravitation towards the Sun.

It is utterly impossible for us to pronounce, with any certainty, for what purpose these vast bodies traverse through the regions of space, crossing and re-crossing the orbits of the Planets. It has been supposed by some, that the supernatural irruption of the waters, or the "breaking up of the fountains of the great deep," at the Deluge, was occasioned by the approximation of a comet to the earth; and it has been conjectured that in the "fulness of time" one of these wandering bodies will be depputed the instrument of Divine Power in dissolving our habitable globe in ruins. By what means Providence may bring about this awful event, is to us a mystery: we can view the appearance of these erratic bodies with serenity, having the Word of Truth itself for our assurance, that no more change shall take place in the course of nature, until the final consummation of all things: and previous to that awful event many unfulfilled prophecies, recorded in scripture, have to receive their accomplishment. We make these remarks, because we are aware, it has ever been the opinion of weak and ignorant persons,

that the appearance of these mighty bodies are the forerunners of some dreadful calamity, or the destruction of the earth.

ECLIPSES.

During the Year 1834, there will be four Eclipses, which will happen in the following order.

The First will be an eclipse of the Sun, on Saturday, June 7th, and visible here.

Sun rises - - - - -	4 h. 26 min.	In the Morning.
Beginning of Eclipse -	5 h. 15 min.	
Middle ♂ - - - - -	5 h. 42 min.	
End - - - - -	6 h. 27 min.	

There will be about $1\frac{1}{2}$ digits eclipsed on the Sun's southern limb.

The Second will be an Eclipse of the Moon, on Saturday, June 21st, visible here, and total.

1 Digit will be eclipsed on the Sun's northern limb.

The Fourth will be an eclipse of the Moon, on Monday, December 15th, and will be visible.

End - - - - -	2 h. 51 min.	

About 8 digits will be eclipsed on the Moon's southern limb.

It is difficult to observe exactly either the beginning or ending of a lunar eclipse, even with a good telescope, because the earth's shadow is so faint and ill-defined about the edges, that when the moon is either just touching or leaving it, the obscuration of her limb is scarcely visible; and therefore, the nicest observers can hardly be certain to a few seconds of time; but both the beginning and ending of solar eclipses are instantaneously visible.

Among the many interesting phenomena, which take place in the glorious firmament of heaven, Eclipses are surely the most august and sublime. Men in all ages and in all climes, have considered them as the most wondrous spectacles that the works of the Creator exhibit. When the majestic orbs of heaven are shrouded in darkness, all animated nature seems to mourn, and to muse with the deepest anxiety on these great events. But with what different sensations are these scenes beheld by the different characters of

mankind, and the great, their misfortune to annihilate them as exterminator by the proofs of the infinite wisdom

Jupiter ♃ will be an Evening Star until May 9th; then a Morning Star throughout the year.

Mars ♂ will be a Morning Star until December 24th; and for the remainder of the year an Evening Star.

Mark the precise time on the Clock or Watch, when any Star vanishes behind a fixed object, as a chimney or house, from a small hole in another fixed object; do this again at the end of any number of nights, as in the Table, and if at the end of any number of nights the Star vanishes as much later as specified in the Table against the number of Nights since the first observation, the clock or watch measures true equal time, and agrees with the Solar time as it ought to do. If the difference in time is less than that specified in the Table, then the clock goes too fast, but if the time is greater, the clock goes too slow.

Besides these there are four small planetary bodies, lately discovered, viz. Ceres, Pallas, Vesta, and Juno.

The Planet Jupiter is accompanied by 4 moons or satellites, and is encompassed by several marks, called his belts.

Saturn has 7 satellites, and is surrounded by a broad luminous ring.

Georgium Sidus has 6 satellites, but on account of the great distance of the planet, a telescope of great powers is required to distinguish them.

EXPLANATION OF THE ABOVE SIGNS.

The *Zodiac*, (from *Zodion*, an animal,) is a belt, which goes quite round the heavens; it is about 16 degrees broad, so that it takes in all the orbits of the Planets and the Moon. The ancients divided the *Zodiac* into 12 constellations or clusters of stars, supposed to resemble some animal or figure. They took a vessel with a small hole in the bottom, and having filled it with water, suffered the same to distil drop by drop into another vessel set beneath to receive it: beginning at the moment when some Star rose, and continuing until it rose the next following night. The water fallen down into the receiver, they divided into twelve equal parts; and having two other small vessels in readiness, each of them fit to contain one part, they again poured all the water into the upper vessel, and observing the rising of some star in the *Zodiac*, they at the same time suffered the water to drop into one of the small vessels; and as soon as it was full, they shifted it, and set an empty one in its place. When each vessel was full, they took notice what Star of the *Zodiac* rose; and though this could not be done in one night, yet in many they observed the rising of twelve Stars or points, by which they divided the *Zodiac* into twelve parts.

