# SAYS "MERCIFUL" KAISER STOPPED LIEGE ATTACK

Germans in Greater Part Have Withdrawn And Are Marching Through Belgium to The French Border

London, Aug. 12—A Dutch despatch says a terrific cannonading was heard this morning from the direction of Tongres, north of Liege. It was yesterday reported that two divisions of German cavalry with artillery had arrived there. Belgium was today again the scene of outpost fighting between Belgians, French and Germans. The German commander at Liege denies the loss of 20,-000 in his effort to take the forts there. He says they will be taken without the loss of a man as soon as the German heavy artillery arrives. He asserts that "The Belgian force is numerically superior to ours," He intimates that the assaults were stopped by the emperor's orders to avoid needless sacrifice of life.

On the subject of Liege the French foreign minister declares all the surrounding forts are intact and that only a small force of Germans had entered

"There is a common and not unnatural scepticism among newspaper readers in times like these," says the New York Sun. "They weigh what they read with distrust which is quite justifiable, even commendable, and not a few of the shrewder sort are very ready to attribute the greater part to the fertile imagination of the newspaper makers.

"This latter tendency is perhaps, no less natural, but it is certainly less and intelligent. It is due in reality to a curious want of imagination is such readers themselves; for the slightest exercise of that useful faculty must convince any one, however little he knows of the trade, of the enormous difficulty in such emergencies of getting at the real news, of interpreting the ambiguous, of distinguishing between realities and appearances, of sorting the significant and insignificant—in a word separating truth from falsehood.

"Over all the principal sources there is a rigid official censorship. If this implied, as it possibly may in some simple minds, that nothing but bare facts were transmitted hither, the burden of the editor would be wonderfully lightened. What it means in effect is that he is at the mercy of the sundry supereditors who are obviously neither impartial nor disinterested, and that out of a mass of matter, usually fragmentary, often contradictory and sometimes grossly misleading, he is obliged to pick and choose to the best of his judgment in the hope of securing an approximation of truth."

# ON LABOR MARKET

Marked Falling Off In Steerage Business To States

WAR KEEPS MEN AT HOME

eared That Unskilled Labor Will Be at Premium if the War Keeps up Long - Many European Ports Now Closed

New York, N. Y., Aug. 12-The falling off in steerage passengers from abroad for this year up to last week, as ago, was 300,069, which, according to steamship agents and contractors, means a corresponding decrease in the supply for the labor market. Should the war continue any length of time, the impression prevails that unskilled labor will be a premium for some time to come. Already the heads of corporations employing large forces of laborers, contractors and city officials engaged in public works, are worried over the effects of the European war on the labor market. It is generally conceded that immigration for a year or more will be seriously affected by the war. The men are bound to suffer, it is said, because the war will close industries, and without wages the peasants cannot save the money necessary to pay their passage to the United States.

I had information from headquarters but under pledge to send a reassuring message so that the British public would not be alarmed in case the Uhlans did break through to the Belgian capital. If the raid had been carried out it would have had no military significance. It would have been merely another example of German recklessness and spite against people whom they find will defend themselves valorousity when attacked, but without doubt it could have figured largely in German proclamations as a means of encouraging Prussian soldiers.

"Raids in the direction of Brussels by small Uhlan patrols were certainly madeduring today and last night, but without effecting any great material or moral damage.

"The minister of war was able to state that the threatened attack on Brussels, which at one time was thought to be prepared with no less than two divisions of cavalry, had not developed, and that if it were attempted now ample precautions had been taken to guard against its success. Brussels, therefore, breathes again in security.

The statement that the German siege guns are now before Liege is of the greatest importance. Hitherto the Germans have thought it would be possible for them to carry the place by assault. This proved a miscalculation with regard to the forts, though it succeeded well enough with regard to the town.

Even in the best of circumstances the bringing up of the siege guns and placing them in position is a herculean task of transport and engineering. To realize this one has only to consider that a siege gun is a cumbersome mass of steel weighing from forty tons upwards and that this enormous engine has to be hauled up steep slopes and put on a solid bed of concrete. The placing of one of these guns in position is about equal to the erection of a large machinery plant. If the reported placing in position of siege guns is correct, the reduction of the Liege forts cannot be long delayed. A few hours' bombardment by them is likely to reduce the Brialmont type of forts to a surplus mass of earth.
