## GERMANY READY TO OUTLAW WAR

### Maritime Benefits Are Seen in New Tariff Announcements

**DUPLICATE ON SLACK COAL EXPECTED TO HELP TRADE**

Saint John Business Men Express Opinions on Changes

**PRESS COMMENT**

Toronto Globe Anticipates Controversy Over Hydro-Electric Export Tax

Readjustments of the tariff as indicated in the budget brought down at Ottawa yesterday, discussed by Saint John business men today, were calculated to have a salutary effect for good in the Maritimes, in their judgment, especially the matter of slack coal, upon which a duty of 50c. has been imposed against United States coal, instead of the 14c. impost of past years. This advantage to Eastern Canada and the country as a whole was stressed by several prominent merchants and manufacturers spoken to by The Times-Star this morning.

### WATERWAYS BODY HEARS N. B. PETITION

**Traffic Good In Jerusalem**

LONDON, March 25.—Speaking in the House of Commons yesterday Hon. Austen Chamberlain, Foreign Secretary, gently but firmly, placed the black shadow of a full eclipse across what only a few months ago his predecessor in the foreign office, had seen as another lovely new dawn—the Geneva protocol.

### VANCOUVER DOCTOR SHOT BY RUSSIAN

**Assailant Said to Have Admitted Shooting in Drug Store.**

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 25.—Dr. C. S. Wilson, well-known physician residing in Burnaby, adjacent to this city, was attacked and shot and dangerously wounded last night, at a drug store, by a Russian named Alfred Herslak. Herslak, it is said, went to a nearby drug store, where he is alleged to have confessed to the shooting.

### CURZON IS BURIED

**High Tribute Paid to Late Statesman by People of All Ranks.**

LONDON, March 25.—The highest tribute possible for the British nation was paid to the memory of one of its statesmen, when the funeral of Lord Curzon, the late Marquis of Curzon, was held in Westminster Abbey and attended by the representatives of the sovereign, the British Premier, cabinet members, leading statesmen and foreign ambassadors.

### 9 TO 1 SHOT WINS

**Tapin Captures Lincolnshire Handicap; Grave Fairy, 2nd; King Willow, 3rd.**

LINCOLN, March 25.—Tapin, owned by A. Ekanay, won the Lincolnshire handicap of £1,000 with extras. Mrs. Coomb's Grave Fairy was second and H. Mollin's King Willow was third. Twenty-six ran. The betting was: Tapin, 9 to 1 against. Grave Fairy, 33 to 1, and King Willow, 40 to 1.

### EXPORTS INCREASE

**Pulp and Paper Shipments From Canada in February Are Greater.**

MONTRÉAL, March 25.—Canadian exports of pulp and paper in February were valued at \$11,550,576 states a report issued by the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association. This was an increase of \$200,085 over the month of January, and of \$618,377 over February of last year. Increases were shown both for wood pulp and paper.

### DRAWBACK ON COAL

**99 Per Cent. of Duty Will Be Refunded on Material For Coke.**

OTTAWA, Ont., March 25.—A drawback of 99 per cent. of the duty is to be allowed on bituminous coal imported into Canada for conversion into coke. This is done, it is announced, to encourage the establishment and operation of up to date coking plants in Canada.

### FOREIGNERS IN WEST ARE FACING DEATH

**Statement of Ukrainian Paper Verified by Presbyterian Missionary.**

WINNIPEG, Man., March 25.—The Canadian Rank, Ukrainian language paper declares that the poverty of the Ukrainian farmers north of Komarno, Man., is terrible and that, if there is no prompt action dozens of families will perish of hunger.

### ATTACK JAP PEERS

**Damage Done to Homes of Those Opposing Universal Suffrage.**

TOKIO, March 25.—Crowds this morning attacked the residence of certain peers who were prominent in opposition to the universal suffrage measure during yesterday's session of the Upper House. Only slight damage was done, but the attacks have caused serious complications in the situation of the Upper House, which refuses to continue the discussion of the suffrage measure until the honor of the house has been satisfied by the Home Minister.

### 4 KILLED; 40 HURT

**Senator is Among Victims of Railway Accident to French Express.**

PARIS, March 25.—Four persons were killed and 40 injured when the Bordeaux to Paris express was derailed near Poitiers today. Among the dead was Senator Peitribou. The locomotive and seven cars turned over, and two of the cars fell into the river. The cause of the accident has not yet been determined.

