COLLEGE AND ALUMNAE

To refute the argument that public school teachers do not need more pay because they are chiefly women and do not have to support a family, a committee from the Detroit College Equal Suffrage Club has made a study of the salaries of teachers in that city.

"We are assisting in the work because it is impossible for the teachers to do this for themselves," said Dr. Mary T. Stevens, president of the Detroit College League.

"We believe in equal pay for equal work, and we know that the Detroit school teachers are not getting it. During the past two years in the high schools young men have been advanced over women teachers for far greater experience and given far better pay than the women would receive for equal work."

WASHINGTON WOMEN VOTERS

The women lent a strong hand to the good government forces in the successful reform movement in Seattle, which resulted in the recall of Mayor Gill and the election of George W. Dilling.

"The rally of women voters for George W. Dilling, which filled two big theaters, covered into the street, surpassed in interest and enthusiasm any political gathering held in Seattle in many years."

ADVANCE OF WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Hardly had the suffragists got through rejoicing over the victory in the California Legislature, when the news came that the Kansas Legislature had taken similar action, by a vote of 27 to 12 in the Senate and 64 in the House.

During the 60 years of the 48 States of the Union have submitted amendments to give full suffrage to women. Of these ten, four did last year. The present ready such amendments have been submitted in three States, and are now pending. Nobody knows how many more there may be before the year's end.

The effect of the Washington victory and of the general advance in public opinion is also seen in the enlarged legislative votes given for woman suffrage in Michigan and Montana.

"You dragged me down to the level of a pig," said the woman suffragist who was defeated in the Legislature by a majority of only two votes. The light is brightening all around the horizon.

ABUSING MR. BURCHILL

The Hon. Robert Maxwell told the legislature yesterday that Hon. Mr. Burchill had turned against the government because he made him pay full stumpage, and that he had formerly ceased to vote Conservative when it paid him to vote otherwise.

Hon. Mr. Burchill is not unknown to the people of this province. It will require more than the assertion of Mr. Maxwell to convince them that the member for Northumberland is actuated in public life by mercenary motives. If Mr. Maxwell had been able to break the force of Mr. Burchill's arraignment of the government, he might not have resorted to personal abuse and the imputation of unworthy motives, although the St. John member is reckless by habit in political discussion, and more eager to win the applause of his party than to be fair to an opponent.

Mr. Maxwell asked on what authority Mr. Burchill said that the government was not a coalition government. For a few years ago this attitude of a member of a government which has thrown its whole weight into the scale against the Liberal party, is seldom surpassed in New Brunswick politics.

The answer of the government to Mr. Burchill's criticism is personal abuse. The St. John Standard takes up the cry, and in large type says: "Member for Northumberland forced to pay honest stumpage claims and is sore." "Caught red-handed by St. John member, who exposed Burchill's grouch."

Not only the friends of Mr. Burchill, but all fair-minded people will resent this gross attack upon a man of high character. The Hazen government is reduced to some straits on it would not resort to the Maxwellian method.

CITY GOVERNMENT

In a matter so important as that of the system of civic government, when a change is proposed, one would naturally expect the opponents of change to make some effort to defend the existing system, and to do so openly and fearlessly. As yet no citizen has taken the platform of space in the columns of the press to oppose openly the advocates of the commission system. The fact is significant. If the present system were satisfactory it would have able and fearless defenders, who would not be silent when the advocates of a new system were displaying so much uncertainty and firing an occasional shot from safe cover cannot do more than irritate their opponents.

The campaign in favor of the commission plan has met with less opposition than any movement in civic politics in the memory of this generation. The only danger is that artificial attempts may be made to prevent the will of the people finding expression in legislation. No movement in recent years has appealed so strongly to people of all parties and representing all interests. It is felt that one of the great needs of the city at the beginning of a new era of growth and expansion is the application of business principles and methods to city government. Instead of a large body of irresponsible men meeting occasionally there should be a small body meeting daily, and held to strict responsibility for their acts. That is what the commission plan provides.

