





## WILL NOT ACCEPT REPARATIONS CUI

Poincare Reassures Chamber of His Stand on German

(Special Cable to the New York Times and Montreal Gazette.)
Paris, Oct. 20—From his place on the floor of the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon Premier Poincare proclaimed that he would never accept any reduction in the total of German reparations payments. That, he said, was why he had refused the proposal of the bankers' commission last spring. It had suggested the possibility of a big loan for payment of reparations, but on condition that the total was reduced.

Even this veiled threat did not, how-ever, satisfy all of the premier's aud-

ence.

'If you wait for our Affies agreement," retorted Reynaud, "before you out your plan into action, we will lose all chance of getting paid."

Another deputy ironically added:
'You cannot impose a tax on capital in your own country, how, then, you expect to do it in Germany?"

If we do not so succeed, then we will know what remains for us to do."

Arrogance Also Absent, Because People Won't Stand for It, Says Higgs.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—Bureaucracy, said Henry Higgs, C. B., of England, speaking at the Canadian Club, "means government by officials; it was considered a 'continental nuisance' by Carlyle, and only crept into England at the time of Queen Victoria. It was never so rife as in England during the war, and never so unpopular. Corruption is a vice entirely absent from English officialdom, according to Mr. Higgs. In Turkey the government officials receive their pay in the form of bribes; in Russia bribes are regarded as "sinless revenue," and in the United States, according to Mr. Choate, thirty per cent, at least of the state expenditure goes in graft. Mr. Higgs said he wondered whether that state of affairs were due to the "spoils system" of office holding in place of the continental idea of an independent civil service with secure tenure of office, pensions and severe penalties for misconduct.







Statement of Case, Presented to A. A. U. of C. by T. K. Sweeny, is Referred to Judge Jackson.

P. J. Legge, recently appointed secretary of the Maritime branch of the A. A. U. of C., in an interview last night made a strong plea for a united association back of President A. W. Covey. He contended that Mr. Covey's re-election was a complete vindication of his efforts during last year to place the maritime provinces on sound amateur principles. He said that 1,683 cards had been issued since April 1. Sanctions had been issued for 168 championships, forty-three clubs are affiliated with the union, and twenty bulletins had been issued.

Mr. Legge referred to an attempt made at the meeting recently by St. Peter's Y. M. A. for reinstatement. He said that a threat of legal action had failed to restore the local club in good standing and that the whole matter was referred to Judge Jackson of Calgary.



U. of Canada is not an incorporated body and has no power to order its members to take an affidavit; that the affidavit has not been ratified by resolution of the board of governors of the A. A. U. of C., and even if the A. A. U. of C. had the power to require it (which it is con-Y. M. A. the maritime branch has not followed.

"The maritime province branch (not possessing the authority in its constitution or by-laws) has, in adopting the affidavit, attempted to change the rules governing suspension of the A. A. U. of C., which is beyond its jurisdiction.

"The affidavit is not made voluntarly but under the threat of suspension and so does not come within the prosisions of the Canada Evidence Act.

"That no amendment to the constitution or by-laws of the branches can be adde except by a two-thirds vote of sembers present at a meeting, which mendment does not become operative ntil approved by the board of governors of the A. A. U. of C. The resolution to adopt the affidavit was passed nly by a majority vote, falling coniderably below a two-thirds vote and as not even yet been approved.

U. of Canada had authorized the use of an affidavit, justices or other persons having power to take affidavits are restrained from doing so unless they are required or authorized by some law of Canada or of the province in which it is to be used. The penalty for receiving or permitting an unauthorized affidavit to be taken is a fine of \$50 or imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months; and that the A. A. U. of Canada, the parent body, has legislated with regard to suspensions and has laid down the procedure to be followed, which in the case of St. Peter's Y. M.