### FIRE CAUSES DEATH

**Gasoline in Stove Results in Fatal Accident in Quebec Province.**

ST. PHILIPPE DE NORI, Que., March 25.—Lighting of a fire with gasoline resulted in the death of a seven-year child and severe injuries to two other persons, one of whom may die. Mrs. Wilfrid Chamberlain, child of Mr. and Mrs. Chamberlain is badly burned, and the child's 72-year grandfather, is not expected to live.

### ARABS CLOSE SHOPS

**No Disorders, However, as Earl of Balfour Arrives in Jerusalem.**

JERUSALEM, March 25.—The Mohammedan and Christian Arabs closed their shops today and ceased work on the occasion of the arrival of the Earl of Balfour, as a protest against the famous declaration which he issued as foreign secretary committing Great Britain the support of the establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine. The Arabs also withdrew all vehicles from the streets. No disorders have been reported.

### MINERS DROWNED

**Three Lose Lives When Blast Releases Water Flood From Mine.**

MAHONEY CITY, Pa., March 25.—Three miners were drowned when a blast in the Vulcan mine, near here, released thousands of gallons of water last night, flooding a gangway. The water had accumulated behind a wall of rock, unknown to the miners.

### MANY MORE CATTLE

**Eleven Hundred Coming Here in Next Few Days For Shipment.**

There will be an exceptionally large movement of cattle through the port of Saint John this week-end. This morning 25 cars left Montreal for the C.P.R. and nine more are scheduled to leave there tonight. Tomorrow 20 more cars are expected to leave destined for this city. The S. S. Concordia will take away 25 cars of cattle, the S. S. Canadian Leader nine and the Manchester Division 20. The total number of cattle will be approximately 1,100. Cattle shipments through the port this season is the heaviest in years.

### INDIAN CHILDREN SACRIFICED TO DRIVE OUT DEVIL; TWO DIE

LONDON, March 25.—Dispatches recovered and offered up his sister as this sacrifice. When no improvement in the boy's condition was forthcoming they deprived him of food and bound him, naked, near a holy place where he died from exposure. Mulchand and two sons have been sentenced to death for the crime, and a daughter-in-law imprisoned for life.

### PROBE ANNOUNCED

**Newfoundland Premier Says Liquor Control and Customs to be Investigated.**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 25.—Charging that an independent audit of the liquor control and customs departments had revealed matters seriously reflecting on prominent government officials and equally prominent citizens, Premier Munro last evening told the legislature, he said the Government intended to appoint a commission to fully investigate conditions. Pending this investigation, he said, the publication of the auditors reports will be postponed.

### BLAST KILLS SEVEN

**Two Missing and Three Hurt in Hamburg Oil Ship Explosion.**

BERLIN, March 25.—A death despatch from Hamburg reports seven persons dead, two missing, and three seriously injured as the result of an explosion on the oil lighter Saturn following a fire on the oil rigging. The force of the explosion flung wreckage from the border into the city streets.

### Falls 17 Stories and Crashes To Street Through Taxicab

NEW YORK, March 25.—After falling 17 stories through the air, Harold VanWinkle, 20, crashed through the roof and floor of a taxicab standing outside the Hotel Pennsylvania and retained consciousness long enough to give his name, age and address. He then became unconscious and died in the Bellevue Hospital about five hours later. The fall had broken both his legs and injured him internally. The police have been unable to learn whether VanWinkle fell or jumped. He was first seen hurtling through the air and a woman who had just lighted from the cab narrowly escaped being struck.

SENATOR N. H. THORNE ESTATE PAID MOST FEES

Succession Duties on It \$67,151 Out of Province. Total of \$163,122.

AMUSEMENT TAX DETAILS GIVEN

What People Paid at Saint John Theatres—Liquor .Net \$426,017

Succession duties to the amount of \$163,122.73 were paid in New Brunswick in 1924 according to the report of the Comptroller General yesterday afternoon in the House of Representatives.

The estate of the late Senator N. H. Thorne, of Saint John, topped the list, having paid into the provincial treasury \$67,151.50. Others were: Henry Pinnigan, \$1,247.57; John Lee, \$1,753.29; W. G. Scovill, \$1,403.50; Lawrence J. Donovan, \$1,163.83; James L. Stewart, \$1,106.91; F. E. Donahue, \$1,149.49; M. J. McLaughlin, \$1,000.00; John P. Burchill, \$1,673.48; Edward E. R. Murray, \$8,618.92; Mary A. Barker, \$5,189.57; James McLeod, \$301.87.

