GERMANY MAKES REPARATIONS OFFER OF \$7,500,000,000, BUT BRITISH PREMIER REFUSES

Dr. Simons Outlines Counter-Proposal at London Conference—Lloyd George Replies There Is No Need of Continuing Deliberations If Germans Have Nothing Better to Suggest—Allied Military Experts Discuss Plans for Possible Invasion of Ruhr District.

London, March 1.—Germany, through her delegates to the conference with the Allies here, today made reparation offers of approximately 30,000,000,000 gold marks, or about \$7,500,000,000. It was understood outside the conference that after Dr. Simons, the German foreign minister, had finished his statement on reparations to the conference, Mr. Lloyd George, the British prime minister, replied in substance that unless the Germans had something more to offer than appeared in Dr. Simons' statement there was no need of continuing the conference.

Dr. Simons outlined a counter-proposal at the London Conference. Lloyd George replied there is no need of continuing deliberations if Germans have nothing better to suggest. Allied military experts discuss plans for possible invasion of Ruhr district.

OVER \$277,000 IN REAL ESTATE CHANGES HANDS DURING FEBRUARY

Much Valuable Property Sold During Past Month—113 Sales Recorded.

Activity in the real estate market is not as pronounced this year as during 1920, although a large number of valuable properties are changing hands. There were 113 sales during the month of February, according to the returns made to the city assessment department by the registry office today. These involved considerations totalling more than \$277,000. Last year during February there were 135 sales, involving considerations of more than \$419,700. The assessment on these was \$295,350, or 85.1 per cent.

WETS AND DRIES BEGIN CAMPAIGN ON REFERENDUM

Vote On Importation Question To Be Taken April 18.

Both Sides Commence With Meetings Throughout Province.

Toronto, March 1.—Seven weeks from today "John Barleycorn," as a legalized liquor is known, will be the subject of a referendum vote on a question submitted under the Canada Temperance Act. The ballot, "Shall the importation of liquor be forbidden in this province," will be put to the voters on April 18.

BOARD OF HEALTH WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN TO EDUCATE PEOPLE

Appropriates Eight Hundred Dollars of Estimates For Advertising Purposes—To Bring Work of Department Before Citizens.

The beginning of what may become a large campaign of education in public health matters has been made by the board of health. Eight hundred dollars has been appropriated for advertising in its estimates for this year. This will be used to bring the work of the department before the people in various ways.

The chief one of these suggested by the chairman, Dr. O. I. Cunningham, is that pamphlets be printed, explaining the quarantine regulations. Under present circumstances when houses are placed because of communicable disease, an objection is raised by the householder. The chairman suggests that a brief statement of the reasons and necessity for quarantining be left with the persons in this case. This would not only educate the public, but it would also bring the work of the department before the people in various ways.

INCREASE IN SALARIES FOR TEACHERS OF COLLEGIATE IS RECOMMENDED BY COMMITTEE

Stipend of Principal Mooney Will Likely Be \$4,000, While the Heads of Departments Will Receive \$3,100.

Salaries of the teachers of the London Collegiate Institute and a draft of the proposed new central board of education, occupied the attention of the board of education this morning for nearly two hours.

In regard to the question of teachers' salaries, the board recommended that the stipend of Principal W. H. T. Mooney be increased to \$4,000, and that the heads of departments be increased to \$3,100. The board also recommended that the salaries of the teachers be increased to \$2,500 per annum.

CITY MUST PAY COUNTY \$60,000 BACK EXPENSES ON UPKEEP OF COUNTY JAIL AND COURT HOUSE

Ald. Ashton Characterizes Award of Arbitration Board As Disgrace—County Offered Better Proposition to City, But It Was Turned Down, Says Middlesex Councillor.

While Ald. John Ashton today characterized as a disgrace the award of the county house and jail arbitration board, whereby the city will pay \$50,000 of the cost of upkeep, other members of the council were reluctant about making any remarks.

Ald. W. A. Wilson also has been in dispute for several years and in the hands of an arbitration committee, therefore most of the present members of the council are not very conversant with its terms.

Ald. Ashton declared that if the city was required to pay such a large share of the costs it had an equal share in the control of the expenditures. He claimed that such matters as repairs and other expenditures of that nature are entirely in the hands of the city engineer. The city has to meet the cost whether or not it approves of the work being done.

Ald. W. A. Wilson also considered the division of cost unequal. Ald. Watkinson said he believed it was more than the city ever had paid before.

According to City Clerk Baker there is comparatively little difference between the award and the previous agreement which existed between the county and the city. Some of the details have been arranged, but the total amount of money which the city is required to pay is about the same, he said.