Conjunction—Is when two Planets have the same Longitude.

Sextile—When two Planets are distant 60 Degrees, or 2 Signs.

Quartile—When two Planets are distant 90 Degrees, or 3 Signs.

Trine—When two Planets are distant 120 Degrees, or 4 Signs.

Opposition—When two Planets are in opposite Longitudes, 180 Degrees, or 6 Signs distant.

Ascending and Descending Nodes—Are the points of intersection of a Planet's orbit, with relation to that of the Ecliptic.

Apogee—Is a time which signifies when the Moon is in that part of her orbit which is most remote from the Earth: at such time the tides are lower than ordinary.

Perigee—Denotes when the Moon is in that part of her orbit which is nearest the Earth: the tides are then higher than ordinary.

infancy, and Astrology usurped the place of Astronomy, it was supposed that the Moon had a great influence upon man's constitution; and as each of the twelve signs of the Zodiac was supposed to hold dominion over one certain part of the body, it was hence argued that when the Moon was in any one particular sign, that any diseases incident to that particular part under the influence of such sign, were more violent; or that it was the best time to adopt remedies for such, when more immediately under the Moon's influence. But since the sun of true science has arisen upon the world, it has in a great measure, dispelled such erroneous conclusions, and the whole fabric of Astrology has fallen in ruins.

Astrology is a conjectural science, which teaches to judge of the effects and influences of the stars, and to foretel future events by the situation and different aspects of the heavenly bodies.

Judiciary or judicial astrology, is that which pretends to foretel moral events; i. e. such as have a dependency on the free will and agency of man; as if they were directed by the stars. This art, which owed its origin to the practices of knavery on credulity, is now universally exploded by the intelligent part of mankind.

The professors of this kind of astrology maintain, "That the heavens are one great volume or book, wherein God has written the history of the world; and in which every man may read his own fortune, and the transactions of his time. The art, say they, had its rise from the same hands as astronomy itself: while the ancient Assyrians, whose serene unclouded sky favoured their celestial observations, were intent on tracing the paths and periods of the heavenly bodies, they discovered a constant settled relation or analogy between them and things below; and hence were led to conclude these to be the Parcae, the Destinies, so much talked of, which preside at our births, and dispose of our future fate."

CHRONOLOGICAL, &c.

NOVA-SCOTIA.

The Province of Nova-Scotia is connected with North America, by a narrow isthmus, and is bounded on the North by the Strait of Northumberland, which separates it from Prince Edward Island; on the North-East by the Gut of Canso, which divides it from Cape Breton; on the South and South East, by the Atlantic Ocean, and on the West by the Bay of Fundy, and New Brunswick. It lies between the 43d and 46th degree of North Latitude, and between the 61st and 67th degree of Longitude, west of Greenwich. It is about 300 miles in length, but of unequal width; and embraces a superficies of 15,617 square miles, or 9,994,880 acres.

The Latitude of Halifax is $44^{\circ} 39' 26''$ North.

Longitude, 63° 37' 48" West.

Magnetic Variation, 0° 17' 10" Westerly.

All the calculations are precisely for the meridian of Halifax;

but will equally answer for any part of the Province of Nova-Scotia. With respect to the rising and setting of the Sun and Moon, and her southing, there can be but a few seconds of time difference, in places being east or west of Halifax; the same remark applies to the Eclipses.

EXPLANATION OF THE CYCLES.

Cycle of the Sun.—Is a revolution of 28 years, in which the days of the month return again to the same days of the week; the Sun's place to the same signs and degrees of the Ecliptic on the same days and months.

Golden Number.—Or Cycle of the Moon, is a revolution of 19 years, in which time the conjunctions, oppositions, and other aspects of the Moon are within an hour and a half of being the same as 19 years before, called the Golden Number, because ordered to be written in letters of gold in the Calendar, by Julius Caesar, who corrected the Calendar 46 years B. C.

Roman Indiction.—Is a revolution of 15 years, used only by the Romans for indicating the times of certain payments, made by the subjects to the Republic. It was established by Constantine, A. D. 312.