Mr. Maxwell wants to know if Mr. Burchill wants to drive Mr. Morrissey out of the government. Nothing would please Mr. Maxwell more.





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
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The India Paper Edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica

University of Cambridge

The Preliminary offer of the new Encyclopaedia Britannica in advance of publication, at substantial concessions in price, was planned with a very practical object in view. It was necessary that the publishers should ascertain, before they began printing and binding the volumes on a large scale, to what extent the public would demand the work in each of its two forms (sets printed upon India paper and sets upon ordinary paper), and in the six styles of binding. He will no longer think twice about picking up a volume which he can grasp easily between finger and thumb, which can be bent back over to cover in its flexible binding, and held for reading as comfortably as a magazine.

Keeping Record of Ties

(Newark Times)
The Lehigh Valley Railroad has adopted a plan for recording the age of every new tie on the system. This will enable the company to determine with mathematical accuracy the relative efficiency of the different woods and the value of the creosote preservation treatment. It is done in this way: First, the dating nails are manufactured, with the proper numerals on the heads, indicating the year. For example, "11" meaning the year 1911. Then one of these nails is driven into each new tie as it is laid on the track. Thus in the future the maintenance men will be able upon the replacement of a tie to know just how long it has been in use. This will enable them to determine the value of lumber used on the railroad to use wood that has been "treated" to prevent decay. It is also expected that the position of creosote on the pores of the wood will be able to be determined.

In the French army nearly three times as much is spent on wine as on bread, vegetables, and preserved food together. Last year but \$6,800,000 was spent on provisions, whereas \$18,500,000 was spent on wine.

Senator Costigan Speaks on The Day We Celebrate—Eloquent and Timely Address by American Consul—Canadian and City Affairs are Touched on

St. Patrick's Society dinner in the Victoria Hotel last evening was a pleasant gathering of some fifty members and guests. Hon. R. J. Rifeau presided with F. E. Williams vice-chairman. The Victoria dining hall was decorated with Irish flags and the menu was decorated by all excellent and the service of the hostesses was of the highest. The evening was a most enjoyable one and was done for the pleasure and comfort of all. An orchestra led by M. J. Harrison furnished a pleasing program of Irish and other music.

After the toast to the King came that to the Governor-General, to which Hon. Mr. U. S. Consul Mr. Colver, American consul responded to the toast to the President of the United States as follows—

I think he might have added also that this spectacle is a greater force for peace than all the dreamboats in the world. My further message from all my people who understand the fundamental laws of the United States, is that we are not jealous of your great achievements, neither do we covet your fair land. On the contrary we rejoice at your marvelous development and your prosperity, and look with admiration upon the handwork of a great, free, self-governing people to the north.

What more can I say, unless it be that when we come to celebrate our hundred years of peace, we take this happy anniversary of your premier as our slogan, and with all the power and force of our combined influence, urge upon the people of the world to forsake, once and for all, the last remaining vestige of barbarism in our civilization, and that hereafter the question of national honor, or some ill-considered act of arbitration, shall be decided by the people of the United States and the United States are now, and in all probability, will ever remain two separate countries, each nursing its ideal, each carving out its own destiny. What might have been had the present course been ruled by the throne, down the civilized world is ruled by the people. Kings and princes, presidents and governors have come and gone, but the motto of "Vox Populi, Vox Dei." Education, intelligence, wisdom, and the motto of the people, "No taxation without representation," are the things that will fix the status of that country. The people are coming into their own, and it is the educated, intelligent people of this country, who will fix its destiny, and as your ideals are high, noble, tolerant, and inspiring, so shall the name of Canada be a watchword throughout the world for all that is good, great, and elevating to the human mind.