The award will come before No. 17 committee of the council tomorrow. It is probable they will refer it to City Solicitor T. G. Meredith for advice as to whether or not it should be accepted. "It will mean that, roughly speaking, the city will resolve about \$12,000 from the city for the past three years. Nothing has been paid by the city since 1917," said Warden Alton Evelyn of Middlesex regarding the award.

County Councillor J. S. Cousins stated that the county had offered London a better proposition than the arbitration award, but that the city officials would have arbitration rather than a settlement.

Increases in the percentage of the costs of the upkeep of the jail and the courthouse which the city must pay amount to but one per cent in many cases, it was pointed out.

Following a statement by Ald. Harley that the city-council's committee had gone on record as to the position that gas could not be produced at the current price, the city council, it was pointed out, stated that apparently neither the civic officials nor the company had fully settled among themselves the justice of the latter's plea for higher rates, and by almost unanimous vote the bill was laid over for two weeks.

MANITOBA MEMBER'S MOTION IS EXPECTED TO HURRY ELECTION

Nelson Member Presents Sub-Amendment To Mackenzie
King Amendment—Demands Immediate Adjournment
After Voting of Supply, But Provides That House Reas-
semble After Census To Pass Redistribution Bill and
Hold Election.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—(Canadian Press.)

Debate on the address in the House of Commons today took a sudden turn. For a couple of weeks, discussion has hovered around the Opposition amendment, declaring that the Government is usurping power and calling for a general election.

This afternoon, J. A. Campbell (Nelson, Man.), presented a sub-amendment to the amendment. Mr. Campbell recently crossed the floor from Government benches to the "desert wilderness of No Man's Land," and it was from No Man's Land that Mr. Campbell addressed the House.

In his sub-amendment Mr. Campbell takes the ground that there should be redistribution before a general election, but an election as soon as possible after redistribution. He would have Parliament dissolve on adjournment. When the census returns are available the House would reassemble.

Disolution Next.
A redistribution bill would be brought down and after that—disolution. Thus, this would be the last session of the present Parliament, but it would be a session continued when census returns are available in the fall.

Mr. Campbell remarked that the crossing the floor had not great significance. "It is possible," he observed, "that I shall not differ from the Government in the future as much as I have in the past and shall support them on many questions on which I believe them to be right."

The day was largely one of Western men. Again and again the floor was taken by Western supporters of the Government for an investigation into the grain trade. Mr. Shaw (Alb.) thought that unrest among Western farmers was mainly due to present methods in handling grain. "The people of the West," said Mr. Blair (Battle River, Alta.), "do not understand to what an extent Western farmers are at the mercy of the grain dealers."

"Western farmers," urged Mr. Argue, "are not satisfied. They want a commission to investigate not only the terminal elevators, but elevators all up and down the line. From the Opposition, J. H. Sinclair (Antigonish) termed this the "cabinet of perpetual sorrow." He compared Mr. J. A. Calder with "Mr. Facing-Both-Ways" of "Pilgrimage" fame, and generally reminded Mr. Calder—of the accompaniment of much Opposition laughter—that "Mr. Facing-Both-Ways failed to reach the Celestial City."

CABINET IS ONE OF PERPETUAL SHUFFLE
DECLARES SINCLAIR

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—(Canadian Press.) When the House of Commons convened today Hon. Mr. Doherty introduced his bill to amend and consolidate the laws relating to copyrights. That read was given to this bill. A bill respecting the inspection of grain and measures also received first reading.

Dr. R. J. Manion (Port Williams) continued the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne. He had not, he said, intended to take part in the debate, but certain remarks emanating from members of the opposition required an answer. One opposition member had referred to the Liberal Unionists as weak-kneed reformers who were lacking in courage. Dr. Manion said that the Liberal Unionists were men of sufficient courage to leave their own party for the sake of a principle. They had not hesitated to criticize the Government.

when they thought criticism was necessary, and they had voted against the Government when they saw fit. Dr. Manion remarked that very few members of the Opposition had voted against the Government.

Low Tariff Party.
The Opposition claimed to be the low tariff party. It had carried out its motto in 1918 and 1919, before the Laurier Government came into power, he said, the average ad valorem customs duty imposed by Canada varied from 14 per cent to 22 per cent. Between 1896 and 1911, when the Laurier Government was in power, the average ad valorem duty was from 10 per cent to 19 per cent. During the year 1920 the average rate of duty was only 15.19 per cent. Between June, 1920, and the end of last month the average rate was 13.96 per cent or nearly three points lower than during the Liberal regime from 1896 to 1911. Mr. Manion said, "low tariff is a question of party, then we are the Liberal party, and the Opposition is the Tory party."