Number of Direction.—Is a limit of 35 days between March 22d, and April 25th, being the earliest and latest days on which Easter possibly can fall. Therefore the number of direction for any year shows how many days after the 22d of March, or before April 25th, Easter Day will happen on.

Dominical Letter.—The first seven letters of the alphabet are used for this purpose; and it is used to shew on what day of the month, Sunday will happen on throughout the Calendar.

Epact—Is the age of the Moon on the 1st day of January.

Julian Period.—Is an imaginary period, beginning 764 years before the creation, when all the Cycles were supposed to have begun together.

Anno Mundi.—Is the number of years since the creation of the world, according to the best Chronologists; that is found by adding 4004 years previous to the Birth of our Saviour, to 1834, the present year, being the number since that event.

Having given the rising, southing and setting of the Moon, for every day in the year, by attending to the remark inserted at the foot of the right hand page for February, the number of hours there will be moon-light, can be found with little trouble; which we apprehend will be a very great acquisition to persons having to travel by night.

If it be required to know the length of night at any time, it may easily be found, by doubling the time of sun rising, or by subtracting the length of the day from 24 hours.

Government.

The Government of England is a constitutional hereditary monarchy, in which the power of the Sovereign is controlled by the influence of the aristocracy in the House of Peers, and by that of the democracy in the House of Commons. The executive authority is vested in the King; the legislative, in the King and Parliament. The King has the power of appointing all the great officers of state, and all the executive acts of the government are performed in his name; but his ministers only are responsible for them.

Parliament.

The Parliament of Great Britain is the great council of the nation, constituting the legislature, which is summoned by the King's authority, to consult on public affairs, and enact and repeal laws. It consists of Lords Spiritual and Temporal, called the Peers, or Upper House; and Knights, Citizens or Burgesses, who are comprehended under the name of the Commons, or Lower House. The duration of Parliament was formerly for three years; but the Septennial Act, in 1715, extended the duration to seven years, unless dissolved by the King; but it seldom happens that Parliament sits out this period.

House of Lords or Peers.

The Lords Temporal are Peers of the Realm, and are hereditary Counsellors of the Crown; their honours, immunities and privileges are hereditary. A Peer may vote by proxy; when sitting in judgment he gives his vote not on *oath*, like a Commoner, but upon his *honour*. The persons of Peers are for ever sacred and inviolable from arrest and imprisonment for debts, trespasses, &c. They cannot be outlawed in any civil action; nor can any attachment lie against their persons; and they are possessed of various other privileges and immunities.

The number of the Lords Temporal is indefinite, and may be increased at the pleasure of the Crown. The ancient nobility sit in the house by *descent*; the new-made Peers, by *creation*; the 16 representative peers for Scotland, and the 28 representative peers for Ireland, by *election*; the former are elected for each parliament; the latter for life.

The prerogative which the King enjoys of increasing the peerage at his pleasure, is, when properly exercised, made use of for the purpose of rewarding such as are eminent for their public services.

House of Commons.—Reform.

The House of Commons consists of knights, citizens, and burgesses, respectively chosen by counties, cities, and boroughs. It is not accurately and satisfactorily ascertained at what precise period the Parliament, as it is now constituted, was formed; that is when the Commons first began to compose a distinct assembly from the Lords; but the generally received opinion is, that the Parliament was, on the whole, much the same as it now is, so long ago as the 17th year of King John, A. D. 1215. The first Speaker, certainly known, was Petrus de Mountford, chosen in 1260, in the reign of Henry III.

Since the period when the House of Commons was first constituted, various changes have taken place, with respect both to the number of members, and the places represented. In the reign of Henry VI. the number of members was upwards of 300; in the last parliament of Henry VIII. 298; in the time of Sir Edward Coke, 493; and since the union of Ireland with Great Britain, in 1801, 658.

There has long existed a numerous party in Great Britain that has been desirous of obtaining a representation better accommodated to the existing state of the country, by disfranchising the rotten or decayed boroughs, by enfranchising large modern towns, and by extending the right of voting, in order to render the elections more free;—thus making the House of Commons a body more effectually representing all those classes of the people that have a valuable stake in society.