My prayer is that these two peoples, so closely allied in all that pertains to education and the advancement of the human race, these two people governed by similar laws, following similar vocations, holding the same ideas of right and wrong, being in morality, honesty and integrity, may even maintain their present onward and upward course, to destiny which no other nations have yet attained, living in harmony and concord, even rejoicing in each other's progress and advancement to the end.

Senator Costigan, speaking to The Day We Celebrate, commended St. Patrick's Society because of its broad lines. His name had been coupled with the school question and with home rule. He had acted in both cases a conscientious part. His early training taught him to be a broad-minded, liberal Catholic. He reviewed the home rule action of the Canadian parliament in the house and with only six dissenting in the senate.

In 1888 the Marquis of Lorne had written Mr. Costigan for his views on what was needed and best for Ireland. He read from his reply to show that his course was entirely consistent with loyalty to the empire and with integrity of the empire. He had advocated home rule.

The speaker said there was no fear of mistreatment of the Protestant minority in Ireland by the Catholic majority if home rule were granted and in this connection he referred to the loyalty of the Irish Catholics to Protestant leader, particularly Charles Stewart Parnell.

He favored local parliaments for England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. It would be really better, he said, for the British parliament than as at present. Hon. Mr. Costigan spoke of the valor of Irish soldiers on England's battlefields. He said that when home rule came a great change would be seen throughout the empire. Speaking of the Dublin convention, to which he was a delegate, Mr. Costigan said he had emphatically advocated a policy of peaceful agitation to gain home rule. He was glad to see tonight that Ireland was near home rule and he hoped to live long enough to see it.

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PARTY LINES DRAWN; LIBERALS' PLACE IS AGAINST GOVERNMENT

Hon. Mr. Burchill Concludes Speech on Debate—By-Election Campaign in York is Opened—Business of House

Fredrickton, N. B., March 17.—This afternoon, Hon. Mr. Burchill concluded his address on the budget, and in his clear, moderate way exposed further weaknesses in the government's policy and administration. Again, as on yesterday, he made the juror and his followers extremely uncomfortable.

Mr. Burchill was followed by Mr. Maxwell, who devoted himself largely to an attack on the Northumberland plan.

The campaign in the by-election opened tonight with two splendid meetings in St. Mary's and Maraville. At the former, Wm. Murray, formerly a strong supporter of the Hazen government, presided. The speakers were A. B. Copp, M. P., and W. W. Brown. They received an enthusiastic ovation, and for over two hours attracted the attention of the large audience.

At Maraville, Hon. Mr. Robinson and Mr. D. Flinn were the speakers, with Hon. Mr. Fleming in the chair. The audience was good one, and gave the speakers a hearing. The candidate, Geo. Holden, appeared at both meetings, and was given a great reception.

House Business

Fredrickton, N. B., March 17.—The house met at 2 o'clock.

Mr. Wilson introduced a bill to incorporate the St. John Power Boat Club.

Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill respecting taxes on incorporated companies, for the better enforcing of the collection of certain taxes.

Mr. Wilson, on behalf of Mr. Hatheway, introduced a bill to amend the act incorporating the Christian Union, town of Portland.

Mr. Lowell moved for papers relating to the Suspension bridge.

Hon. Mr. Hazen said that copies of the report, etc., would be laid before the house without the necessity of an address. It would be Tuesday or Wednesday next when copies of papers, which were voluminous, would be completed.

Mr. Lowell said that he hoped there would be no delay, as there was a feeling that the Suspension bridge was unsafe.

Hon. Mr. Hazen—That's a mistake.

Mr. Lablons gave notice of inquiry regarding the procuring of lumber for work on bridges.

Mr. Burchill gave notice of motion regarding the federal water carriage of goods.

Hon. Mr. Hazen gave notice of a motion for the appointment of a committee to take up suggested changes in the election law.

On the order of the day being called, Mr. Burchill resumed the debate. He said the government had claimed that the lumbermen of former years had been robbing the province by not paying their stumpage. If there were any means of comparing the action of the lumbermen of today with those of the past, it would appear that the lumbermen of former years were not so very guilty after all.

