er School of Agricultural and Veterinary Medicine was opened, to provide official instruction in agriculture and stock rais-ing. We are told that it obtained an immediate and great success, and simil-ar schools have since been established in seven states of the Republic. But this is not all. Nineteen professors travthis is not all. Nineteen professors trav-el over seven states, giving itinerant courses embracing agriculture in general, the dairy industry, poultry raising, silk growing, wine, apple and bee culture, and other subjects. These professors give the farmers the results of observation and experiments at the central stations, and give expert advice with regard to cultivation, and combating and preventing diseases which attack the crops. Steps have been taken to prevent the introduction into Brazil of animals suffering from contagious diseases, and there are various stud farms where the origin and treatment of such diseases is systematically studied, as well as the feeding of animals, the nature and value of pastures, preservation of milk, manufacture of cheese, and other branches re-lating to animals and their use. The dairy industry is rapidly being devel-oped. Dry farming has been investigated by an expert. One of the great difficulties is the scarcity of farm labor, but it is noted that while only 12,477 immigrants entered the country in 1904 there were 180,182 in 1912; while the
