



Saskatoon, June 19—A notable convention to be held here on the 15th, 16th and 17th of next month will be that of the Union of Canadian Municipalities. This will bring more than 300 mayors, aldermen, and commissioners, controllers and other city officials to Saskatoon, to confer upon matters of moment. 

Budget This Year Said to Close St. John, N. B., June 9, 1913.

proposed by the commission and ordered the cutting off of certain expenses. As a result of this the receipts and expenditures of the last two years since the report of the commission was adopted averaged about \$2,000,000 a year and nearly balanced. The budget this year closed with a surplus.

The revenue of the Vatican is derived from the patrimony of St. Peter, including the invested capital of the church, the interest on funds invested in London securities by former popes, the rent of buildings owned by the church, fees for the services of documents issued by the various congregations and departments and Peter's Pence. The yearly expenditure is roughly speaking as follows: For the support of cardinals and diplomatic missions abroad, \$100,000; for the maintenance of the Vatican, including the papal army, \$600,000; pontifical alms, subsidies and schools, \$400,000; gifts to charities, \$300,000, and miscellancous, \$200,000.