The Reform Act, which received the Royal assent on the 7th

June, 1832, is deemed of great importance both by its friends and its enemies; by it 56 of the rotten or decayed boroughs have been wholly disfranchised, 30 other boroughs which formerly returned 2 members each, are hereafter to return 1 only; the united borough of Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, which formerly sent 4 members, is hereafter to send but 2; 22 new boroughs in England, are to send two members each; 19 new boroughs in England, one member each; 62 representatives are added to the English county members; 3 to the county members and 2 to the borough members of Wales; 5 to the members from Scotland; and 5 to those from Ireland. The Reform Act extends the right of voting in the election of members for cities and boroughs, to every male person of full age, and not subject to any legal incapacity, who occupies within such city or borough, as owner or tenant, any house, warehouse, counting-house, shop, or other building of the clear yearly value of not less than ten pounds; provided such person shall have paid the poor rates and assessed taxes; and in the election of county members, to every such male person, who shall be in actual occupation of a freehold for life, or of lands or tenements of copy hold, of the clear yearly value of not less than ten pounds above all rents and charges.

In England a county member of parliament must possess real property to the amount of £600 per annum; and a borough member, £300; but in Scotland no such qualification is required.

County Members under the Reform Act.—The Counties of England formerly returned 2 members each, except Yorkshire, which returned 4; total, 82—and the Welsh Counties, 1 each, —total, 12. By the Reform Act the number of the County Members of England is raised to 144; of Wales, to 15. The following 26 English Counties are divided, and return 4 members each; viz. 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

JUSTICES OF THE PEACE.

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

HALIFAX MECHANICS' LIBRARY.—This Society was
constituted, October 17, 1831. Before its formation, it was a
cult matter for any one to obtain the use of Books, except
those who could afford to purchase for themselves. Nearly all
Libraries then in existence were private property; and the great
loss of the community was prevented from access to their shelves.
Library commenced on a small scale; but the rapidity of its
progress, soon astonished its most sanguine friends. The number
of members at the commencement was, 31;—it now numbers
besides a great many persons who fall under the denomina-
tion of Subscribers, and who pay 2s. 6d. quarterly for the use of
Books, but who have no voice in the management of the So-
ciety's affairs. The members pay 10s. entrance money and 1s. 3d.
quarterly afterward. [At the Annual Meeting, October, 1833,
the value of Shares was raised to 20s.]

The number of Books in October, 1831, was little more than
one thousand; and the number in October, 1833, was upwards of 1150 on hand; and all the money
collected from every source is devoted to the purchase of
Books, except what is absolutely necessary to defray the contingent
expenses of the establishment. Thus by the payment of a very
small sum, and which is within the means of every industrious
man, he may have the use of a large collection of valuable

A meeting of shareholders and others interested, was held Dec 27, 1831, and the Society was then formed.—Two courses of Lectures have been since delivered, and a third course commenced.

The Institute is in possession of an apparatus for illustrating lectures, and a museum under the auspices of the Society has been commenced, which already contains a good assortment of minerals and curiosities of various kinds.—The museum is kept in the same room with the Library. vate, and well tilled, but any land that will bring a good crop of potatoes, will yield a good one of hemp. All sorts of manure suit, that tend to make the soil light; but must be inserted in the fall. Plough in the spring at intervals of 15 or 20 days, till the ground is mellow. Sow in April pretty thickly $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$ bushels of seed, which must be of the last year's growth--to an acre according to the fertility of the soil, bury it with a common harrow, and keep free of grass and weeds. It must be cut as it ripens, which is at different periods, and may be known by its leaves turning yellow and a dust arising from it at the least agitation--with a hemp knife or an old sickle with a smooth sharp edge; spread on the ground till the leaves are well wilted, and will easily part from the stalks. Put it up in small bundles, with bands at each end, and place these in a stagnant pool or very slowly running stream 5 or 6 feet deep, (the former makes the softest hemp, the latter the brightest and most saleable,) in cross piles, placing heavy pieces of wood or stones to keep it immersed. When sufficiently rotted--which may be ascertained by sinking a single bundle by the side of the rotting pile, and try every day after a few days,--take it out and spread the sun against a fence, or on some sloping ground, and turn it till dry; tie up again and carry to some dry, airy, but not noisy place, where it may be spread on racks till perfectly dry.

Hemp designed for seed, should be planted in drills 3 feet apart, about 8 inches plant from plant, at the time of corn planting; kept free from grass and weeds as corn is, but without as much being--it ripens irregularly, therefore when the lower seed is ripe, it must be cut, and on a cloth near hand, beaten with a stick to knock off the dry ones; bind the remainder in small bundles; and stuck in a very airy, dry place to perfect the unripe seed; when quite ripe, thresh again, opening the bundles; secure the seeds for lint, from being stained by the weather, and clean them with a common fanning mill or in the ordinary way.