The Comptroller General's report shows that \$48,844.84 was collected in fines under the Prohibition Act while beer licenses totalled \$322,430 and brewers' licenses \$200. The retail license amounted to \$169,173.14, with refunds totalling \$35. The motion picture show licenses brought \$1,623.37 while letters patent granted to various companies entailed the province by \$7,585.

(Continued from page 1) bituminous coal other than slack from other countries than United States. As a matter of fact the only coals that came from overseas were of the hard varieties.

CUSTOMS HOUSE. Proposed changes in the tariff will make little difference in the work of the customs staff here for the present, C. B. Lockhart, Collector of Customs, said this morning. He had received instructions from Ottawa to add the words "subject to amendment" to all papers relating to the import of goods. The increased duty on slack coal from the United States would be felt to some extent here, he said. In reference to the new schedule, Mr. Lockhart said importers would pay at the present rate until further instructions came from Ottawa, when those who had not paid enough would be called upon to contribute more, while those who had paid too much would be entitled to a refund.

SEES TAX ON GAS. MONTREAL, March 25.—"Unless there is some drawback provision for it, it will mean another tax on the gas consumers of Montreal," J. S. Norris, vice-president and general manager of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company, said last night of the budget provision raising from 15 to 20 cents per ton the duty on American slack coal. "We use 300,000 tons of American slack coal annually," Mr. Norris went on, "and we are obliged to import that for gas-making, as the Canadian slack does not find suitable."

WILL AID MARITIMES. TORONTO, March 25.—Dealing with the budget increase in the duty on slack coal from 15 to 20 cents per ton, J. H. Milne, of the Milne Coal Company, here, stated that it will have two effects. "One will be to work to the advantage of the coal mining companies of the Maritimes, who have been asking for a higher protection against the imported coal from the United States," he said, "and the other effect will be to place a new tax on industry."

TAX ON INDUSTRY. So far as the new tax on industry is concerned, Mr. Milne explained that the slack coal is the chief raw material of the factories in Toronto, and the balance of Ontario. It is used in such plants as the paper mills, the water works, and factories in general.

SEES CONTROVERSY. TORONTO, Ont., March 25.—The Globe today says editorially: "A Federal export duty on hydro electric energy is an innovation which is certain to be controversial. In the fiscal year 1924 the exports of electrical energy from Canada to the United States totalled 1,400,231,340 kilowatt hours, equivalent to 214,181 horsepower years, and to the Federal Treasury purposes levying a tax of three cents per kilowatt hour, equivalent to about \$1.98 per horsepower year, beginning on April 1, next. No doubt it will be a matter for the Federal authorities to collect the tax from the exporting companies, but will the latter be in a position to collect it from their United States customers?"

HELP TO WINNIPEG. CALGARY, March 25.—R. M. Young, Commissioner for the Western Canada Coal Operators' Association, stated that the budget announcement of an increase of duty on slack coal from 15 to 20 cents would make a material difference and help the situation at Winnipeg, as it now puts slack coal practically on a par with mine run coal, on which duty is 53 cents.

HALIFAX COMMENT. HALIFAX, N. S., March 25.—The Chronicle (Liberal) says of the budget: "The country may well be congratulated, as the government is to be commended, upon the very dignified financial showing which the Minister of Finance has been able to make in the face of unprecedented difficulties, the government is to be credited with substantial accomplishments in reducing taxation, in reducing charges and expenditures, in producing a handsome surplus over administrative expenses, and in re-establishing a hope for the future." The Liberal record of a balanced budget. It has made an excellent beginning and has given a lead in the practice of economy and the prudent administration of the finances, which entitles it to the general support of the country.

Says Tariff Untouched. LE CANADA. (Montreal)—On the whole, it can be said that the govern-

ment does not touch the tariff, but leaves it exactly where it stood. Last year the Minister of Finance was able to reduce the public debt by \$35,000,000 and to grant a considerable reduction in taxes. The year had been exceptionally prosperous. The reduction made itself felt in the fiscal year which ended shortly, but in spite of a considerable increase in revenue, the Finance Minister has been able to announce a surplus over all ordinary and capital expenditures.