He observed that Ontario and Quebec had similar economic interests and thought the better course of action would be to support the leader of the Government and the policy he wished to carry out.

The Government said that the Government had no mandate. That might be "but," Dr. Manion added, "when they ask me to cross the floor, I ask them 'Who gave me a mandate to get behind the leader of the Opposition?'"

Dr. Manion said that nobody would dispute the fact that a general election would help Canada's problems, to pay Canada's indebtedness or solve the railway problem. Canada needed a general election to develop national unity and to develop national pride. He said that a general election would be a fair franchise act for everyone. COMMITTEES PREMIER
J. H. Sinclair (Antigonish) complimented the premier on his accession, and said that he admired Mr. Meighen for his many great abilities. Mr.

Meighen had revived the old Toryism. Unionism was dead and it boasted few mourners. The Government party had changed its name as often as Henry VIII. changed his wives. But the people had not changed their spots. The old party had stood for a partisan franchise and had spent in excess of its income. The old party had promoted ports and drydocks to order its cabinet ministers. The new party was doing all of these things. The biggest drydock in the world had been promised to the people of British Columbia to elect the present minister of agriculture. The biggest dredge in the world had been set to pumping mud in the Maritime Provinces to elect the present minister of customs. The new premier was flying in the face of Scripture in trying to put new wine into old bottles, but he was the same old party and with the same old ideas. The cabinet might be designated "The cabinet of perpetual shuffle."

RECOMMENDS REFORMS.
Mr. Sinclair recommended some reforms and the consideration of the Government. It had furnished details of the expenditure of \$15,000,000, for which last session it failed to give any reasons. It should respect the audit act for the first time in its session and bring down the auditor-general's report within fifteen days of the opening of Parliament. He thought that it might economize in many directions, might reduce the mounted police and confine the operations of that body to the Northwest territories and the Yukon. The Government could cut down the army and navy. It should cut down port facilities and the cost of the administration. It should stop building ships that were not needed, and should build no more drill halls, anywhere or drydocks in British Columbia. It should reduce the army of civil servants and disburse with the services of experts like Griffiths, who suggested reforms to a Government that didn't want a reform. It would carry no more news bureaux in New York to stop listening to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association take sides in the war to prevent wealthy citizens from dodging their income tax.

Proof of Corruption.
Mr. Sinclair thought that Parliament should ratify the Government. He thought that a government expenditure of \$5,000,000 instead of the \$20,000,000 would be a good thing. Mr. Sinclair could see none of the earmarks of the nation-builder in government which substituted secret deals-in-council for acts of parliament. He claimed that the champion of British principles, after it had framed the war time constitution. Every cent by-elections had been played for with loaded dice. THE PROBLEM

The problem is to draw a chain of circles once across the chart, from the first column on the left to the last column on the right, selecting the figures to encircle so that you can obtain the greatest difference between the sum total of the even and the sum total of the odd figures. The figures are 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9. By "sum total" is meant the figures you encircle, and add them up; then the even figures, and the difference between the two totals is your solution. It makes no difference which of the two sum totals is the larger; the greatest difference you can obtain either way is what counts.

The chain must be drawn in continuous sections of either three, four or five circles to a section. By "section" is meant three, four or five circles in a straight line. You may use either number of circles you wish up or down, or to the right, but not to the left. That is, start in the first column by drawing either three, four or five circles up or down, as you wish; then proceed to the right, then up or down again; then to the right, or five on until you reach the last column. The chain must end with either three, four or five circles in this column.

ILLUSTRATION

The accompanying illustration explains what a chain of circles is. The first section, it will be noted, consists of four circles; the second, three; the third, three; and so on. The sum total of the even numbers, viz., 45, 67, 89, etc., is 756, and the sum total of the odd numbers, viz., 67, 89, etc., is 822. The difference between these totals is 144.

TOBACCO GROWERS WANT HIGHER DUTY ON IMPORTED LEAF

Leamington Producers Will
Send Delegates To Ottawa
With Petition.

LEAMINGTON, Feb. 28.—At a largely attended meeting of the tobacco growers of this district held in the town hall, M. H. Swatman and R. W. Simpson were appointed members of a deputation which will go to Ottawa and present to the Dominion Government a petition signed by 10,000 people, asking that a higher duty be placed on foreign raw leaf tobacco coming into Canada. More than 400 growers in this district attended the meeting, at which J. H. Conover presided.

