





Alphonse, Verville M. P., Spoke in Berryman's Hall Last Night

The mass meeting at Berryman's hall last night to hear Alphonse Verville, labor M. P. of Montreal, was poorly attended, about thirty or forty being present. George Robertson M. P. P. and Rev. J. E. Revington Jones also spoke briefly. Mr. Verville, who ispresident of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, made a fine impression. J. E. Neve, president of the local Trades and Labor council, occupied the chair and called upon Peter Sharkey to introduce Mr. Verville. He was heartily received on rising.

He said that his mission was on behalf of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, which had done much for labor. The congress was in a better condition than ever, having doubled their revenue and appointed a solicitor.

In the course of his address Mr. Verville advocated lobbyists at Ottawa in view of the fact that corporations have them. Working men were not opposed to other classes of society, but they must stand up for their rights. As capital is organized, so must labor be in self protection.

Capital had tried to crush unionism even by legislation. The Lemieux bill, while not perfect, he thought, was one of the best pieces of labor legislation ever passed in any country, and instanced its success in the settlement of the longshoremen's strike in Montreal, by which the men got their increase and the union being recognized also. heir increase and the union being recog-ized also.

The only solution of the labor question, he thought, was for labor and capital to get together.

Mr. Verville favored old age pensions and thought it should be discussed outside of party spirit. He urged that St. John should send a representative to the congress in Winnipeg in September.






