

## Young Men's Christian x x Association x



**D**URING the last fifty years the need has been felt throughout the Christian Church for definite work for young men. This need is being filled by the Young Men's Christian Association. The first Association for the world was organized at London in 1844; in America, at Montreal in 1850. Eight years after, the first College Association was formed in the University of Michigan. The work has so extended that now in America every city and town of importance and every College has its Y. M. C. A. as a centre for organized Christian work for young men, by young men. And it has extended beyond us until this year there are reported 1,448 Associations among 40 nations speaking 17 languages, the total amount of their property being \$18,189,300. In North America 520 Colleges have Associations. There are 108 Associations among railroad men, 11 for Germans, 61 among Negroes, 33 for Indians, one for French and one for Japanese. The Lord is using this instrument to advance His Kingdom all over the world.