Mr. Swatman stated that the tobacco companies were in sympathy with this movement except the Imperial Tobacco Company. He brought up the matter of the city newspaper, publishing articles that are detrimental and that are injuring the eight thousand tobacco growers of Ontario.

Another resolution was moved by G. E. Lambler, seconded by S. J. Lane, that the tobacco growers of Leamington district here assembled, condemn the action of F. Charnley, head of the tobacco department of the Dominion of Canada for the articles that are appearing in the press of this country over his signature, as they are detrimental and not in the best interests of the tobacco growers of Ontario, and that the Dominion Government be requested to remove him and place a more competent man and a man who will work to the interests of the tobacco growers at the head of the tobacco department of the Dominion of Canada, and that the secretary be instructed to send a copy of this resolution to Mr. Charnley.

Resolution carried unanimously.

INJUNCTION IS REFUSED.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Lower court decrees refusing an injunction to the Detroit United Railway Company to restrain the city of Detroit from embarking on the construction of a city-owned system of street railways were sustained today by the supreme court.

LONG MEMBER FAVORS BILL TO EXAMINE APPLICANTS TO MARRY

Dr. Stevenson Supports Colleague, Dr. Godfrey, in Bill To
Compel Medical Examination Before Matrimony —
First Division of Session Occurs When Homuth's Voting
Bill Meets Defeat.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
TORONTO, Feb. 28.—The two doctors of the Ontario Legislature, Dr. Godfrey and Dr. H. A. Stevenson, stood almost alone in the House yesterday in support of a measure to compel applicants to the state of matrimony to submit to medical examination. There should be no indiscriminate compulsory medical examination.

Dr. Stevenson declared himself heartily in accord with the measure which Dr. Godfrey has successfully advocated on the floor of the Legislature for a number of years. The member for London even desired to have the proposed law go a step further and prohibit the marriage of any person who has been an inmate of a consumption sanatorium. Dr. Godfrey declined to withdraw the bill upon the suggestion of the premier and called for the "yeas" and "nays." Then Hon. G. H. Ferguson suggested that it be allowed to stand for consideration along with amendments to the Provincial Secretary, which was his final disposition.

For the first time in the present session the House divided yesterday on a bill brought in by K. Homuth, Labor member for South Waterloo, to limit municipal elections to one vote by ballot or questions irrespective of whether they own property in one or any number of municipalities. The Laborites were the chief supporters of the measure, but the House split all ways in the count. Provincial Treasurer Smith, Hon. F. C. Biggs and some U. P. members voted with the "yeas" against Premier Drury, Attorney-General Raney, Hon. F. C. Nixon, Hon. Walter Hollis and Hon. Harry Mills, who voted with the "nays." The bill was defeated by 34 to 13.

If the Legislature, in considering O. T. A. appeals, is to consider the appeals to a county judge with new evidence permissible, Premier Drury will go to the country. He is credited with having made that declaration before the Government caucus, which was held last week and was held in the hours of the morning with the contentious issue of appeal under the O. T. A.

But there is small likelihood of the House turning down the compromise which, it is said, has been agreed upon between the two factions in the appeals. Whereas the demand at the last discussion was for a county judge, it is said, the premier and the attorney-general have conceded to the Laborites and the farmers who stand with them the right of appeal to the county judge on the evidence adduced at the police court trial. It is on the issue of admitting new evidence at the appeal against which the premier and the attorney-general are said to have adamantly set their faces.

FIRST DIVISION OCCURS.

TORONTO, Feb. 28.—Division bells rang for the first time this session in the corridors at Queen's Park, when a second reading was sought for a bill introduced by K. K. Homuth, Labor member for South Waterloo. By 34 votes to 13, the House threw out the bill, which Mr. Homuth said furthered the principle of "one man—one vote." The bill, which was a proposed amendment to the Municipal Act, provided that an elector shall be entitled to vote once only on any bylaw or question submitted, and that he is qualified to vote in more than one ward or polling subdivision in which he is qualified to vote, or if not qualified to vote there, or if he is not a resident of the municipality, he may elect at which of such wards or polling subdivisions he will vote, and shall vote there only.

Hon. Thomas Crawford said that the bill would weaken the serious injury against property owners. Premier Drury said that his mind was quite open in regard to the bill, but he could easily imagine that in cities, such as Toronto and Hamilton, real estate men with small equity in lots scattered all over the city might easily outvote the man who has a real large financial interest in the city.