AMENDMENT IS LOST. Liquor Control in Alberta Remains Unchanged—Sale of Beer Controversy. EDMONTON, March 25.—The Legislature last night defeated by a vote of 84 to 17, an amendment to the liquor control bill providing for the sale of beer in bottles to be carried away and consumed at the residence of the purchaser in the same way as when purchased at the liquor warehouses.

THE BUDGET.

The chief feature of the budget is the increase of the duty on American bituminous slack coal from fourteen to fifty cents a ton, a change which has been under discussion year after year and which is now made finally on the ground that it is necessary to the profitable operation of our own coal industries in the Maritimes and in Alberta. The Premier of Nova Scotia, in discussing this tariff change, estimates that it will enable the mine operators of his province to market additional coal to the amount of 800,000 or 400,000 tons.

Another tariff change places grapefruit on the free list if it comes from British possessions and enters Canada through its own ports, a welcome but not a sensational concession to the growers. When we consider the amount of West Indies and South American fruit that Canada imports, and the greater amount it would use under favorable conditions, when we recall that almost all of this fruit is imported through the United States, and are at once reminded of the need, we improved commensurate with the West Indies and tariff arrangements which will enable us to buy our fruit from that source and bring it to Canada through our own ports. There is to be a conference between the Dominion and the West Indies in May on this question, and the whole country will hope for really important results.

Hon. Mr. Robb announced, also, among the tariff changes introduced, an export duty on electrical power. Energy generated in Canada and transmitted to the United States will pay about \$1.75 per horsepower annually. There is no change in the sales tax or in the income tax. There is a slight reduction in the rate on well-drilling machinery for deep wells and on engines for fishing boats used by individual fishermen. The duty on rolling mill rolls is reduced. There is a widening of the operation of the anti-dumping provisions, which may now be employed against any goods imported into Canada dutiable or otherwise.

The Government, Mr. Robb announces, should begin work very soon. The board is to consist of three experts abroad in the Government service and two or three other men who are recognized as authorities on fiscal matters, and who are to be appointed presently. This board, it appears from the Minister's statement, will be purely advisory. The Government, he says, is of the opinion that expert and exact knowledge to be obtained through such a board is necessary before there is any general tariff revision.

The acting Finance Minister, notwithstanding an immense decrease in receipts from customs duties and from the sales tax, reports a surplus of \$1,828,000 on the operations of the last fiscal year. There is an additional \$4,000,000, representing interest from Greece and Romania on loans made to them by Canada during the war. This interest is now being regularly paid. A remarkable feature of the country's trade is the great and still increasing balance of exports over imports. Hon. Mr. Robb claims for the Government the practice of rigid economy in all the public services, and intimates that such costs will be still further reduced. He notes that the past year brought its difficulties, trade depression in Europe having reduced the purchasing power of the people there and affected business adversely on this continent. In addition to this there were short crops in some parts of Canada, notably the wheat crop, resulting in less labor for the harvesting and less traffic for railways, ports and ships. The bright spot, as Mr. Robb points out, is the higher price obtainable for agricultural products.

LAND AND OCEAN RATES.

After a discussion of eighteen days in the House of Commons the Government's proposal for obtaining some control over ocean freight rates goes to a committee of the House before which there will be an extended examination of the proposals. The Opposition amendment, which was defeated by a majority of 108, and which was supported by every Conservative in the House, set forth that control of ocean freight rates could be brought about only by deemed the Petersen contract as ill-advised, costly and futile. The Liberals and the Progressives voted solidly for the Government plan, although the debate did indicate that many of the Government members, although they supported the measure as a first step toward control of shipping rates, evidently believed that effective control, if obtained at all, would depend for its success in the long run upon co-operation by other parts of the British Empire, notably Australia and South Africa, which profess themselves to be in much the same

position as Canada in the matter of shipping charges. Mr. H. M. Marler, of the St. Lawrence-St. George division, Montreal, in the course of the debate suggested that Canada frankly face the necessity of paying subsidies by land and sea in order to get the products of all parts of the country to their natural markets. He followed out in this debate practically what he had said previously with respect to railway rates, that before the people in the various provinces could secure rates necessary to overcome geographical conditions, subsidies to all the railways might be necessary for ten years or more.

