#### AN ACT

TO INCORPORATE

### THE HOME FOR THE AGED.

Passed 7th May, 1867.

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1.—Edward Binney, Daniel McNeil Parker, and Charles Murdoch, and such other persons as now are or hereafter and shall become members of the Institution, hereby incorporated, their successors, are created a body corporate, by the name of The Home for the Aged.

2.—All Bye-laws of the Company now made or hereafter to be made, shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

# RULES FOR THE REGULATION OF THE COMMITTEE

Adopted at their first meeting, 18th July, 1860.

# ORDER OF PROCEEDING.

1st.—The meetings of the Committee shall be opened with prayer precisely at the hour named. The Secretary shall begin the business of the day by reading the minutes of the preceding meeting. Reports of Committees shall then be received, and, if not presented, must be asked for by the person presiding, after which, unfinished business shall be called up, and any new business brought forward

# STANDING COMMITTEES.

2nd -At the first meeting of the General or Executive Committee, after the annual meeting, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed:-

Domestic Managing Committee, Visiting Committee and Financial Committee. Four members consitute a quorum.

#### ON MOTIONS.

3rd.—Every motion when made shall be stated from the chair, and upon being seconded, the chairman or person presiding shall ask if the members are ready for the question, which being assented to, the vote shall be taken. One subject shall, if possible, be settled before another is brought forward. No new members shall be admitted to any Committee, unless by a vote of the General Committee

# DUTIES OF COMMITTEES.

4th.—The General or Executive Committee shall consist of the members of all the Special Committees, and, they hall in their collective capacity, consult for the good of the Institution, and hold their meetings quarterly.

# COMMITTEE ON ADMISSIONS.

5th—It shall be the duty of this Committee to enquire nto the necessities and character of those seeking admission, nd keep a register in which shall be entered the name, age,

birth-place, former residence and date of entrance of all inmates. Terms of Admission :- 1st. No person under 60 years shall be admitted, unless by a vote of the majority of the General Committee, who may also be authorized to admit inmates on such terms as the pecuniary condition of the Association or circumstances of any particular case may seem to demand. For the present it will be required, as a general rule, that not less than £10 annually shall be secured by the party or parties making application. 2nd. Furniture and other articles brought in the "Home" by or for permanent inmates, are to remain for the benefit of the Association. 3rd. Those who have any property are required to secure the same to the Institution before they are admitted. In case of their obtaining property after their admission, if they remain in the "Home," it will also be necessary to make it over to this Institution.

#### COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

6th.—This Committee shall solicit subscriptions and donations to defray the current expenses of the Institution during the present, and, if necessary, future years.

#### VISITING COMMITTEE.

7th.—This Committee shall make it their duty to see that family worship is regularly maintained, and do all in their power, by reading and prayer, for the spiritual welfare of the Establishment. They shall visit alternately, and enter the day and hour of each visit in a book kept for the purpose in the public room.

#### DOMESTIC MANAGING COMMITTEE.

8th.—They are to superintend, direct the Matron, keep a good supply of nutritious food, and require that it be prepared as circumstances may demand. They are to inform the lady who furnishes supplies to provide fuel at a season when it may be purchased at a moderate rate. They are to attend to the repair of all furniture, table and bed linen, keep a supply of towels suitable for the Housekeeper's Panty and Kitchen, with an inventory of the same. This Committee should meet at intervals of a month to consult regarding their mode of action for each quarter. Two of their number should visit the "Home" twice a week to provide and report such things as are needed for the comfort of the "Home"

Any complaint arising from neglect of duty on the part of the Matron, must be referred to the General Committee at the quarterly meeting, and be settled by them collectively. One of their number should preside when in Committee, take minutes in writing and report their proceedings at the meetings of the General Committee.

#### SECRETARY.

9th.—The Secretary shall keep a memorandum of all monies, with a list of names of subscribers, donors and articles contributed, take minutes of General Committee meetings, and receive reports of all Special Committees.

#### TREASURER.

10th.—The Treasurer shall receive all monies and deposit the same at a Bank in her made as treasurer, make payments of bills after they have been duly attested by the General Committee, and keep account of all receipts and expenditure. She shall furnish a monthly abstract of her receipts and expenditure, and of the balance remaining in her hands.

### DUTIES OF THE MATRON.

11th.—The Matron shall keep the house neat and orderly. She shall be particular in attending to the preparation of all food, especially for the sick, preside at all meals, ask a blessing and return thanks, unless prevented by indisposition. Then one of the inmates will be expected to officiate for her at table, and conduct family worship, morning and evening. She shall also attend to the safety of the "Home" by going round at ten o'clock, after the inmates have retired, to see that all unnecessary lights are extinguised. It will be expected of the inmates to inform the Matron when they are going out and at what time they intend returning. She shall keep an account of all donations in furniture that may be presented to the Institution through her, with the names of donors and the date of entry

12th.—All monies shall be paid to the Secertary.

