STAMPEDE FOLLOWS AS SEVERAL ARRESTS ARE FORCED BY SOLDIE

De Valera Faints When Volley Is Fired Over Heads of Crowd at Political Gathering in Ennis, County Clare, Ireland—Resublican Leader Is Given Wild Welcome by Tnousands of Persons-Platform Is Surrounded by Troops.

(Canadian Press Cable.) Ennis, County Clare, Aug. 15 .- Eamonn De Valera, the Republican leader, was arrested by Free State troops here today on his appearance to address a Republican meeting in the election campaign.

The arrest was made under sensational circumstances. De Valera was addressing a meeting of eletcors in Market Square when Free State troops came on the scene and fired several volleys over the heads of the crowd.

Empire Steel Head Thinks Eastern Canada Need Not

Montreal, Aug. 15.—"With regard to the bituminous coal situation, I consider that there is plenty of soft coal in sight for Eastern Canada during the coming winter and fall," said Roy M. Wolvin, President of the British Empire Steel Corporation, which includes the Cape Breton coal mines, when asked as to his opinion regarding the general coal situation in view of the dispute existing in the American anthracite fields.

"Irrespective of the quantity of bituminous coal coming in from the U. S.," said Mr. Wolvin, "there is ample soft coal in sight produced in Canada to meet all requirements for the future, whether American strike conditions make an abnormal demand or not.

"The British Empire Steel Corporation will be prepared to furnish large quantities of coke for shipment by rail during the winter, to this district."

Johnstown, Pa., Aug. 15.—After having been idle for more than 16 months, 2,500 union miners in the Somerset coal field today were willing to return to work upon an "open shop" basis, delegates of forty local unions in the field in April, 1922.

Argument was concluded yesterday in the matter of the appeal of the Provinces of British Columbia and Alberta to the Privy Council for a reduction in freight rates. Premier King promised that a decision would be rendered as soon as conditions permitted.

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