Mr. Marler said that if people were to stay in Canada, and if the country was to grow, their products must have access to certain markets. Those of the United States were closed now to much that we have to sell, and likely to remain closed. Therefore the Government was faced with the task of securing access to markets thousands of miles distant from the point of production. The producers, Mr. Marler reminded the House, did not only have to pay rates upon the carriage of their commodities across the continent, but were compelled after that to send them across the ocean. He could see no way out of this situation except to introduce subsidies whereby all portions of the Dominion would bear the cost necessary to market the products of Canadian divisions which suffered from a geographical handicap.

Following out this idea he went so far as to suggest that all the Canadian shipping companies might be included in the Petersen contract. Hon. Mr. Meighen inquired if Mr. Marler appreciated the size of the subsidies that would be necessary if a sufficient number of the steamship companies to carry all of Canada's products to accept his plan. Mr. Marler did not have that information, so the leader of the Opposition supplied it for him and for the House, saying that the cost would be some \$84,000,000 annually. But Mr. Marler, who seemed thoroughly wedded to his idea of enlarged subsidies, said that even if such an amount should prove necessary it would at least result in getting the available products to the markets, and not only that but it would give the Canadian railways a greatly increased traffic, and would bring about a larger immigration, an increased population and a greater production, which would in turn enable the railways to get along without assistance. Anyhow, he could see no other way out, inasmuch as the country could not get along if it could not export its natural and manufactured products on an increasing scale.

While the shipping proposals are being analyzed in committee there may be some further light on the whole subject of export and import traffic arising from the coming discussion in the House on railway rates and the increased use of Canadian railways and ports.

THE CALL FOR UNITY.

At the conclusion of his budget speech yesterday, the acting Minister of Finance, Hon. Mr. Robb, said a word as to Canada's outlook. Having noted that our trade prospects for the immediate future looked brighter, he went on to say: "No world state has a more self-reliant and virile people than has Canada. But to achieve our destiny we must remove all sectional, all provincial jealousies from our hearts; we must keep faith, forget all differences of tongue and creed, remembering only and always that we enjoy a great heritage, that we are Canadians."

We must, indeed, do all of those things. We must cultivate true national unity, and in our desire to do so we must not forget that national policies designed to remove the causes of provincial jealousies, and differences arising from race and creed are, fortunately, by no means so troublesome as they were years ago. It cannot be overlooked, however, that dissatisfaction does exist in both the Maritime Provinces and the West and that this dissatisfaction constitutes a national weakness. It is based in both sections upon the feeling that development is still subject to unjust and unnecessary handicaps which can be removed through a frank and common understanding of their nature and an agreement that the national welfare justifies and demands policies of betterment.

Some mutual sacrifices may be necessary in working out these changes, but the fact remains that the desired measure of national unity can come only when the people in each of the provinces feel that they are sharing equally the benefits of federal union. To bring about this feeling is

not the work of a day; there is no magic by which it can be accomplished; but it can be done through enlarged co-operation and understanding and a general recognition of the fact that national policies must look equally to the good of the farmer and the manufacturer, the clerk, the artisan and the professional classes, in all parts of the country.

The influences which make for dissatisfaction and division must be subjected to searching examination by thoughtful men and women in every part of the country in order that these problems may be really understood, and in order that common agreement and united action for their solution may be taken. The call for unity must be followed by vigorous and broad-splanned action to promote and preserve that unity without which the Dominion cannot achieve the prosperity and contentment which are vital to its success.

Settlement of the Nova Scotia strike should follow the increase in the duty on American bituminous slack.

Germany's latest promises to be good are quoted as promising permanent peace in Europe, but what is really expected, in view of the Chamberlain speech, is that in the proposed security pact, which is to include Germany, it will be continually the business of Britain, France and Belgium to see that Germany is compelled to keep its word.

**Rate on Slack Coal From U. S. Raised From 14c. to 50c. a Ton.**

(1) An export duty is to be levied on electrical power equal to three hundredths of a cent per kilowatt hour. This will be equal to \$1.75 per horse power year and comes into force on April 15. An order in council has already been passed under the electricity and fluid export act to impose the duty.

Slack coal imported from the United States will be dutiable at 50 cents a ton, instead of 14 cents as now. Other bituminous coal previously dutiable at 35 cents under the general tariff, will now be dutiable, like slack at 50 cents.