13th—Physicians are expected to give their services

14th.—Friends may visit the inmates from two o'clock until five P. M., except in cases of extreme illness, then at any hour suitable for the convenience of the patient.

RELIGIOUS VISITING COMMITTEE

# THE HOME FOR THE AGED.

At their First Meeting, 18th July, 1860.

I.—That this Committee shall consist of twelve ladies, called the Visiting Committee of the Home for the Aged, and shall have power to add to their number, should circumstances render it necessary.

II.—That these ladies shall have a general superintendance of the spiritual affairs of the Institution, each taking a week in rotation, for visiting the inmates, either separately in their rooms, or collected, for the purpose of reading, prayer, &c.

III.—That this Committee hold meetings on the same day of meeting of the Executive or General Committee, either before or after, having one of their number presiding, to report what may be deemed worthy of notice.

IV.—That this Committee shall do all in their power to supply the Institution with religious instruction through books, tracts, &c., approved of and subject to the supervision of all the members. They shall also converse with the inmates on their spiritual concerns, in a wise and tender way.

V.—The visitor for the week shall make it her business to obtain the service of a minister or some person acting in that capacity, for any old person more than usually indisposed, and entirely confined to the house; such person to be approved of by the Church to which the aged inmate professes to belong. Should the invalid wish to receive Holy Communion occasionally, and the same be approved of by her minister, the visitor shall attend to the gratification of her wishes.

VI.—Should any of the inmates be deprived by illness of the privileges and benefit of public ordinances, it is considered desirable to obtain the services of theological students from any evangelical denomination, to read or deliver an address as often as practicable on the Lord's Day, or other convenient season-said student must first be named and approved at a meeting of the Committee. The services of an ordained minister in connection with one of the orthodox denominations, to be preferred, whenever they can be obtained.

### THE HOME FOR THE AGED.

I.—Every application must be made in writing, stating the age, religious belief, and temporal circumstances of the applicanta

II.—No person shall be admitted who has not attained the age of 60 years, unless dispensed with by the General Committee of the Home.

III.—Persons admitted from the city are required to pay fifty dollars per annum; those from the country will be charged sixty dollars per annum. In every ease, one or more securities will be expected as guarantees, and payment must always be made in advance.

IV.—If the person admitted shall possess any personal or real estate, or articles of furniture, the same to become the property of the Home, on her decease; or instead thereof a charge of twenty pounds per annum, in addition to the twelve pounds ten shillings mentioned in Rule III, shall be made by the Trustees or managing Committee, commencing at the date of her admission, and terminating at her decease.

V.—That as it is impossible to accommodate all who apply, and only a limited number can be admitted, this institution is more especially designed for those, whose reduced circumstances require this assistance, and are compelled to seek a home in old age.

It shall be the duty of the Committee of Admission to enquire particularly into the moral character and disposition of all who are to be admitted into the Home, and to require that all inmates attend the religious services in the Home unless prevented by illness.

VII.—Any person shall have the option of leaving the Home on giving a quarter's notice and the payment of all dues. If any are discontented or unhappy, or refuse to submit to the rules and regulations of the home, they are at liberty to leave at a month's notice.

VIII.—Whenever any doubts shall arise respecting the individual to be admitted, reference shall be made to the General Committee of the "Home."

The Committee have pleasure in stating that the household arrangements of the Home, during the past year, have been satisfactorily attended to by the Matron, Mrs. Horne, who is unremitting in the discharge of the duties assigned to her.

The number of inmates is the same as it was at this date last year; there being one death during the interval, and one new admission; leaving the whole number of inmates twenty-two, as before

Owing to the withdrawal of some members of the Managing Committee, and the temporary absence of others, it will be advisable to increase the number of members in the Committee, as it is not reasonable or fair that the gratuitous duty of supervising the affairs of a Benevolent Institution should continue to fall upon the same individuals year after year.

The Committee trust that the interest which has hitherto been manifested in the prosperity of the Home will not be less in the future than it has been in the past, and they take the opportunity of mentioning that there is still a considerable mortgage on the premises, as will be seen by the Treasurer's account.

The thanks of the Committee are due to Dr. Forrest for gratuitious medical attentions; to Rev. Foster Almon for religious services on Wednesdays, and to other gentlemen, lay and clerical, for the Sabbath services at which they occasionally officiate.

As no names are published, exceping the names of subscribers and donors to the Home, it will be understood why the names of persons contributing to the payment of Board for the inmates of the Institution are not mentioned in the Annual Reports.