Hon. W. R. Rolfe, minister of labor, and Mr. Halcrow, leader of the Labor group in the House, supported the bill. To Weaken Deaf.

Charles McCrea, Sudbury said that the bill would tend to weaken the desire of people to hold property. "If the people who had no stake in the community are going to have as much say as the people who have property, then you are going to remove the props that make for stability," he said. Hon. G. H. Ferguson, leader of the Conservative group, thought that the ideal solution was a unit of taxation, permitting a man assessed for say \$2,000, to vote once, and a man assessed for a higher amount to have a proportionately larger number of votes. The time, however, was not ripe for that.

Because he thought action could only be taken in concert with other provinces, Hon. H. C. Nixon opposed an amendment to the marriage act introduced by Dr. Godfrey (Wentworth) which provided that candidates for marriage should be required to have a medical certificate. The provincial secretary thought that if the bill were passed there would be a great falling off in the marriage rate. The bill was too radical and too far ahead of public opinion.

Premier Drury said the bill would possibly tend towards illicit relationship. He feared "a great outbreak of illegitimacy" if the bill were passed. The prime minister thought the only possible thing was an educational campaign emphasizing the importance of the marriage. He asked that the bill should be laid aside for the session.

Either Right Or Wrong.
"We might just as well face the music. This bill is either right or wrong," said Dr. Godfrey, who would not agree to the suggestion.

Hon. G. H. Ferguson said it was a delicate and difficult subject to deal with. The member for West York deferred credit for three years in discussion bringing the matter up for discussion. The member for Granville said it might be well to appoint a select committee to consider the matter. Hon. W. E. Raney, who had been out of the house during the discussion, rose to say that the Government was not going to bring down a bill repealing the present marriage act. Under the new bill applicants for marriage licenses would have to make a statutory declaration that they were free from disease.

Charles McCrea (Conservative, Sudbury) brought to the attention of the House a statement filed last week by Shirley Denison, K.C., crown counsel for the timber industry, on behalf of Justices Riddell and Latchford, commissioners in the timber probe, who are being sued by the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, which statement was given out for publication.

Mr. McCrea claimed that George Gray, a witness at the timber inquiry before Commissioners Riddell and Latchford, was referred to in the statement as being "not frank" "unreliable" to elucidate certain points. He characterized the Denison statement as misleading and intended to create in the public mind a suspicion of wrongdoing or questionable dealings on Mr. McCrea's part.

Was Not Familiar.
Mr. McCrea explained to the House that he was present when George Gray was being examined in the timber investigation, and when he noticed that witness Gray was not familiar with some details on which he was being questioned (McCrea) arose from his seat in the court room and volunteered to go into the witness box and clear up the matter "in five minutes." He refused a hearing by Commissioners Riddell and Latchford, he stated, and was not permitted to make a statement as a solicitor for the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited.

WHISKEY BANDITS ATTACK OFFICER

Provincial Constable Is Handcuffed and Placed in Car.

WINDSOR, Feb. 28.—William Allan of the provincial police force was beaten, handcuffed and placed in a C. P. R. boxcar early today when he was attacked by bandits as he was waiting to inspect a shipment of liquor which police had received word would reach Windsor. The bandits made off in a fast touring car, but Allan was able to issue a warning, and he was joined in a few minutes by other members of the force. Liquor amounting to 700 cases was seized by the police.

Plans for a new \$2,000,000 hotel on Lansdowne street east of the Windsor Hotel Company will not interfere with plans of the Border Cities Hotel Co. to build a modern hotel. L. Howell, secretary of the company, announced today. Bids will be advertised on Monday.

The second annual automobile show opened in the amusements tonight with several short addresses from city officials. R. M. Jeffrey, secretary, said that he had received a few more applications for floor space, but that it had all been filled more than a week ago. The building was crowded to capacity.

Case Dismissed.
After listening to an alleged "sale of dope" case for over an hour, Magistrate W. B. Gundy dismissed it when Crown Attorney Urquhart remarked that "too much time was being wasted in needless questions and answers." The case should have been over long ago. The magistrate said he would hurry no case when human liberty was at stake, and wanted to hear all the evidence.

Teddy Jean Chinese, was charged with unlawfully selling drugs to Leon Soule, aged 22, of Fort St. John, who had given \$10 to Jean for the drug, and that an officer arrested him while he was receiving it. Jean was arrested a few minutes later after a fight. He also stated that he bought drugs from Jean on several other occasions.

The hog market is weak and unsettled with lower quotations during the week. Eggs show a slightly firmer tendency, while butter has a slightly easier undercurrent.
