Domestic Elections.

If the elections were held within a month or two, the Opposition party, would, perhaps, have less minority than at a later date, but as the Liberals control the matter they will examine both public and party interests best by allowing the elections as much time as possible to realize the relative claims of the two parties who will seek their endorsement at the polls. We may, therefore, not expect the elections until late next Fall, notwithstanding the prophecies to the contrary.