Hemp is almost the only plant employed in agriculture, in which the male and female flowers are on different plants; this circumstance has some influence on its culture and management.--When it is grown, for both fibre and seed, it is the usual practice to pull the male plants as soon as the seed is set in the others. The male plants are known by their yellowish hue and faded flowers. In England the female plants require 4 or 5 weeks to ripen their seed.

PLoughing GREENSWARD.—The best seasons to plough greenward are May and August; the ploughing should be at the latest possible period before sowing in the spring. A roller as heavily loaded as can be well drawn by a yoke of oxen, should follow the plough as soon as convenient, which latter should always go deep enough to bring a portion of the gravelly and poorer soil to the surface; then harrow with a light horse harrow in the same direction with the furrows without turning the sod--spread on common 20 cart loads to an acre and harrow again, when it will be fit for the seed.

NOVA SCOTIA (88) ALMANACK.

The sward should be turned as evenly as possible, and the outside furrow thrown out, taken to fill up the vacant space in the middle of the lot and ends of the furrows--rolled and harrowed as before mentioned--sowed with buckwheat, winter grains or grass seeds--harrowed with a bush harrow, and rolled again.

COMPOST.--An excellent compost may be made of loam, peat swamp muck, mud, ashes, weeds, and the cleaning of cellars, with a liberal quantity of lime, saltpetre or salt inserted in different layers of the heap, afterward mixed with stable manure for fermentation.

POTATOES.--To plant potatoes on hill sides, it is best to plough pretty deep--spread the manure--cross plough lightly to cover the manure--furrow across the hills three feet apart to catch and retain showers--plant the potatoes 18 to 20 inches apart--cover them from $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches deep, and hill the whole length of the furrow.

TURNIPS.--Plough a light, warm loam well in spring twice or thrice, the last immediately before sowing--spread on an acre 50 to 100 bushels of leached or unleached ashes; (in cold, wet soils manure must be plentifully used)--harrow with the furrows--sow the seed moderately in drills of 12 to 18 inches apart, which will allow room for transplanting and weeding, and give the ground a thorough harrowing.

CARROTS, BEETS AND PARSNIPS.--Spread a coat of heavy well fermented manure, 2 inch. thick; dig deep and mix the manure well with a light, dry soil in autumn; dig over again and sow carrot and parsnip seeds in drills of 15 to 18 inches apart, as soon as the ground is fit to work in spring; beets sow later; when the plants have put out 4 or 5 leaves, thin them 5 to 7 inches apart from plant, and keep clean by weeding; tramp down or roll parsnips when the vines are too luxuriant.

PEAS.--In a light, sandy loam sow field peas as early in April as the ground can be got ready. When bug is feared, do not sow before the 10th of June.

BEANS.--Select a warm dry spot--dig well and manure with hog's dung and ashes; draw drills 1 inch deep and 18 inches apart asunder--sow Lima, kidney, Canadian and red cranberry dwarfs, mohawk or China beans sparingly--cover them even with the surface of the bed, and weed well. Beans for seed should be picked soon as the pods change colour, and hung in a dry, airy place.

GRAIN.--Smut in seed grain, particularly wheat, will be destroyed by using 2 or $2\frac{1}{2}$ gallons of water with 8 or 12 ounces quick lime, (according as it is more or less caustic, or to the greater or less quantity of smut in the grain) to every bushel of seed; boil a part of the water, and slake the lime with it--add the remainder of the water--put the grain in a tub and stir regularly while pouring the lime water gently on it, which should be hot enough to bear your hand in, and cover the grain 2 or 3 inches--turn 5 or 6 times during the 24 hours which it must remain to soak.

COW-CABBAGE.—The seed of this extraordinary and invaluable plant, should be sown sparingly in drills, in a warm, sheltered situation; a square of 60 feet will contain 256 plants, 4 feet apart, these—the side shoots only being used—will serve 4 Cows for a year without the aid of other provender; open a sheaf of straw and bind carefully round the stem to preserve the roots in winter, or transplant with care into a cellar or green house—the shoots during winter make excellent greens. It grows tall and with a little attention will last for 4 years, when its stocks may be used for framing out houses, or perfectly dried will make good firewood.

FARMER'S WEATHER GUAGE.—Whenever you find the grass and plants free of dew, early in the morning, be sure that you will have rain before night; and govern your affairs accordingly.