In conclusion, he thought it unfortunate that the bill of the house towards party lines. He thought that when the government came into power it was to act as a coalition government. He could not see any reason for a division on party lines in this province. He thought that provincial affairs should be conducted without reference to party. The meetings held by the government had been advertised as Conservative meetings. Mr. Hazen had received a telegram from Mr. Borden saying what a great thing he (Hazen) was doing for the Conservative party in New Brunswick, and Mr. Hazen had sent a telegram in reply.

Mr. Hazen—I do not like to interrupt the plaudits of the honorable gentleman opposite, but I never sent or received such a telegram.

Mr. Burchill, continuing, said that he had seen some reference to the matter in one of the provincial papers. It was unfortunate that the lines had been drawn, but if that was done, then all Liberals must oppose the present administration.

Hon. Mr. Maxwell, who moved the adjournment of the debate, made an attack on Hon. Mr. Burchill and the latter's course of criticism was due to his having to pay more stumpage.

Mr. Pender introduced the petition of John A. Miller, president of the maritime conference of the Seventh Day Adventists in favor of a bill relating to that denomination.

Mr. Munro presented the report of the municipalities committee.

The house adjourned at 8 o'clock.

be headed by individual landowners, who are advised that imp-overing may be made a profitable profession, if only landowners themselves would do what stupid county councils are afraid to do, and encourage small holders to remain on the land instead of flocking to the big towns.

The inability to secure a few acres and a means of living is the reason of the revolt of the agricultural laborers at the last general election, and the great increase of the Liberal vote.

In the lobby of the House of Commons it has been freely prophesied that the debate will fizzle out, and the bill be passed before Easter. The opposition is beginning to find the House of Lords has few friends, even in the ranks of the Tories, and now Austin Chamberlain says they would welcome a bill to reform the House of Lords. The debate is so flat, the opposition have difficulty in keeping it up and the worry of material discussions in the party is taking the life out of any fight for Mr. Balfour or the peers.

The nation deliberately gave its mandate for the bill and has little patience with the few Tories who claim a right to amend it. The weakness of the opposition to the national bill is shown by their lack of any settled policy. Although 200 Tory M. P.'s have been busy in an upper room for some time, they have not come to any settled plan for the reform of the House of Lords. At a meeting on Tuesday the rank and file of the unhappy Tory members had to be satisfied with the statement that the leaders were drafting a bill in opposition to that of the government.

The Balfour bill will be in effect Lord Lansdowne's bill, but he will not satisfy his rebellious followers, who do not approve of the Lords returning themselves. The young Tories clamoring for reform have been silenced, and the revolt is an end, for they see drastic reform is coming. The more up-to-date Tories expect that the hereditary principle will be in part discarded, and the majority of the new House of Lords will be an elected body.

The majority of the present House of Commons shall see to it that in no case shall the new House of Lords be so constituted as to straiten a Tory majority of the colonial secretary to reply by showing against a Liberal government, which would hold in England. In a joint sitting the government could carry in one portion an Irish Home Rule bill with half its present majority if we had a constitution like South Africa, which the Tory minister says everyone approves of. Any Tory scheme yet suggested would give a Tory majority in the reconstructed lords over the House of Commons.

Interesting details are published relating to the effect of the imperial old age pensions upon local poor taxes. Now that pauper relief is no longer a disqualification for a pension, the saving of local charges on the rates is no less than £1,500,000. The total number of outdoor paupers in these kingdoms is estimated to 148,000. The estimate for the coming year is some twelve and a half million pounds for old age pensions for people of seventy years of age. The increase in old age pension estimates is two and a half million pounds. The old age pension act is now heartily approved by everybody.



They arrived on the Montreal express and were met at the depot by Brigadier Adley and a delegation of local officers and soldiers.
