Home Rule in Canada.

TORONTO, Oct. 30 A special cablegram gives extracts from an article written by the Marquis of Lorne and published in the Contem-porary Review, on Home Rule in Canada. The article in question was written by Lord Lorne in compliance with a request to furnish notes suggestive of steps that might be taken to meet a demand for Ireland, or to provide information having a bearing upon the future of Australasia. The Marquis discusses the chief features of the Federal Government of Canada, indicates the individual rights reserved to different Provinces and dwells drawn before the three chapels at the end, and the pontifical throne, elevations defining full sight of the congression of the central government.
