It is clear that all the worry and scheming and thoughts of "deals," etc. are in the opposition camp, for the Premier is in Great Britain enjoying a well-earned holiday and his colleagues of the executive are administering provincial affairs in the usual careful way.

Liverpool Spruce Market. In its Liverpool journal, the London Timber Trade Journal of 12th inst., says:—"Without being fat in any sense, there is an absence of buoyancy in all the white wood departments of the trade, and we seem to be going along on the same level path which has characterized our market for several weeks past."

The lumber industry stands forth among the great manufacturing occupations of the United States, according to a recent census bulletin. The steel industry is first, the textile second and the most peaking third.

There is an extraordinary story in circulation that in connection with the coronation there were 468 Canadian applications for Knighthood. The statement seemed so remarkable that it was thought it worth investigating.

An Ohio despatch of 19th inst. says:—"John W. Bookwalter, of Springfield, Ohio, has been offered and refused \$100,000 to be his agent in the sale of a piece of land in the State of Ohio."

A special London cable says:—"The preliminary first-line negotiations between the Canadian ministers and Sir Christopher Furness and the Elder-Deputes are still proceeding. The next step apparently will be to endeavor to induce Mr. Chamberlain to increase the British subsidy, which is now pledged at £75,000 against Canada's £150,000."

"The general synod of the church of England in Canada will hold its next quadrennial meeting in Montreal commencing Wednesday, September 3. The synod will be called upon this year to transact the most important business that has ever come before it."

A cable message has been received at the military department, Ottawa, from Sir Fredrick Borden, authorizing the despatch to England of one officer and thirteen mounted men to represent Canada in the colonial coronation of King Edward VII.

The balance after preferred dividends shows about 17% on the common stock amounting to \$2,000,000. The increase of \$19,600,000 in the common stock draws no dividends until the 1903 stock is paid on a 6% basis, and in case this happens the surplus would be reduced by \$2,000,000.

The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company announces that they will send commercial messages to Canada before December. The rate will be 6d a word for private messages and 3d a word for press messages.

NEWS AND NOTES. Manitoba's wheat and hay crops are reported to be very promising. A \$2,000,000 fire took place on 16th at Guayquil, Ecuador.

The island of St. Vincent is earthquake-stricken and its inhabitants are in consternation. There will be a coronation naval review off Portsmouth, Eng., on 11th August—the second day of the London pageant.

A tornado in Baltimore unroofed hundreds of houses, uprooted trees in the parks and killed eleven persons on Sunday last.

The King has decided not to re-invest special foreign representatives to attend the coronation on August 9. The resident ambassadors will take their place.

The Mississippi has overflowed its banks in Iowa and Missouri, inundating hundreds of farms and plantations. The damage is estimated at \$5,000,000.

The ladies of Cape Town presented Mrs. Bryn with £1,000 before she sailed for Europe with her husband, the ex-Premier of the Orange River Colony, who is seriously ill.

A sea-fall at the Canadian Northern Railway's new elevator at Port Arthur gave way the other day, allowing three men to fall 90 feet. Two were killed and the legs of the other were broken.

Hon. Joseph Chamberlain is able to appoint to his public office, Saturday 19, an injury he received by being thrown out of his house in a London street. He carries a scar on his face, however, which, it is said, will remain for his lifetime, although it is not a very disfigurement.

The peace in the Philippines proclaimed by President Roosevelt has turned out to be a par with the end of the South African War announced by Lord Roberts when he left Kitchener to take the heaviest and still opposing against the belligerents in the Philippines.

The Telegram's cable from London says:—"Nothing has been officially reported of the message of the provincial premiers and ministers from Canada, who are here at present, but it is understood they have discussed the important question of securing better terms for the provinces from the dominion. An increase has been proposed for all the provinces and its adoption would mean an increase of half a million per annum in revenue for Ontario, and other provinces in proportion."

"The maritime premiers, Messrs. A decision of importance has been rendered by St. Louis Judge named Siderer. The parents of Willie Quinn brought action against Abram Simon for keeping a dog, Jupiter by name, which had bitten and wounded and otherwise injured Willie. The defense, among other things was that Willie wilfully, maliciously and of malice aforethought attempted to fasten, attach and tie a tin can, or vessel made of tin, to the tail or hind appendage of the dog, with intent to injure and maim the said dog previous to his bite, annoyance and restraint, bodily harm, annoyance and restraint, and deprive him of the comfort and society of other dogs. Judge Siderer decided in favor of the dog. He said:—"Any dog has the legal, undeniable right to bite any man, woman or child who trespasses, and with intent to disturb said dog's tranquility and peace of mind, dog stands, or comes to be attached, to said dog's tail a tin can or other object which will impede or hinder the dog's movement, and which his predecessor in such a case is acting purely and honestly in self defense, and is as justly entitled to punishment as the man who shoots a burglar in defence of his own life and welfare."

The decision is all right, but it is evident that the judge never saw a dog with a tin can attached to his tail, or he would not have committed himself to the idea that such an addition thereto impedes the animal's progress.

"The general idea at present seems to be that an Atlantic company will be floated here to construct a fast passenger service to Cape Breton, with three new 32 knot steamers costing £1,000,000 sterling each, the company also to buy the Furness and Elder-Deputes fleet for a cargo service to the St. Lawrence. It is hoped to induce the Australian premiers here to combine with Canada to improve the Vancouver-Australian line as a link in the fast mail service, and to bring London and Sydney (N. S. W.) within 25 days of each other."

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier has decided to postpone his visit to France till after the coronation. The French arrangements include a stay in Paris, a visit to the Lido exhibition, a trip to Anagnone, the home of his ancestors, a stay on the Normandy coast, thence to Rome, passing through Switzerland."

"Hon. Messrs. Fielding and Paterson and probably Sir William Mellick will accompany him. They expect to be back in Canada about the middle of September. Tonight Sir Wilfrid and others attend the premier of Natal ball at the Cecil."

"It is evident from last night's speech at the Canada Club dinner that Mr. Chamberlain's conference has made no progress as yet towards definite agreements or the preferential tariff negotiations. The chief result so far has been to discover how many different views are held, though the fraternal spirit is most marked."

"In order to shorten the conference the premiers are having special interviews with the ministry, defence and other departments in regard to preferential trade and the proposed steamship line."

"Admiral Lord Charles Bessford advances helping Canada with a fast steamship line. With a British combine for Atlantic trade it would surely knock J. Pierpont Morgan's plan in the head."
