GERMANY MAKES REPARATIONS OVER \$277,000 OFFER OF BUT \$7,500,000,000: IN REAL ESTATE

Dr. Simons Outlines Counter-Proposal at London Conference —Lloyd George Replies There Is No Need of Continuing Deliberations If Germans Have Nothing Better to Suggest—Allied Military Experts Discuss Plans for Possible Invasion of Ruhr District

London, March 1 .- Germany, through her delegates to the conference with the Allies here, today made reparation offers of approximately 30,000,000,000 gold marks, or about \$7,500,000,000. It was understood outside the conference that after Dr. Simons, the German foreign minister, had finished his statement on reparations to the conference, Mr. Lloyd George, the British prime minister, replied in substance that unless the Germans had some thing more to offer than appeared in Dr. Simons' statement there was no need of continuing the conference.

MILITARY EXPERTS DISCUSS PLANS IF INVASION NECESSARY

Invasion Necessary

London, March 1.—Four German delegates, Dr. Walter Simons, foreign minister; Carl Bergmann, an expert on financial affairs; Herr von Simson, secretary of the German foreign office, and Dr. Goeppert, head of 'the judicial section of the foreign office, entered the conference with the Allies on the reparations question here today. Before going to Lancaster House, where the conference began, the German representatives paid a visit to their country's embassy. The Germans, it was learned this morning, were not given plenary powers by their government, and during the conference they will remain in constant communication with Berlin.

When they left their hotel the German delegates were a little doubtful as to what was expected of them at the conference. They said they did not know whether they were to present a memorial, which they claimed showed Germany's inability to pay reparations demanded in the terms fixed by the supreme council at Paris, or a counterproposal to the Allied Jemands.

Berlin to Decide Finally.

The German delegates were accompanied to Lancaster House by a number of secretaries. Gen. von Seecht was ready to attend the conference should the disarmament; Dr. Ledewald and Herr Lesuire of the ministry of the interior.

Buenos Aires, March 1.—Announce—ment was made here today that the Krupps of Germany had been awarded a contract for 10,000 laminated steel car wheels by the Argentine state railway. Seventeen companies, including several British firms, were competing for the contract.





OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—(By Canadian Press.) — The western Conservative members of the House of Commons will make a concerted drive for the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the western grain situation, and which was predicted on Saturday, became a certainty today when it was learned that supporters in the House of Commons were organizing a direct campaign to insist on such a step being taken immediately.

LARGEST SHIP TO BE

RENAMED MAJESTIC NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—The former German liner Bismarck, the largest ship in the world, is to be renamed the Majestic. She will be the second notable Majestic to fly the British fiag. The original ship of that name—and a queen of the seas in her day—was launched in 1889 and broken up in 1914, her hull and machinery going to the manufacture of war munitions.

The new Majestic, 56,000 gross tons, is about five times the size of her predecessor. She is now being made ready for her new owners by German workmen in the Hamburg shippyards, in compliance with the terms of the peace treaty. She will carry 3,500 passengers.

TORONTO, Feb. 28.—Division bells rang for the first time this session in the corridors at Queen's Park, when a second reading was sought for a bill introduced by K. K. 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

The hundredth anniversary of the death of John Keats, on Wednesday, seems to have passed with very small excitement: In his day Keats had a few friends and discerning admirers. Since his death he has never lost any ground, but always has kept going forward.

A lecturer in this city a few years ago, Mr. J. C. Powys, said that his test for a lover of poetry would be the appreciation of Keats's odes; there was true poetry. This is rather an extreme view. A better test of poetry-lovers would be the old ballads, some of them, at any rate. You have to know the language of a poet before you can appreciate him, no matter how poetic your taste may be. You will never enjoy Dante by hearing him read in the Italian, unless you know the language, nor the Arabian Nights in the original.

To Susceptible to Fire.

It is said there is no intention of abandoning airships completely, but the authorities consider that on account of their liability to destruction under fire their usefulness is limited for war purposes. One high authority says that there is not enough helium gas in the world, or now available, to warrant the building of non-inflammable airships, and in the meantime it is the intention of the authorities to watch developments and not to commit themselves to any expenditure during the present transition stage.

During the war England had about fifteen airship stations. All these gradually have been abandoned except the Howden and Fulham stations. Now it is reported that the Howden station is to go. At the Pulham station there is accommodation for only three rigid sirships and the two zeppelins which are already there. England is now building the R-37, but will attempt to put it into commercial service.

The air ministry recently was instructed to cut expenses severely, and this probably resulted in the decision to abandon the air stations. Meanwhile every effort is being made to promote civil aviation because it is believed better ter standards of efficiency and economy will be attained through competition.






